



### Pills Make **Poor Meals**

LONDON. - Dr. Hellmuth Edhardt Heitz, one of the world's leading authorities on concentrated Mr. and Mrs. James Davis and foods, says future generations need daughter. not fear the advent of capsuled beefsteaks or pillbox strawberry shortcake

Heitz, who began experimenting with food concentrates nearly 20 years ago after getting the idea during a big game hunt, asserted that capsuled food could never be substituted for solids as a permanent diet.

However, he believes capsuled food has its place, and an important one, especially in an emergency.

The naturalized Briton, who studied medicine at the University of Vienna, is now the head of Allied laboratories, which manufactures emergency rations in tablet form at the rate of two million a week.

Heitz's ration is contained in a pill the size of a quarter, called Etagone. It was used during the war by the British merchant navy, commandos and ambulance units and now is being converted for peacetime.

Plans Large Scale Test.

The doctor said a large scale test would be conducted shortly in a famine area. He said Etagone also would be a fit luncheon for a harassed office worker.

"It is far healthier to have one badly made sandwich and suffer indigestion," he contended.

Heitz said Etagone, which will keep a man comfortably for five Mrs. Sallie Rogers, of Erick, and a half days without food or Oklahoma, is visiting Mrs. Mary water, comes in many flavors. Favorite flavor during the war with the British navy was a banana and caramel mixture.

Heitz said he would go to America to see about prospects for manufacturing Etagone there.

The scientist said he conducted many of the initial tests himself. He lived for five and a half days

"I had no thirst at all and slept better than usual," he said. He hopes to store enough energy in Etagone to last a man for one week, which he considers the maximum.

The tablets contain no moisture but are designed to prevent any feeling of thirst by helping the body make the best use of its water reserves. Etagone provides the equivof fresh meat protein and the same amount of minerals as a day's ordinary diet, with a half ounce of dextrin and ovolecithin.

The dose is four tablets a day.

### Woman's Death Ends Six-Year Vigil Over Hoarded Fortune

WARREN OHIO. - An aged woman, who lived in squalor amid a small fortune she guarded day and night with three revolvers for six years, died here and police were busy tabulating her wealth. Mrs. Carrie G. Mountain, a fragile 90-year-old retired house servant, died of the infirmities of old age in the ramshackle frame house where she had lived for 56

After her death police revealed she had spent every night of the last six years sleeping in a chair, guarding her wealth with three revolvers kept on a small table near-

Police said she died a few hours after her guardian, Cliff Bland, had deposited to her account \$23,000 in cash found hidden in old boxes in the house.

Mrs. Mountain had lived in her lonely house a few yards from the Warren business district, to all intents poverty-stricken. Friends said "she never ate much and wouldn't even spend money to keep warm in winter."

Not until the probate court ordered Bland to search her premises, was it known that Mrs. Mountain had any great amount of money. Bland and police quickly found more than \$15,000 in \$50 and \$100 bills hidden in a moldy shoe box in her bedroom.

### U. S. Seizes Fake Money

thirds of the \$3,094,000 in counterfeit American money seized in the last year was made in Europe, the secret service reported. It was the biggest volume of seizures since the service was created in 1865.

James J. Maloney, chief of the secret service, said in a report to John W. Snyder, secretary of the treasury, that over two-thirds of the imitation currency was grabbed at Marseilles, France.

Maloney reported that "by far the greatest enforcement problem" now is the theft and forgery of yovernment checks - mostly tax refunds-and savings bonds. More than 32,000 forged checks and 11,000 forged bonds were received for in vestigation.

The millions of taxpayers who expect refunds and those who regularly receive government checks for other purposes, were urged to watch their mail boxes carefully. Merchants were asked to demand positive identification before cash-

Make Big Haul.

Fake United States currency amounting to \$2,145,200 was seized in a large plant in Marseilles by U. S. secret service agents and French police. Twelve counterfeiters now await trial in French Other foreign seizures to-A-Dependency will be held to taled \$201,596. Only \$42,566 got into circulation here, mostly through immigrants who bought it in good faith overseas.

> Domestic counterfeiting also increased, but not alarmingly. Some \$747,434 in home - made bills and coins were captured. All but \$100,-000 worth was seized before it could be passed. The secret service arrested 2,278 persons in the year, including 1,964 for check and bond forgery and 158 for counterfeiting.

Other arrests included nine men in Florida and Georgia who proved also to be stolen-car racketeers. This haul brought in \$60,000 in counterfeit notes as well as a quantity of stolen New Jersey auto-registration certificates. The defendants were sentenced to terms ranging from three to seven years each. Question Suspect.

One bond-forgery case developed odd quirks. Maloney related these details: Agents from Los Angeles to what he knew about some United States savings bonds stolen in Avondale, Colo., in a safe burglary.

He thought the agents knew all about his career of crime and confessed a trail of burglaries and bond forgeries over most of the United States. Both men are awaiting trial.

Like the Spaniards, French bull fighters wear gorgeous comic opera costumes. But they do not use such weapons as short swords and giltedged spikes. They just mark the bulls with colored "Cocardes," which are not stuck into the animal but are simply pasted on his hide with glue.

France's bull fight fans now object to this and demand the same type of fights that are held in Spain -including the killing of the bull.

WASHINGTON. - Bluebeard's Castle, famed hotel in the Virgin islands, is for rent or sale, Secretary of the Interior J. A. Krug

It is already a money-making proposition. Secretary Krug said the present lessees, who have been paying the department of the interior an annual rental of \$3,000 plus 50 per cent of the net profits, paid \$18,000 in such fees last year. However, the department wants the project expanded for the good of the island tourist industry.

The hotel was built in 1934, as a \$300,000 public works administration project, around an ancient watchtower at Charlotte Amalie, on St. Thomas island. The tower, according to legend, was Caribbean headquarters for a pirate known as Bluebeard.
