The Christmas-New Year holiday season is the most hazardous single period of the year, acording to Council statistics. In Traffic accidents alone, three times as many persons are killed during a Christmas holiday period than on the same days of the preceding two weeks.

The Council emphasized that the campaign is the final effort of the year to hold the 1947 traffic death toll below the 1946 total of 33,700. At the end of the first nine months of this year, there was a small reduction in traffic deaths-4 per cent- from the same period of 1946. But the final quarter of the year always is the one with the most traffic deaths.

Who Promotes Communism . . .

According to Representatime Forest A. Harness of Indiana, who is chairman of the subcommattee investigating publicity and propaganda in the executive agencies. "All members of this mission are well known in the United States for their persistent agitation for a nationalized system of socialized medicine to be achieved through a program of compulsory health insurance." Mr. Harness said further that "the real purpose of the mission is not to assist Japan in working out her basic problems in health and welfare, but to force upon that country a compulsory system of

This charge coming on the heels of evidence to the effect that certain appointive government officials of some importance have been serious one. Socialization of medicine-or any other profession or industry-is in direct opposition to American principles and traditions. All the available evidence, including findings of national public opinmen polls, leads to the belief that the great majority of our citizens are opposed to it. Yet, if Mr. Harness and the others in a position to know are correct. an American official mission will attempt to force it in one form or another on Japan.

The matter should be thoroughly investigated. And, if necessary erastic steps should be taken to prevent this sort of thing in the future. Its it not possible for our government to lend its aid to promote public health practices without seeking to socialize medicine

HUMBLE yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that he may exalt you in due time; casting all your care upor 5:6, 7. That is a splendid watchord for every boy and girl.

Now, turn to Acts 16:16-30, and see how Paul and Silas, locked in the inner dungeon at midnight, could pray and sing. That is what happens to the Christian who sincerely trusts in God-who acts on the promise that God really cares for his trusting children.

A memory verse suggested for Sunday is found in Proverbs 17:22, and it goes like this: "A cheerful heart is a good medicine.

Have you watched some Christian n affliction-how he or she could bless every passerby? It was be-"cheerful heart." And each of us may have that precious possession, if we remember Mark 11:22, "Have faith in God.

Happy Behind Prison Bars

PAUL and Silas are pictured as happy in that dark dungeon. There is a statement to challenge every cynic, every doubting Thom-11:00 as. Only the grace of God can make men nappy under persecution. Paul declares in Romans 1:16, "I am not ashamed of the Gospel." Aye, he was not ashamed to preach the Gospel to the little damsel on the streets of Jerusalem, nor was he ashamed to go to the prison for the sake of the Gospel.

Best of all, Paul and Silas were sustained in their sorrowful plight by the consciousness that God was with them—that he always keeps his word.

I venture the prediction that the fortitude of Paul and Silas in that night of persecution did more to impress the Christian religion upon Jerusalem than any sermon even the eloquent Paul ever uttered. We, too, can witness for Christ as we face difficult situations.

Courageous Loyalty

OOK now at Revelation 2:8-11, and 3:14-22, for the example of the church at Smyrna, burdened by tribulation and poverty, but "rich" in the promise that a crown of life

It was far more difficult to be a Christian in the first century than it is in the twentieth century. By which I mean that the early Christians were few in number and without any backing of public opinion. They were despised as the lowly followers of the crucified carpenter of Nazareth, Today, Christians are acknowledged as the best citizens in every community.

Even so, there are tests for ustests that will be too much for human courage and loyalty. If we are true to the teachings of Jesus as they relate to everyday life, we shall need that same enduement which the Christians at Smyrna possessed, else our discipleship will shame the name of our Lord.

THE lesson concludes with that dramatic passage in Revelation 7:9-17, in which we behold the great white-robed throng about the throne of God, singing, "Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanks-giving and honor and power and might be unto our God forever and ever. Amen."

Who were they? "These are they which came out of great tribulation, and have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb."




