

Cash help for the old folks runs into millions. Before the 1949 legislative sessions began, about 2,500,-000 men and women were getting such aid. The average payment for the United States as a whole was The monthly total topped 100 million dollars.



Traffic Noise Tolerated More than Industry's

Although traffic noise generally is more intense than industrial noise, individuals consider it less objectionable, George Bonvallet, associate physicist at Armour Re-search Foundation of Illinois Institute of Technology, told the annual meeting of the Acoustical Society of America.

Bonvallet listed two factors which led to his conclusion: "1. The public may tolerate publie transportation noise on the incorrect basis that it cannot be re-

"2. Traffic noise, disregarding automobile horne and clanging trolley gonge, ingreases in intensity then decreases when the source is near the listener. Industrial noise. on the other hand, often changes abruptly. Generally it starts and stops suddenly and may be objectionable because of its characteristic quality recognizable in forging hammers, steam exhaust blasts. traveling cranes, whistles, bells,

"Factory noise outside plants is not as loud as it is reputed to be," Bonvallet said. "The few plants that make noise have given a bad reputation to industry in general." Bonvallet pointed out that only about 6 per cent of industrial noise could be considered objectionably intense on the basis of his preliminary studies.

Overfire Jets Abate Smoke

Improvement in furnace performance and smoke abatement have been shown on all types of Mrs. M. B. Self Sunday afterstoker-fired and hand-fired furnaces by the use of overfire jets, William S. Major, development engineer for Bituminous Coal Research, Inc., Pittsburgh, reported in a fuels session of The American Society of Mechanical Engineers. He said maximum benefits from jets are most likely to occur on spreader-stoker fired furnaces. The use of jets has not only been effective in substantially reducing smoke density, Mr. Major declared, but it has increased boiler and furnace efficiency, reduced soot and slag deposits on boiler and economizer surfaces, reduced both the quantity and carbon content of the cinder carryover, shortened the flame and reduced the final temperatures when surfaces are of the same degree of cleanliness and enabled furnaces to operate with slightly lower excess air without unburned combustible gases.

Confidence men put expensive dials on cheap watches, tell a hard luck story at some bar, and stick their customers with a sorry bargain, said Ralph H. Young, La Crosse, president of the Wisconsin board of examiners in watchmak-

Young urged passage of a bill to increase the examination fee for a watchmaker certificate from \$15 to \$25 and a like increase in the cost of certificates to out of state watchmakers. The bill also would require sellers of used watches with no established business place (bars included) to file an invoice with the clerk of the county in which the sale was made. It also would increase the pay of members of the examining board from \$10 to \$15 a

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

documents are the four oldest manuscripts of the Old Testament known to date. Valued at more than a million dollars, they were brought secretly to this country early this

the entire Book of the Prophet Isaiah as it appears in the Bible, a commentary on the Book of Habakkuk, and a manual of discipline for a Judaic sect.

Experts say they were written 100 years before Christ-1,100 years before the date assigned to the oldest Hebrew Bible scroll previously

Sale Date Soon

An authoritative source, who declined use of his name, said the treasure would go on the block shortly. It is owned by St. Mark's Syrian Orthodox convent in Jeru-

Dr. F. W. Albright, professor of Semitic languages at Hopkins and one of the nation's top archaeologists, first established the authenticity of the scrolls from photographs sent to him.

Since then he has examined the originals. He reported:

During the past few weeks any possible doubt about the age and authenticity of the scrolls has been He disclosed also that the docu-

ments were sent to the Metro-politan Museum of Art in New York. There chemists reportedly are working over one scroll whose condition has prevented its being unrolled.

St. Mark's was damaged badly in the recent fighting between Israeli and Arab forces in the Holy Land. It expects to get repair money from the sale of the manuscripts.

U. S. May Buy The hope is that the U. S. Government may buy them. Among interested groups, however, is Yale University.

The find, whose worth to the Christian-Jewish world has been termed incalculable, was brought to America by Athanasius Yeshue Samuel, Syrian archbishop of Jerusalem and Trans-Jordan and Orthodox apostolic delegate to the United

The documents were already in the U. S., it was disclosed, when dispatches March 18 reported them hidden and guarded in Syrian homes to prevent possible damage or loss in Palestine fighting.

NEW . YORK .- Industrial representatives have joined with New York city officials in issuing a warning concerning disposal of burned-out fluorescent lamps.

At a conference called by the department of health and sanitation, it was said that broken fluorescent tubes may create health haz-The tubes-of which 200 million

are said to be in use throughout the nation-are reported coated on the inside with a phosphor which usually contains beryllium, a toxic substance. It was said that skin cuts from

broken tubes might cause a condition known as granuloma, a benign skin tumor. There also is a danger in inhaling dust from bro-

The conference, including representatives of firms which man-ufacture the tubes, unanimously adopted this list of precautions for disposing of burned-out tubes: 1. Keep discarded tubes away

2. Never break tubes or place tubes in incinerator or open con-tainers in the street.

3. Deliver tubes directly to refuse 4. Should a tube be broken, sweep up fragments and wrap them in heavy paper. Never handle broken fragments without gloves. 5. If cut by a broken tube, con-
