Texas farmers received about two billion dollars last year from the sale of crops, livestock and livestock products. This is pretty big business, and is becoming very competitive. Such economic conditions as these, as well as others, have shown many farmers the importance of planning their yearly operations, and to check up from one year to the next.

Farm records serve as a basis for locating the weak and strong points in farm operations-a kind of mirror that reflects a whole year's business. And, too, records will point out any unsatisfactory performances on the farm before more serious losses occur, says

When it comes to getting credit from loan agencies, farm records show these agencies the possibilities of the farm and give a list of the assets-in inventory formlocated on the farm.



### **Fake Money** Floods U.S.

WASHINGTON .- Two huge counterfeit rings, one in New York and one in Chicago, are flooding the nation with bogus \$10 and \$20 bills representing millions of dollars.

Disclosure of the existence of two rings was made by the Secret Service after the Federal Reserve Bank of New York announced that a "substantial number" of nearly perfect copies of bank notes were circulated throughout the Greater New York area in the biggest counterfeiting operation in the United States in 14

Bank officials warned shoppers, merchants and commercial banks to watch sharply for the bogus bills.

Rings Are Separate The New York bank officials said fake money also had been found in Chicago, but a secret service spokesman here said there was no connection between the two operations. He said the \$10 and \$20 bills passed out by the Chicago gang are not like those discovered in New York. If the two rings were working together, there would be no point in their using different plates with which to print their "money."

The Secret Service said the spurious New York bills had not been circulated beyond the New York area as far as it knew, but the Chicago ring had outlets in nearly

all parts of the country. The Chicago gang was said to have been active for several months. At first its product was found only in the Midwest. However, evidence of its operations has been found in Pacific Coast States, along the entire Eastern Seaboard and in

the South. Relatively little of the bogus money had turned up in Chicago, officials said. Two passers were under arrest, but the ring can not be broken until the printing machinery is discovered. While the New York bills bear the symbol of the Chicago Federal Reserve stamp, printed in Chicago, a Secret Service spokesman said.

First in New York

The federal reserve bank in New York said commercial banks were taking daily losses from receipts of the fake bills. The counterfeit currency first was detected in New York when employees of the reserve bank there were sorting notes issued originally in Chicago for return to Chicago. The commercial banks which sent

the fake money to the Federal reserve bank, not realizing that it was no good, were "out" the amount represented, a spokesman for the New York federal reserve said. He said that the member commercial banks were losing money every day because they could not trace the counterfeit currency.

He said the "mo turning up in substantial quantities in New York. He declined to reveal ow much had been found, but said fake money had been coming in ev-

Officials estimated the amount of bogus money in the hands of the public might run in to "millions of dollars." They said the last big counterfeiting ring, operated by 'Count" Victor Lustig in 1944, flooded the midwest with \$2,500,000.

"Did you enjoy the joke?" asked the judge. "Did you get a good laugh out of it?" "No, I didn't," replied Miss Clark.

"At the time I thought it was funny, but before I could have a laugh the policeman arrested me."

The probation officer testified that she found Miss Clark "to be a bit wild-a little out of hand." The judge, who said he would like to find out more about the young woman who had the faculty of getting into minor difficulties, remanded her in custody for a week

### 'Live' Ammunition Found In Army Post Scrap Pile

HOUSTON, TEX .- When army officials at the San Jacinto depot learned that a large percentage of "live ammunition" was among the steel scrap shipments being received there, a busy hustle resulted as depot employees set to work to render the ammunition harmless.

Col. James W. Frazer said the shipments contained about 5 per cent "live" rounds. The ammunition ranged from 37 mm to 8-inch shells. It was believed the "live" rounds came from an army camp

WASHINGTON .- David E. Lilienthal, atomic energy commission chairman, believes that an experimental atomic energy plant might be producing electricity within three years. This first plant wou'd be purely experimental, he added, but within 20 years a sizable percentage of electricity would be produced by

Lilienthal denounced those who, he said, were trying to play down the atomic bomb as "just another explosive, another bomb."

"At first there arose a cult of doom, of dire things to come," he asserted. "We were told that atomic attack could mean a one-night

"Now it appears the pendulum is swinging to the opposite extreme. It is being asserted by some military men and some scientists that the atomic bomb is just another bomb, a super blockbuster, a piece of ord-

"This down-grading of the atomic bomb is the attitude of the Krem-

To accept this extreme could have these results, Lilienthal said: Revive the idea that atomic bomb stockpiling should be controlled by the military. Give the impression that the Uni-

ted States plan for international atomic control was "quite sense-Give the impression that the at-

#### Fish, Wildlife Service Plans Recipes for Cooks

WASHINGTON. - It may seem alien to a government agency with such virile responsibilities as the management of fur seal herds and the destruction of predatory animals, but the fish and wildlife service of the interior department works up recipes for the housewife. Its kitchen-counseling activities are part of a plan to make America more fish-conscious.

In line with this program, the service's branch of commercial fisheries maintains a spotless, well-equipped test kitchen at its technological laboratory on the campus of the University of Maryland at College Park.

The kitchen is operated by four home economists who concoct and test fish recipes and then distribute them in printed form to restaurants, homemakers, food editors,

and even to army mess sergeants. The fish and wildlife service home economists also put on fish cookery demonstrations for women's groups and set up displays and exhibits at national conventions and meetings of restaurant, home economics, dietetics, grocery, public health and food service groups.

This information should be included in addition to the clearly legible, complete name and address of the veteran and the extremely important claim number.

Student-veterans and job trainees who follow this advice will expedite any action on their case by VA and avoid delays often caused by lack of sufficient information contained in correspondence from veterans.

Veterans Administration has conducted a training program for corrective therapists at the Winter VA hospital in Topeka, Kansas, to broaden their understanding of the needs and problems of neuropsychiatric patients.

The course—the sixth given for corrective therapy personnel in VA hospitals-was a joint program of the Division of Physical Medicine Rehabilitation of VA's Department of Medicine and Surgery, and the Division of Adjunctive Therapy of the Institute
