

Now almost all of Europe and much of the rest of the world have larned back the clock. They have, willingly or otherwise succumbed race more to super-government. They have apparently placed the goal of a dubious physical security ahead of that of freedom. They have accepted the disciplinary weapons of dictatorship-the whipping post, execution block, the concentration camp, slave labor Even Enghand, though she still clings to the basic civil liberties, has gone a long way down the road that can end only in spiritual darkness and the unbmersion of the individual spirit.







Since the first GI loan was made late in 1944, over 971.000 veterans had received VA-guaranteed home loans as of the end of October. The total value of their home purchases exceeds \$5,610,000,000.

Only a month remains in which most National Service Life Insurance policies that have lapsed may be reinstated without necessity of taking a physical examination. the Veterans Administration said.

After the deadline date of December 31, 1947. policies that have lapsed more than three months cannot be reinstated without the veteran proving his insurability by a complete physicial examination.

> Q. If the milking ration contains salt, is it necessary to have block salt available for cows?

A. Yes, as the amount of salt dairy ows need is almost entirely an individual proposition, varying with the size of the cows, the type of ration, and the amount of milk produced. In addition, some cows seem to have a special appetite for extra salt. Milking rations should contain 1% salt, but block salt should also be available for the cows to eat according to their individual desires.

Q. What is the difference between pen matings and flock matings in turkey breeding?

A. Most commercial turkey breeders use the flock mating method which consists of mating a large number of hens to several toms. The birds mate at random. Pen matings consist of mating one tom with a few hens in order to keep pedigree records. This method is used as a means of flock improvement.

Q. How many years of human life are equivalent to one year of dog

A. About seven years of human life correspond to one year of dog life, and the average length of life

Diptheria Vaccine Should Be Given All Children, Doctor Says

All children should be immunized against diphtheria at a very early age, according to a statement on the subject released this week by the Texas State Department of Health, explaining that toxoid, which can be administered easily and without danger, can safeguard youngsters against this serious and killing disease of childhood.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges all Texas parents to have their children, who are not already protected, immunized at

"The administration of toxoid can save a child from serious illness or even death and those who have not been safeguarded against this danger should be inoculated mmediately," Dr. Cox said.

"Babies should be immunized by the age of eight or nine months." Dr. Cox advised. Authorities on the care of infants recommend a first dose by the age of eight or nine months, and sometimes as early as six months. A second is usually given later."

To maintain complete immunity, Dr. Cox said that a reinforcing dose of toxoid is advised when a child is old enough to enter school if a Schick test reveals the need of one. Children who enter school or kindergarten this year without his additional safeguard or without ever having been immunized certainly should be protected without any further delay. the State Health Officer declared.
