Some men high in the food industry have recently forecast that there will be a decline in the general retail price level in the relafinely near future. And organizations dealing in other kinds of retail commodities have also sounded hopeful notes.

These forecasts must necessarily be taken with a grain of salt, See the reason that we are living in unpredictable times and any number of things could change the outlook drastically. However, they are indicative of the attention business is giving to the price problem. All over the country, both chain and independent merchants are repreting a substantial percentage of consumers have been forced to and down their buying. Savings are gone, and current income in these rames is insufficient to purchase more beyond the necessities. And That condition contains a grave threat to the system of mass productime and mass distribution of goods which underlies the American standard of living.

It is significant that retailing has often taken the lead in movements to reduce prices and to prevent price increases. It has done This in various ways. First of all, it has voluntarily cut its own profthe and reduced overhead costs to the minimum. Secondly, it has resperated with manufacturers in seeking means to produce goods of a given quality at a lower cost. Third, it has been a great help to measurers in showing them how to make the dollar go as far as posand de

The next few months will tell whether the peak of inflation has area passed or not. Whatever the answer, intelligent American busiwill keep on fighting the problem with all the resources it has.

Don't Cry "Wolf" For Effect ...

There is no danger of the United States running out of oil or resolute in the foreseeable future. That unequivocal statement was mande in mid-March by Don E. Gilman, of the Western Oil and Gas Association

The facts with which Mr. Gilman substantiates this are of the considest public interest. Despite all-time record consumption, the meal proved oil reserves in this country at the end of last year were mentry 705,000,000 barrels greater than at the end of 1946. And, dury ing 1947, the industry expects to drill 35,000 more wells.

So much for the present. The industry must obviously deal with the possibility that on some future date our crude oil may be largeby exhausted, and we may be cut off from foreign fields. Science has produced and is now perfecting the solution to that problem. Oil is hydrocarbon. And hydrocarbons other than petroleum exist in vast specificities in our coal and oil-bearing shale deposits. A proven method exists for converting these solid materials into liquid form. Some andborities believe that such sources of supply may last for more them 2,000 years.

There was considerable misunderstanding of the so-called "oil shortage" in some areas during the winter. In Mr. Gilman's words, "Init shortage. . . . was dislocation rather than lack. There has never been a time when there was not enough oil above ground to meet the nation's immediate demand." The problem is to get the oil sohere it is needed. And it is a problem which, according to all indirations, is being solved.




A day-old chick perches on a model of the Chicken-of-Temorrow, the objective in a nationwide contest extended through 1943.


Quality Chicks Needed To Offset Feed Costs
