FRANKFORT, GERMANY .- Of 120,000 forced workers in uranium mines operated by Russia near the

Administrative offices for the mines are in Aue, Herr Walter stated. The prisoners are distributed through pits in Annaberg, Niederschlema, Oberschlema and Johann Georgenstadt, working eight hours daily under the worst possible conditions.

Although earning 600 to 700 East marks monthly, he declared, they are not only charged for their scanty food but also must contribute to the Russian supervisors, leaving them net earnings for the year of from 120 to 700 East marks. Espionage on the part of Soviet agents scattered through the camps exaggerates difficulties for the workers, a large number of whom were arrested for refusing to join the Social Unity party as in his own case.


Several U.S. Scientists Suffer Radiation Effects

NEWTON, MASS. - Radiation from atom-smashing cyclotrons has almost blinded several American scientists, according to Dr. Shields Warren, head of the medical department of the atomic energy commission.

"About five" scientists, whom he did not name, apparently had developed cataracts of the eye as a result of the effects of radiation on the lens, he declared yesterday. However, he stressed, that "there is no evidence at the present time that they were working on the immediate problems of atomic energy."

For safety's sake, Dr. Warren said, the commission is checking to determine if any of the scientists had been engaged in work other than university or similar projects which might involve

proximity to atomic piles. He emphasized that there was considerably more danger of radiation leakage in research involving cyclotrons than in the atomic projects of the United States government and its contractors where, he addel, "the hazards, as far as we can tell from present experience, are extermely slight."

There are a lot vaults. One is a gold medal which was supposed to have gone to a man who did a lot of heroic work in fighting an epidemic of yellow fever in the tropics. The name of the man isn't on the record, but the medal inscribed to "An Unsung Hero" was turned over to the vault keepers.

The buttons and medals and bonds keep coming in. The treasury is about to throw in the sponge -or move to a larger building.

#### Pope Says Apostle Peter Buried in "Eternal City"

ROME. - Pope Pius, in an address to 6,000 Rome students, said that the burial place of the Apostle Peter "is and was under the cupola of St. Peter's Church."

Archaeological findings "demon-strate that," the Pontiff said. It had been anticipated that the Pope, sooner or later, would affirm the truth of the tradition that St. Peter, martyred in Rome, was buried on the site of the world's

largest Christian church. However, he had been expected to delay the disclosure until sometime during the Holy Year, open-

ing next Christmas Eve. The Pope made his statement about St. Peter's burial place quite casually, in the course of an address, whose topic was the duty of the young to prepare themselves for "responsible offices" in


