



Onion rings	margarine
1/2 cup chill sauce	1/2 lb. American Pastcurized Process Cheese

Toast the bread on one side and spread the untoasted side of each slice with mayonnaise. Top with onion rings.

Mix the chill sauce with the green pepper which has been sauled in the butter or margarine. Spread two tablespoons of this mixture over each sandwich.

Cover with a slice of the cheese cut lengthwise of the loaf. Place in a moderate oven, 350°, or under low broiler heat until the cheese



Liberty-Loving Osceola **Can't Find Resting Place**

CHARLESTON, S. C .- Osceola, who fought for Indian living space in Florida during his lifetime, still hasn't found a final resting place in his homeland 111 years after his death

But efforts are under way to return his bones to Collier county, Florida, where 500 survivors of the once-mighty Seminole nation revere Osceola as the George Washington of his people.

Under a weathered slab in a weedy plot the famous Indian warrior lies on a spit of sand reaching into the Atlantic near Charles.

Around his grave rise the crumbling earthworks of Fort Moultrie. Osceola died in the fortress in 1838, a year after his capture by Gen. Thomas Jessup, who violated a truce to take his prize.

Osceola's protagonists-historians are divided on whether he was a great warrior or an unprincipled savage-say he died of a broken heart.

So before he wets his sponge Philippi demands to know when the fight happened, how and where and by whom the blows were delivered and what if any weapons were em ployed.


