

Gold Mines Idled By Pegged Prices And High Costs

DENVER. - Gold mining in this important mining state verges on near-collapse. This is evident in operating statistics, which show only 230 mines being worked, compared with more than 1,000 before the war. A contributing factor, it is acknowledged, has been the 47 per cent increase in the cost of labor, processing and materials.

The gold mine operators also blame these factors: (1) The wartime government order closing mines which produce only gold, and (2) the government-pegged price of \$35 an ounce for gold.

The wartime order hit hardest in the Cripple Creek area not far from Colorado Springs, for the mines there produce only gold. Elsewhere -at Leadville, Alma and San Juan, for example-other minerals such as silver, lead, zinc and copper are found mixed with gold. The government-ordered close-down drew miners from the Cripple Creek area to the diggings in other parts of the state.

Cripple Creek's difficulties were magnified by the fact that many gold mines there are unable at present to offer high enough wages to lure these workers back into the fold. The multi-mineral diggings are able to pay costs through the sale of base metals, leaving the gold as profit.

Mining Wages Are Low

Cripple Creek's mining wages are the lowest in the state, averaging \$1 an hour. This compares with \$11.50 a day in nonferrous mining and \$10 a day in coal mining. As a result, only a dozen or so mines at Cripple Creek are now operating, many of them at a loss. In boom days the area boasted over 500 active mines. Many of the mines are kept open

simply because this is less costly than re-opening at some future date, and repairing the deterioration which takes place in a closed mine. The Golden Cycle mill at Cripple Creek furnishes an example of cost.

Its ore last year averaged \$11 a ton in gold, Some Mines Pay Off

The Melvina, at once-famous Gold Hill, shipped out ore assaying \$300 a ton, and old Glorieta near Victor disgorged ore containing \$840 a ton in gold.

The Kicking Horse, near Boulder, sent ore assaying \$366 a ton to the mills. But these are merely the rich strikes of which every gold miner dreams.

The \$35-an-ounce pegged price, according to mining interests, amounts to government discrimination against American producers, since the open world market.



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
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
