According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox State Health Officer, there are too many persons who approach the choice of a family physician casually. Viewing the doctor much as a fireman, whose services are refamilies wait until an illness S. Department of Agriculture. strikes, and then get hold of the first doctor who can respond to the call. While such an attitude still reasonably assures one of satisfactory medical services, it can handicap the physician somewhat, and in the long run does not permit the supervision and close personal contact which can exist only by having a regular family

"Knowing his patients enables physician to give advice on maintaining health and preventing disease, based on his intimate knowledge of the physical and mental make-up of the members of the family." Dr. Cox stated. 'The casually summoned physician cannot have this background or opportunity. It is well known to students of medical science that no one procedure or drug can be applied to the cure of every disease. It would indeed be fine if we could have some panacea for all diseases, but unfortunately the healing art is not as simple as

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The Press-Here and in Russia . . .

The enormous difference between the Russians and the American ideas of government is perfectly illustrated by the recent denunciations of our press by high Soviet officials, and their demand that restrictive measures be taken to stop "unfair" criticism of Russia.

The Soviet spokesmen seem to be all in favor of a "free press"-so long as its comment agrees with their curious ideas of right and wrong. In Russia, the press is "free" to print government-inspired editorials and official handouts from the Politburo, the Foreign Office and the Kremlin. If the slightest deviation from the party line is found in a Russian newspaper, the usual practice is to send the editor in charge on a long voyage from which there is no returning.

The Russians may be perfectly sincere when they say they cannot understand American newspapers. This is one of very few nations left on the face of the earth where any editor, so long as he stays within the laws covering libel and other crimes, can say what he pleases. 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



Experiments with a new sulfa drug to combat Bangs disease in human beings will soon be m at the University of Texas.

In the Clayton Brucellosis Labcratory, directed by Dr. V. T. Schuhardt, the new drug, sulfaacthazine, will be tested on infected cattle.

Tests already show that the drug will come through the mammary gland in high concentration. Dr. Schuhardt said, and other sulfa drugs tested in the laboratory did not kill all bacteria in the mammary gland.


