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Behind The Eight Ball . . .

A basic tenet of law is that a man is innocent unutil proven guilty. Unfortunately, public opinion often condemns without justification and the accused party must prove himself innocent. Such has been the position of the steel industry. Steel prices lag far behind most commodities, but steel has had an uphill job explaining its problem to the public. Newsweek, describing the situation, says:

"Today's big earnings of U. S. Steel are possible only because its old plants have been written off to a nominal value of \$20 a ton of annual capacity. To replace that capacity today would cost close

"The cost of the industry is in similar straits. On Jones and Laughlin Steel Corporation books the investment in steel-producing facilities is valued at \$6,934 an employee. But Admiral Ben Moreell, J and L president, believes that to replace them at today's prices would cost between \$30,000 and \$40,000 a worker.

"The steel companies are behind a bigger eight ball than even many steel executives have fully appreciated. As long as present steel mills, ore, coal, and limestone properties hold out, they will coninue to report comfortable profits. But when these have to be replaced, steel prices must jump considerably or the industry will find itself deep in the red."

A Tip From Australia . . .

The restoration of peacetime price and rationing control apparently will be a major campaign issue in the forthcoming presidential election. If it is, the people of this country, whether they realize it or not, will be witnessing a debate over the future pattern of government under which they are to live. Permanent price and rationing control mean inexorable extension of centralized authority and the final adoption of the socialized state, whether it is called

Aside from the danger to personal liberty and other philosophical considerations, price and rationing control, from a practical standpoint, is a demonstrated failure. In every country where it has been tried it has led to shortages and hardship. When prices are arbitrarily held below the supply-demand levels of the free market, people will not produce. Legitimate distribution channels are disrupted by black markets and the police powers of the state become increasingly brutal if order is maintained. The expanding bureaucracy of OPA and its kangaroo court methods which were nipped in the bud at the end of the war should serve as fair warning of what can be expected if the system is re-established.

American consumers are getting better service at lower relative prices in the light of existing conditions without OPA than they ever did with it. Congressional investigations have shown that retailers' profit margins are less now in the free market than they were in the controlled market of OPA. Moreover there are no shortages of necessities.

America is not the only country that has been faced with the price control issue. Australia recently defeated by a heavy majority vote an attempt by the Central Labor Government to write price control as a permanent power into the Federal Constitution. An observer pointed out that "The Australians do not want permanent centralized Federal Government control of their economic affairs.

Supply And Demand Best Regulator . . .

Those who wonder why meat prices have reached present levls will find food for thought in an editorial by Nelson R. Crow, publisher of the Western Livestock Journal.

"Stockmen generally are taking a sober view of the price situation." he wrote. "There are few who are particularly elated about the relatively high prices being paid on the markets for fat cattle, and it must be admitted that the cost of replacement cattle is rather frightening . .

"Actually, stockmen have little or no voice in establishing the prices they receive for their livestock, nor do they have anything to say about the retail prices of meat. These prices are established by the old laws of supply and demand. As a matter of fact, retail meat prices are established by the consumer, and are based upon the ability and the willingness of the consumer to buy the supply of meat that is available. Buying power, reflected through high consumer income as a result of the successful demands for higher and higher wages, is at an all-time high."

What is true of stockmen is true all along the meat processing and distribution line. The packers, for instance, do not control prices. They, too, are governed by the laws of supply and demand, and the profit they earn amounts to but a fraction of a cent per pound of the price paid for meat by consumers. And the retailer, finally, performs the last step in bringing meat to the home at a profit per pound so small as to hardly affect the selling price.

In a competitive economy prices and supply find their natural level, and profits per dollar sale, after taxes, are always moderate. Meat is a typical example.

A comprehensive state-wide study has just been released by instatement of lapsed National the Texas State Teachers Associa- Service Life Insurance on a comtion in cooperation with the State parative health basis? Department of Education. It discloses that through increased to make application for policies property valuation or hikes in taxes most local school districts are doing their share in paying the cost of their schools.

During the 1946-47 school year, the latest for which complete figures are available, the study disclosed that the state paid 53 per cent of the cost of education and the local districts 47 per cent.

These approximate figures hold true for each of the last ten years despite the fact the constitution of Texas provides that the state shall pay for two-thirds of the costs of the schools.

Most schools have nine-month terms. The constitution sets out that "the state shall maintain and support schools for not less than six months."

Expenditures for public schools have increased from a total of \$76,706,149 in 1935-36 to \$137,609-088 during 1946-47. The local support in 1935-36 was 51 per cent to 49 for the state. The average salary of teachers in the mid thirties was approximately \$1100.

Shortly after the depression years Texans became conscious of the deficiencies in their school system and set about to give it more financial aid, the report noted.

As the legislature hiked appropriations for the schools, the local districts also increased their

levies and property valuations. During the 1941-42 school year local districts bore 51 per cent of the cost of education. They collected taxes amounting to \$47-375,861. The state supplied \$44,610,190.

Both state and local suport jumped in 1946-47. The legislature in 1945 increased the maximum tax rate that may be voted by common and independent school districts to \$1.50.

The result was that the districts took advantage of it. Local tax support in 1946-47 totaled 6\$4,116,-512. The state supplied \$73,392,-

The larger districts, especially, increased their levies. During the last school year more than 50 per cent of all children of scolastic age in independent school districts resided in districts which now levy a tax rate above \$1.00.





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
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
