# Redistricting for schools to take effect

When Bailey County voters take to the polls on Tuesday, May 7 for the School Trustee Election, redistricting changes will take effect.

The May 7 election will be the first school election under modified voting districts. The voting districts for the Muleshoe Independent School District were approved by the Justice Department on May 17, 1993.

School districts are required to modify voting districts as needed after a census is taken every 10 years, to reflect changes in the districts.

The last census was done in 1990 and it took several years for the school to revise and get the new districts approved.

After the reorganization, there are now two districts in Muleshoe in which Hispanics are the majority of the popu-

According to Bill Moore, superintendent for Muleshoe Schools, there was only one district which was predominantly Hispanic prior to the recent redistricting changes.

Moore said that the additional Hispanic district was made based on recommendations from a committee of citizens who studied the redistricting needs.


"Because the population of the city (Muleshoe) is onethird Hispanic, the committee recommended that at least two districts be majority Hispanic," Moore said.

There are five school voting districts in Muleshoe. The two districts which are majority Hispánic are District #3, which is located in east Muleshoe and District #2, located in west Muleshoe. District #2 is the district that was recently motified to make it majority Hispanic.

The Muleshoe School District is organized under a 5-2 plan. Under the plan, there are five voting districts and two at -large.

In the school's voting guidelines, a person can run for a school board seat that is open in any district. However, people can only vote for seats

in the district they live in.

During the May 7 election, seats for Districts #1 and #4 will be open. So far, only incumbents Arnold Price, District #1, and Curtis Shelburne, District #4, have signed up to run. The deadline for people to file as write-in candidates is April 7.

According to Moore, another major adjustment that had to be made in redistricting was re-adjusting voting districts according to overall population changes.

"We had to make sure that each district has the same number of people and make sure they were all the same size," Moore said.

Moore said that overall though, the districts are pretty much the same configuration as before.

Early voting will be held in person at the School Administration Building and voting on May 7 will be held at the high school cafeteria.

The May 7 election is not expected to be effected much by the new districts since candidates so far are running unopposed. However, Moore said that if people have questions about which district they live in, they can contact the School Administration Office.
