New Insulin Taps Found

States alone requiring insulin to stay alive, and with growing demand indicating that world need may outrun present supplies, the World Health organization report ed that research discoveries in Germany offer the promise of a 30 per

Dr. Brock Chisholm, executive secretary of the organization's interim commission, told a press conference here that the German work, which still must be checked, in volves a new method of collecting pancreas glands without refrigera tion. It is from the pancreas glands slaughtered cattle, sheep and pigs that medical insulin now is ob-

Technical reports to the interim commission in Geneva termed the discovery "of the utmost importance," although particulars were not available here. But the reports noted that this method would enable recovery of the glands from small slaughter houses which now lack cold-storage facilities.

Facilities Not Available.

In New York medical circles it was pointed out that much of the world's cattle killing takes place on farms or other places under conditions heretofore precluding collection and storage of pancreas glands. This includes much of the United States and most of Latin America. It was speculated the German work might have developed a technique for fixing the insulin content in pancreas glands chemically, so it would not be destroyed in transportation.

The commission is collecting further data on the insulin research, which was reported from the American and British zones of Germany. Occupation authorities in the Britzone reported other research had found that codfish pancreas glands were extremely rich in insulin, although at present the cost

Annual Production The world's annual insulin production now is estimated at more than 11 billion international units, with

Import needs were put at nearly two billion units a year, with exportable surpluses of only 1,400 mil-The resulting deficit, the reports said, could be met only by increased American production and by the new extractive methods, which are being sought particularly by Finland, Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia.

Lions and tigers have been mated after reaching maturity. The German animal expert, Carl Hagenbeck, experimented successfully in the field but his method was to rear the lion and tiger together from cubhood.

Some of the resulting progeny were sent to zoos in England and this country, but no case is on record of a successful mating in the United States. The hybrid offspring are variously called "tiglions," "ligers" and similarly coined terms.

Naylor took nearly 10 months to get his pair together.

U. S. Soeks Whereabouts of 12,000 'Lost' Farm Hands

WASHINGTON-The United States is looking for about 12,000 "lost" farm hands.

They were among more than 300,000 agricultural workers brought in from Mexico and the West Indies during the war and since to help meet a farm worker shortage.

Recruited under direction of their respective governments, they received permits to enter this country for only a specified period of time. They were supposed to return to their respective countries after the

harvesting season. So far neither the agriculture department nor the immigration service has been able to find the 12,000. Most of those missing are from



Weekly Gets A Big Scoop

paper scored a resounding beat on one of the biggest news stories of

the year in Virginia. It printed an account of a \$45,000 bank robbery, the chase and arrest

it happened. The subscribers of the Norton Coalfield Progress, a modest but growing "country weekly," were reading about the bank robbery before many of the large newspapers and radio stations in the area knew it had happened.

It wasn't one of those stories that happens right in front of the newspaper, either. The bank was robbed in Pound, Va., 20 miles to the north over rugged mountain roads.

It was shortly after noon in Norton on the day that the Coalfield Progress was to go to press. The paper had been made up with accounts of meetings and society items laboriously gathered from the clubs and churches and PTA through

"General Flunky."

Carroll Tate, a lanky, dark haired young man who calls himself "general flunky" for the paper and who is its reporter and business manager, was relaxing in the office.

A pressman, just returning from lunch, walked in and remarked

"We'd better throw out the front

Then he added, still casually, "the bank's been robbed at Pound." Tate jumped to life. He telephoned Pound and confirmed what the pressman had heard a state

Tate drove the 20 miles to Pound in a hurry over the winding roads. He interviewed Ed Barr, the bank cashier, who had been ordered into a vault by two armed men who neglected to close the vault door tightly enough to make it click.

Escapes From Vault. Barr said he got out of the vault and shouted an alarm. He fired a pistol at one of the bandits and wounded him on the bank steps. The two leaped into a car driven by another man and drove off.

As Tate finished talking to Barr, state troopers brought in the three men for Barr to identify. The money was recovered.

Tate sped back to Norton, wrote his story and soon the presses of the weekly rolled with a red hot story and a banner line on the front

"Big town newspapermen will call it luck, but it was the biggest thrill of my life getting that story,' says Tate, who will become owner of the Coalfield Progress in a few

'Farm of Tomorrow' Reduces Labor

MADISON, WIS .- A farmer's life will be much easier, on the pushbutton farm of the future.

University of Wisconsin scientists have set up a model electricallyoperated "farm of tomorrow" that cuts today's farmer's time and labor some 30 per cent.

The project started when university scientists found that more than 56 per cent of the average Wisconsin farmer's work consists of daily

And 41 per cent of that time, they found, is concentrated in the dairy

The university got a grant of \$100,000 from the Wisconsin Utilities association, took over a 140acre farm near Madison and went

That was two years ago. Now the model farm is on display, showing farmers how to get many of their chores done by merely pushing a button.

For example, cow stalls are kept clean by paddles on a moving chain that sweeps the gutters. When the cow needs food, silage

is brought down through an electric suction chute to a feed cart. The cart is pushed in front of the cow, measures the feed and throws it in the mangers. A foot-operated lever opens doors

into the milk house so the farmer can enter it with full milk pails in both hands. In the hay mow, warm, dry air

from a ventilating fan is forced through green hay for curing. Tests prove artifically dried hay produces more milk than field-dried hay that has been soaked with

Now Growing Up

Patsy Li, the little Chinese girl who six years ago mysteriously turned up in the midst of the war on Guadalcanal, is studying in a Singapore school. But she hasn't forgotten her days

with the United States marines on Guadalcanal. She hasn't had a chance. Newspaper stories up and and down the coast have kept the memory alive for her. Little Patsy, like many a young-

ster her age, is limelight-conscious. But in her case this threatens to become a serious personality problem, according to her guardian. That's why there are to be no more interviews. A lot of American marines who

were on Guadalcanal will remember Patsy and wish her happily over the rocky road of adolescence. Sick With Malaria.

They will remember her as the 6-year-old, very sick with malaria, who one day in the heat of battle was carried by natives to the American lines. She had been found, wounded and very ill, in an abandoned Japanese camp.

The marines adopted her and she became famous as "Patsy of Guadalcanal.'

Patsy had been separated from her mother, Mrs. Ruth Li of Singapore, when the ship on which they were escaping from Malaya was torpedoed off the Netherlands East Indies in February, 1942. Mrs. Li was rescued. No trace was found of her child at the time.

Three thousand miles from the scene of the sinking, on Guadalcanal an American correspondent wrote up the story of the little Chinese girl.

Sister Reads Story. In New York, Mrs. Ruth Li's

sister, a cancer research worker, read the story and noted that the little girl answered to the name of Patsy Li-the name of the little niece she lost in the torpedoing off the Dutch East Indies. She wrote to her sister. It was a clew-and the mother

flew to the orphanage in the New Hebrides where the girl had been placed and recognized Patsy as her' missing daughter.

How she traveled the 3,000 miles from the place where the ship sank to Guadalcanal, nobody knows. Probably the Japanese fished her out of the sea, adopted her and brought her with them to Guadacanal. It's still a mystery to everyone, including Patsy.

Today in Singapore a growingup Patsy often asks: "Have you ever met an American marine? They're wonderful."

The memorial bears a replica of the right hand of Capt. Jonathan Walker, with the initials SS, for 'slave stealer," on the palm. Walker is believed the only person ever branded by a federal court

Walker was arrested in 1844 off the coast of Key West, Fla., while taking seven runaway slaves to the Bahama islands and freedom.

He already had a price on his head for numerous anti-slavery deeds. Many slaves escaped to Mexico with his help.

The court, therefore, was severe. Walker was fined, sentenced to a year's solitary confinement and

In 1846 John Greenleaf Whittier immortalized Walker in his poem, "The Branded Hand."

After the Civil war, the colorful captain retired to Lake Harbor, near Muskegon, He died there April 30, 1878.
