. C. Hill Irriga- Foundations, Roofs Damaged **By Severe Winter Weather**

Record winter storms, high winds and run-off water from sudden spring thaws have taken a heavy toll of farm buildings. Sur-veys indicate that the greatest damage has been done to founda-tions and to roofs. tions and to roofs.

Inadequate yard drainage is primarily responsible for washed-out foundations, according to J. L. Strahan, a member of the Amer-Stranan, a member of the Amer-ican Society of Agricultural En-gineers. He points out that run-off water quickly pulls soil away from a foundation, particularly if the wall does not extend below the frost line. Buildings which cattle should not be chlored to re settle should not be allowed to re-main in this condition, Mr. Strahan says, but should be squared up quickly. A building allowed to stand in a wracked condition for a period of time is difficult to re-

Clean Gutters, Downspouts Once the building is squared up, steps need to be taken to avoid the same trouble in the future. Mr. Strahan recommends: 1—Grading the ground around buildings so that the water will flow away from foundations. 2—Making sure gutters and downspouts are to be taken to sound shelter.




Before operating on the patient the doctors experimented on three monkeys

One of the things about the patient was that some of the useless muscles in his neck bulged out when he tried to swallow, obstructing the throat passage. The doctors bound these mus cles with a strip of thick, tough sheathing tissue which normally covers the main bundles of blood vessels and nerves in the neck. The other main difficulty was that the patient's Adams apple would not rise. This is one of the important movements in swal-

Surgeons Split Muscle

The surgeons made a lengthwise split in a muscle which runs from the back of the head to the base of the tongue and the chin. This muscle normally retracts the Part of the muscle was tongue. left for the tongue. The other part was tied to the Adam's apple, restoring its ability to rise. The patient was afraid to try his rebuilt throat at first, but now is swallowing normally, the doctors said. The new operation may help

Navy Official Chides "Gadget War" Beliefs

WHITE OAK, MD .- The assistant secretary of the navy for air, John Nicholas Brown, has chided scientists for spreading the idea that wars might be won easily with gadgets and "extraordinary" weapons.

"The ability of a human being to survive the blows of his enemies. in whatever form delivered. is immense." he said in a speech for the dedication of the central unit of a new \$35,000,000 navy ordnance laboratory.

"His capacity not only to survive, but his faculty of continuing to fight, is amazing," Brown continued. "The facility with which he finds means to counter the most highly developed machines of warfare is discouraging.

"The idea of war easily won by means of extraordinary weapons is an old one and very appealing. It is an extremely dangerous concept to propagate. I fear it may tend to give our people an idea of war very far indeed from that justified by the facts as we know them.

"It must be confessed that much of the misapprehension regarding the nature of war stems from commentaries by men whose knowledge of science vastly exceeds their expe-rience in the swill actualities of Phone 12





Pineapple Slice halves Soften the 2 tablespoons of gelatin in the 1/2 cup cold water. Dissolve over hot water, and add to the apricot nectar blended with the salt and lemon juice. Chill. When the aspic begins to thicken add the crushed pineapple. Pour half of this mixture into an 8½-inch ring mold which has been brushed with salad oil. Chill until firm.

Blend the salad dressing into the cream cheese. Add celery and pecans. Soften 2 teaspoons of gelatin in the ½ cup water. Dissolve over hot water and add to the cheese mixture. Spread this mixture over the firm apricot aspic. Chill.

Pour the remaining apricot aspic over the cream cheese layer and chill again.

County Agent Charley Reed of Claude told the conference an airplane had been used in his county to spray 2.4-D four years in succession on bindweed and that the operator of the farm says the project has been a profitable The formulation will reach into the taproot but not the lateral roots of the bindweed but continual and successive applications will eventually kill the nuisance plant, the agent believes.

County Agent Art Bralley of Potter county cited an instance where 300 acres of volunteer wheat, about to be plowed under, was saved when an airplane was used to spray it with 2,4-D, which killed out the abundant growth of big weeds. The farmer paid out \$100 for the spraying job and harvested \$6,000 worth of wheat.

Bralley also cited the fact that "the fight on bindweed is very encouraging." His talk had followed reports from Park Supt.
