In that connection let us quote the following extracts taken from Texas' laws relating to the public's behavior in time of a fire:

Sec. 100: Following fire apparatus prohibited: The driver of any vehicle other than one on official business shall not follow any fire apparatus traveling in response to a fire alarm closer than five hundred (500) feet or drive the block where the fire aparatus has stopped to answer a fire

Sec. 101: Crossing fire hose: No driver of a street car or vehicle shall drive over an unprotected hose of a fire department when laid down on any street, private driveway, or street car track, to be used at any fire or alarm of fire, without, the consent of the





Thomas J. Hamilton, director of physical education at the University of Pittsburgh, advocated that colleges and high schools give more attention to "toughening" youngsters.

Hamilton, also former football coach at the United States naval academy, spoke at Denison university as ground was broken for a new physical education and community center.

"Every day," he said, "we add more luxuries and labor-saving devices to our American life, and the result is that less and less is being demanded physically of all of us.

"It is practically impossible for the average boy of these days to get the hardening exercise from the work or charges that used to be required from every lad. Our present-day civilization offers little of the toughening and soul-testing experiences that tempered the steel of our pioneer ancestors' characters.'

Hamilton pointed out that in the early stages of World War II, until examiners eased up, 46 per cent of the draftees were rejected for physical unfitness. This was the same rate experienced in World War L he added.

He remarked that since the war he could see little improvement in the physical education system, and added it was evident that "again America has missed the boat."

#### Johnson Withdraws Gag **On Armed Service News**

WASHINGTON .-- Secretary of defense Johnson's controversial "Di-rective No. 1" has been withdrawn with an official denial that it was ever intended as a "gag" on members of the armed services. However, military personnel were pointedly reminded that existing regulations still place restrictions on what they may write or say in

William Frye, public-relations chief for the secretary of defense, issued the cancellation order yesterday.

Frye offered this explanation for the kill order: The directive is no longer required because the information and security-review sections of the armed forces now are being consolidated.

He was not available immediately to explain exactly why that consolidation changed the picture to permit lifting the regulation.

Cairo or Washington? CAIRO .- The question whether the weather is hotter in the summer in Washington or Cairo has become a political issue of some importance. It has put in doubt the government's departure from Cairo for Alexandria for the sum-

#### **Professor Wins Damage Suit** For 5 Million From Uncle Sam

WASHINGTON .- Louis H. Crook, a Catholic university professor, won a five million dollar patent suit

The court of claims unanimously upheld his claim to the invention of an ignition shielding system used by the government during the war to prevent electrical interference with radios in planes, automobiles, tanks and other vehicles.

Crook, 61, dean of the school of aeronautics at Catholic university, owns 25 per cent of the patent which expired in 1944. The rest belongs to Herman Jakobsson and Samuel B. Pack, deceased lawyers. #### **Air Force Completes New Jet Fighter Test**

LOS ANGELES. - The United States air force has announced that its newest jet fighter, the Lockheed F-90, has successfully completed its first test flight at the Muroc flight test base.


Tony Levier, Lockheed's chief engineering test pilot, kept the needle-nosed, swept-wing plane aloft for 37 minutes. The Air Force revealed no statistical data on the new fighter, but Mr. Levier said it handled as smoothly and easily as the F-80 Shooting Star, now in operation.

The F-90 is one of the largest fighters ever built, weighing about 26,000 pounds. Levier said he climbed to 15,000 feet in 10 minutes, but added that this was not the ship's maximum rate of climb. Most of the test was devoted to stalling maneuvers, he said, and in this respect the plane was comparable to the smaller F-80.

#### **Boy Scouts Cut Age** Of Joining One Year

WASHINGTON .- Entrance ages for the three groups of Boy Scouts have been reduced one year each by the national council.

Colgan Norman, president of the area council, Boy Scouts of America, announced the changes, effective September 1. Ages for cubs have been cut from 9 to 8; scouts, 12 to 11, and senior scouts, 15 to 14. Yielding to a consistent demand, principally by boys wanting to be scouts before they are 12, the na-tional council reduced the ages at a Boston meeting. Norman said. Scout headquarters made a fiveyear survey and the plan, tried experimentally in different parts of the country, was found to be extremely successful, he added.
