

#### Soapless Suds Wide Favor of Housewives On Hard Jobs

thetic detergent powders have found wide favor with housewives, as they are generally excellent oil and grease removers. They are especially good for washing greasy pans and dishes.

Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist for Texas A and M College, says that this advantage - of dissolving grease - is not so good in washing linoleum, paint or furniture. "Detergents draw out the oil, causing finishes to dry out," she points out. "Oil is an essential ingredient in linoleum and oil paint."

Even ordinary soap will have a drying effect on linoleum and paint and should be careefully rinsed off, Mrs. Claytor says. She particularly warns against the use of grease solvents on linoleum.

"One of the best ways to keep Claytor concludes, "is to wax it linoleum in good condition," Mrs. Claytor concludes, "is to wax it frequently. Wax restores the essential oils and puts a protective finish on either linoleum or furniture and should be used often."



#### Soapless Suds Wide Favor of Housewives On Hard Jobs

The "soapless suds" or synthetic detergent powders have found wide favor with housewives, as they are generally excellent oil and grease removers. They are especially good for washing greasy pans and dishes.

Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist for Texas A and M College, says that this advantage - of dissolving grease - is not so good in washing linoleum, paint or furniture. "Detergents draw out the oil. causing finishes to dry out," she points out. "Oil is an essential ingredient in linoleum and oil paint."

Even ordinary soap will have a drying effect on linoleum and paint and should be careefully rinsed off, Mrs. Claytor says. She particularly warns against the use of grease solvents on linoleum.

"One of the best ways to keep Claytor concludes, "is to wax it linoleum in good condition," Mrs. Claytor concludes, "is to wax it frequently. Wax restores the essential oils and puts a protective finish on either linoleum or furniture and should be used often."

#### **Navy Fireproofs Airplanes With New Hydrolubes**

#### Non-inflammable Fluids in Hydraulic Systems Check Causes of Fires

WASHINGTON .- Development of the first successful fireproof hydraulic fluid for aircraft use was announced by scientists of the naval research laboratory after four years' study and grueling service

They expect it not only to elimnate one of the most fruitful sources of crash and in-flight fires but possibly to serve also as a valuable extinguishing agent for blazes starting from other causes.

Paradoxically, the new agentspecificially designed to replace petroleum-base fluids now employed in airplane hydraulic systems-already has been adopted enthusiastically by other industries on a scale vastly exceeding even its maximum potential use in avia-

Foundries, machine shops and other plants utilizing hydraulically operated equipment near molten metal, open fires or other ignition sources, navy sources said, have been quick to see the advantage grades of which are now being marketed commercially for various

#### Have Water Base

These fluids are called "hydrolubes" by the naval researchers who compounded them, because of their water base. Their noninflammability, the experts say, simply ed. "There'll really be plenty to stems from "the common knowledge that water will not burn."

In addition to this basic ingredient, the new hydraulic fluid contains ethylene glycol to keep it from freezing: a brand-new "polymer' or thickening compound-viscosity stabilizer: lubricating agents, corrosion inhibitors and "an organic chemical to make soluble all the in-The antifreeze agent gredients." is the same as that used in many automobile radiators and the new aircraft hydraulic fluid is proof against freezing to 50 degrees below zero Fahrenheit.

#### Approved for Use

The navy announcement said that the hydrolube fluids had been ap proved for future use in its aircraft and "are currently being tested by the civil aeronautics administration for commercial airline use" while aditional tests to improve them still further are being conducted on an accelerated-service basis at the Naval Research Iaboratory in an airplane mock-up provided with a complete hydraulic system.

A. S. Koch, assistant civil areonautics administrator in charge of the aviation safety division, said exhaustive tests of new fluids would be made by the C. A. A. at Oklahoma City in a standard airline Douglas DC-4. Mandatory use of them by the industry has not yet been ordered, Koch added.

#### Universities Offer Free Scholarships

#### Many Require the Fulfillment Of Unusual Conditions

NEW YORK .- According to Clarence E. Lovejoy, in his "Complete Guide to American Colleges and Universities," more than 75,000 college students are eligible annually for scholarships in addition to the thousands more who win state scholarships and those who take advantage of army and navy educational opportunities.

Many of the awards, however, have novel conditions and stipulations. Since 1916, there have been several scholarships available at Harvard if your name is Murphy.

If your father worked on the Pennsylvania railroad you are eligible for a scholarship at Princeton and one of several others at the University of Pennsylvania. At Pennsylvania, too, there is a Coxe grant which provides a scholarship for a young man who fulfills the requirement that he come from the coal regions of Pennsylvania.

Ancestry plays a large part, too. If one of your ancestors fought in the Confederate army you may apply at Tulane for a scholarship. The Massachusetts Institute of Technology has scholarships for sons of officers of the regular army, navy. while daughters as well as guard, sons of army and navy officers are in line for Indiana university scholarships.

All you have to do is come from Vermont to be eligible for the Ellis scholarship at Columbia university. Morality comes into consideration at Dartmouth and several other institutions which stipulate that the student may not drink intoxicating consider smokers. Princeton has several funds for the education of 'pious youths for the ministry

There is hardly an important in dustry that doesn't offer scholarthanks to the Illinois Clay Manufac association. Juniors seniors who are interested in taking agricultural and dairying may ap ply for a \$200 scholarship at the Rhode Island State college thanks to Dr. Charles H. Hood. The W. 

#### **Publishers Say** Crime Comics Are for Adults

NEW YORK. - Controversy beween the Detroit Police department, which recently banned "crime" comic books, five of which have since been banned by the Indianapolis police, and the publishers of se books rages with undiminished ry. Both sides are standing firm their convictions.

Interviewed individually, these omic book publishers, without exception, claimed that their particular books were less objectionable than others banned. None denied that there are comic books that are 'obscene." "inflammatory." "vulgar," "inartistic" or all four.

Several, basing their self-defense on "freedom of the press," declared that because their books dealt with "true" crimes they are harmless, that they are written for adults and that the publisher is not responsible for the welfare of children who, hap-

Crime comic books, publishers said, have been brought out in quantity only in the last two years simply to satisfy the appetites of ex-"We do it by formula, not malice," one said bluntly. "A cop, a killer, a gun and a girl."

#### Cause of Investigation

Prosecutor James N. McNally of Detroit, interviewed by telephone, said that his comic book investigagun used in fake hold-ups. "We found." he said. "that the manufacturer advertised in comic books. We began looking into 350 of these books and ended up banning the 36 our censor bureau found most objectionable. The two distributing companies handling them willingly agreed that these books would no longer be sold. We therefore plan no criminal action against the publishers."

The day after McNally's action, Mayor Al Feeney of Indianapolis banned 5 of 260 books his special investigator had rounded up. He received the promise of cooperation

"So far," Mr. McNally said, "only one publisher has asked for a hearing. That is the National Comics group, publishers of Gangbuster Comics, which is temporarily removed from the banned list pending a hearing.
