## Hike Will Be Made January 1st in Postage

In accordance with an act of the 80th Congress, postal rates will be increased, effective January 1,

third-class matter, fourth class, cessed on a glass plate, will disspecial delivery, money order fees, color from exposure to varying postal notes, domestic registered | concentrations of carbon monoxide. mail and registered receipts. There will be no increase on ordinary first class letter mail or

on the government postal cards. Air mail will go from five cents to six cents, with an 8-ounce limit. Under the new prices, postal cards may be air-mailed for four cents. In other words, you place a three-cent stamp on a government postal and send it via air mail, marking it 'air-mail.'

Special delivery will jump from 13 cents to 15 cents, up to two not only as a carbon monoxide depounds; from two pounds to ten tector but also as a fire detection pounds, 20 to 25 cents, and over instrument. 10 pounds, from 25 to 28 cents.

Money order fees will be cut from eight to four divisions, with new fees of 10c, 15, 25c and 35c, an increase of four cents in each division.

Postal notes will increase from 5c to 8c up to \$10.00.

Fourth class, or parcel post, will be increased from 8c to 10c for the first pound; third zone (Dallas Fort Worth, an example) from 10c to 13c first pound; 5th zone (example) from 12 to 15c.

The new variety, known officially as Texas 51, has been under test for two years, according to Ralph Michael, in charge of the Gilmer laboratory.

Texas 51 has an upright habit of growth-it looks something like peanut plant-and can be culvated right up to the day of harvest, long after grass and weeds have come in to rob the vine types of moisture and fer-

HONOLULU.-A modest 26-yearold navy doctor has set out for Tinian island, in the Marianas, to start the first leprosy control effort Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Smithee, of in the Pacific trust territory. Clovis, New Mexico, are the par-

Lieutenant (j. g.) Jack W. Millar, of Palo Alto, Calif., volunteered for the assignment on tiny Tinian island, where the navy is completing construction of a temporary leprosarium with facilities for treating 100 patients, natives of the Marianas, Marshalls, Carolines, Palaus and Yap.

Until now about their only treatment was to be segregated as out-

casts by their neighbors. In preparation for his new job, the young doctor spent a month and a half on Molokai island, in Hawaii, working with Dr. Norman R. Sloan, director of the famed Kapaulapa leprosy settlement.

Dr. Millar believes the islands of the trust territory provide a fertile field in the treatment of

"I don't know how many lepers there are in the islands," he said, "but I think the number will exceed 500 and may possibly be as high as 1,000.

#### No Diagnoses Made

Extensive clinical diagnosis of cases on the 150 populated islands has not been made, he said, but there are 60 known cases on Yap, another nine on Guam and some

In all, there are 50,000 natives on the Pacific islands, which cover an area of about two million square

The most heavily populated island is Truk, former Japanese naval stronghold. It has more than 10,000 inhabitants; Saipan and Ponape each have about 5,000.

Tinian has no native population. It was a B-29 base during the war and is now occupied by only a small naval force.

With two naval medical corps men working with him, Dr. Millar said, "We shall study all types of leprosy in all stages; our work will be both experimental and practi-

#### Has No Fear Dr. Millar has no fear of con

tracting the disease.

"Leprosy is not easily transmitted," he explained. "Medical science has learned that it is a disease of childhood and can be contracted only after a long period of contact. Transmission even by actual inoculation has not been exten-

He is eager to get started in his new assignment, which will extend over two years.

These checks will be made, in most cases, by native medical practitioners, who are to be trained for their work.

Dr. Thorek was summoned immediately when the woman's heart stopped. He made an incision over the heart. He made two other incisions in swift succession - one which pierced the diaphragm and another to cut through the pericar-

dium which surrounds the heart. Slowly, he began massaging the heart with the rhythm of a normal pulse. Seconds later the heart was beating feebly. He continued. The heart beat gradually became stronger.

## Medical Men Deny Charges Of Planned Doctor Shortage

CHICAGO.-Members of the medical profession struck back at critics who have implied that forces are at work in this country to create a shortage of from 30,000 to 50,-

000 physicians by 1960. The American Medical journal cited Dr. Thomas Parran, surgeon general of the public health service, as author of the shortage statistics which it said recently were re-emphasized by Oscar R. Ewing, federal security administrator.

"Actually the number of physicians is increasing at a relatively more rapid rate than is the general population," the journal said. "Ten years ago statistics indicated one active physician for every 800 per-

sons in this country. "At present there is one physician for every 760 persons. By 1960 there will be one physician for every 700 persons or fewer. More physicians currently are being trained in this country than at any time in our history. All indications point to a still further increase in the number of physicians graduated each
