



#### Milk Among U.S. Top Five In Popular Drink Tests

NEW YORK .- People who think drinking man-about-town have another think coming, on the basis of figures that show just what he drinks each year.

Milk, beer, soft drinks, coffee and canned fruit and vegetable juices are the nation's five most popular beverages, according to an American Can Company analysis of gov-

ernment and industry figures. On a per capita basis, the average inhabitant of this country last year consumed some 180.5 quarts of milk, 71.2 quarts of beer, 48 quarts of soft and carbonated drinks, 38.7 quarts of coffee and 8.3 quarts of canned fruit and vegetable juices, as compared with 4.7 quarts of hard liquors. Cans are used in some form in the packing and distribution of all five of the

favorites, the study showed An almost five-fold increase in per capita consumption of canned fruit and vegetable juices during the past 10 years was noted in the analysis. New methods and processes for canning fresh-flavored orange, tomato and grapefruit uices were given credit for a major part of the increases.

No figures were available on consumption of the world's number one drink-plain water.

#### Uranium Discovery Prize Spurs Prospector Army

### **Extermination Confronts** 'Red Howler' of Colombia

A tough old conservative is the red howler monkey of northern Columbian jungles.

Families stick to their old homes and old ways until they starve to death, showing almost no ability to adapt themselves to changing times such as characterizes man of the legendary of their close relatives. This is stressed by Dr. Philip Hershkovi in a report on the mammals of northern Columbia issued by the U. S. National museum, Smith sonian institution.

Hershkovitz was at first puzzled by what seemed the endless variety shown by these animals. It was as if they were split into many races. But the difficulty is explained, he says, when their strong conservatism is considered.

"The red howler," he says, "is a comparatively sedentary animal, sluggish in movement, conservative in habits. Combined with its great ability to survive environmental fluctuations is its small capacity for adaptation to such changes.

"Under normal environmental conditions this howler, with its enormous vitality and almost complete freedom from predators, will flourish. Its natural habitat is rich with food and water. However, many red howlers taken by me report, they receive letters appeared to be remnants of erstwhile large populations confined to small relicts of primary forest. In ld map showing the location of these hibitats clans of howlers have become isolated from the rest of the population. With continued deforestation they will be exterminated. Individuals persist, however, as long as nature provides them with a suitable tree and its

# Flocks-Large and Small

# Rotation of Tires

Extra low pressure tires must be regularly rotated and regularly checked for correct air pressure. Like all other pneumatic tires, they should be rotated every 3,000 to 4,000 miles by this formula: spare to right rear, right rear to left front, left front to left rear, left rear to right front, and right front to spare. Thus the wear on all tires is equalized and tire mileage is kept below vehicle mileage. 

#### Polio Hitting More Adults Says Duke Epidemiologist

No longer an "infantile disease," poliomyelitis is now attacking persons over 20 to an increasing degree, according to a Duke hospital

And, "when older persons are infected, there is a greater chance of paralysis and death," says Dr. D. S. Martin, epidemiologist at Duke. "In the epidemic here in 1944,"

he pointed out, "only a few persons infected were over 20 years of age, but the case fatality rate was much higher in this group.

almost without exception, this increase in the number of cases of polio in adults suggests that immunity is decreasing," Dr. Martin

In the New York City epidemic in 1916, 80 per cent of cases were in children under five, but in 1944, only 25 per cent of cases were in children of this age group.

Most significant aspect of immunity is that in rural areas there is apparently less immunity to the virus than in crowded cities. Explanation may be that people in crowded regions pick up the virus in small doses and develop an immunity.

One study showed, Dr. Martin said, that 71 per cent of the urban population in one area was immune, but only 20 per cent of the

Generally, residents of suburban come groups are hardest hit."

Immunity to polio is highest in tropical areas and in heavily-populated countries where sanitation conditions and living standards are lower. Frequent contact under poor conditions of sanitation permits the population to acquire the disease and develop immunity to it.

#### Know Your Feed Source, Is Advice to Stockmen

How animals may develop illness due to a mineral deficiency, even though that mineral is abundant in the local soil, is explained by the nutrition committee of the American Veterinary Medical association.

"import" hay and grain because they do not produce enough to feed their stock. "Take the example of an eastern stockman who buys hay and grain from the Great Lakes the committee said. "Iodine deficiency does not exist in that stockman's area, but it does exist around the Great Lakes. Because his animals are fed almost entirely on this iodine-deficient feed, borderline cases of goiter may develop. And the same goes for cobalt, manganese, and other min-

Producers of commercial feeds nearly always guard against this possibility by fortifying their products with essential substances not naturally present, the commit-

But if stockmen mix their own they should know the source of the ingredients. Laboratory analysis should be made of feeds from questionable sources, and necessary vitamins and mineral added if the analysis reveals deficiencies, the committee advised.

Boeing XB-47 Stratojet, holder the all-type transcont record at an average speed of 607 miles per hour, is to be equipped with even more powerful jet engines, Boeing Airplane company announces. Installation of the General Electric J-47 turbojets in one of the two experimental XB-47's will service test the new, higher power, engines for use in the production B-47's now being built for the use of the air force at the Boeing Wichita, Kans., division. Use of the new G-E J-47's will raise the total power of the Stratojet more than 25 per cent. Each of the new engines develops more than 5000 lbs. thrust, compared with 4000 lbs. thrust per engine of the earlier J-35 turbojets.

# Tarnished Silver

Tarnish can be removed from silver with an aluminum pan, containing water in which a spoonful or so of bicarbonate of soda is dissolved. Put the silver in the solution, and heat the pan if you want to speed up the process. 1. What is the best age to vaccinate calves for Bang's disease? Calves should be vaccinated between the ages of four and eight months, although six months is the preferable age. If calves are vaccinated at this age, they will usually react to the tests within thirty days and when they reach breeding age will usually stop

2. What age do you recommend for vaccinating, castrating, and weaning pigs?

It is better not to pile too much trouble on little pigs at one time. Castration, vaccination, and weaning should be spaced two to three weeks apart, and we recommend castrating your pigs by four weeks of age, vaccinating them at six weeks, and weaning at nine weeks.

3. How much space is needed in the brooder house for baby chick-? Research Farm recommends not more than two chicks per square foot during the first six weeks. Pullets up to 20 weeks should have three square feet per bird, while 3½ to four square feet is recommended per hen. Crowding retards growth per hen. Crowding retards growth and causes uneven development.

How to Give Space Effect

of floor area in a house costing from \$10 to \$15, it pays to get the most comfort and spacious effect out of small floor area, comments Miss Vera M. Ellithorpe, extension home management specialist, Kansas state college, Manhattan.

"Most of us live in small houses so we need to learn how to make the best possible use of floor space," the extension specialist of chests of drawers or dressers will make good use of floor-to-ceiling space in storage space.

"Another suggestion is to build in storage for bedding, clothes, toys and out-of-season clothing befurniture that is small in scale. simple in design and medium to light in color to give an effect of space. Large pieces of dark furniture against a light background crowd a room.'

Light-colored woodwork, or paint the same as, or slightly darker than the back-ground color of the walls helps to enlarge a small room. Mouldings and patterns in rugs, upholstering, wallpaper, and draperies should all be scaled to the size of the room rather than over-sized

Simple curtains that let in the view and merely frame the window are the best for the small room. Another suggestion is to paint or paper one wall a color harmonizing with but lighter than the other walls to make that wall apparently

#### How to Plant a Tree-And What Kind to Plant

In most cities the planting of street trees is controlled by local civic authtorities in order to maintain an interesting uniformity of species and avoid trouble with uplifted sidewalks and the wrong planting of fragile, easily broken trees. Now that effective spraying methods have been found for the control of the bark beetle which carries the Dutch Elm disease. American elms may again be planted.

For planting in residential urban areas, the following kinds are recommended by Howard Taylor, president of the American Associa-

The Ralston Purina Company's sugar and Norway map'e, thornless honey locust, scarlet cak, shingle oak, silver linden, little leaf European linden, sweetgum and corktree. In acid soil regions, pin oak can be used.

Set the tree the ame depth it grew in the nursery as revealed by the soil mark on the trunk. Dig a good sized hole. It is better to make a five dollar hole for a two dollar tree than a two dollar hole for a five dollar tree. If the subsoil is clay or hardpan remove it and substitute coarse gravel for better drainage.

Untangle the roots, cut off any bruised or broken ones with sharp shears. Set the tree in the hole and spread out the roots. Do not let them cross, wind around, double under or crowd. Cover the roots with good topsoil and then tramp it firm. Pour in a bucket of water.

Hambletonian's Family Tree was the son of Abdallah and a crip pled cast-off known as the Charles Kent mare. While the sire was a

descendant of Messenger, famous English stallion brought to America in 1801, Hambletonian's was so no-account that Jonas Seely, Jr., was glad to unload both the mare and her gangling foal on Rysdyk who had to scrape up the needed \$125 from friends to get his dubious horseflesh. Before the Orange County Dutchman died in 1870, six years before Hambletonian, he was a wealthy man from the variously estimated stud fees (between \$185,000 and \$300,000) earned by the great stallion.





They just happen to be in an unhealthy business.

As a house physician at Madison Square Garden, Dr. Nardiello never runs short of variety. His cases range from a cowboy's brain Fisher, Alma J. Hill, Dorn A. concussion induced by a horse to a small boy's stomachache induced by too much circus candy.

The spectators, you see, are a health problem, too, in an arena which seats 18,000.

The doctor has repaired the fractured wrist of a Democratic judge who fell off the platform during a Republican rally (no foul play was proved). He has treated the black eves of fight fans who got to fighting, themselves. He has ministered to spectators for heart attacks brought on by thrills, for slight bruises caused by a rodeo calf which suddenly appeared in the box seats, and for some of the world's classiest bites at championship dog shows.

#### Cowboy Customers

During the circus, Dr. Nardiello averages about 10 kids a day who are brought to his office with complaints of headaches, dizziness or stomach pains all brought on by overeating.

But generally the short, chunky house doctor is kept busiest by the assorted athletes and performers most of whom are in top shape when they enter the Garden.

His most frequent customers are the rodeo cowboys. During their stand at the Garden, he averages 15 to 20 cases of dislocated shoulders, fractures, bruises and rope burns every night. In recent years there were two cowboys who died within four minutes after being kicked by horses.

The most durable athletes Dr. Nardiello knows are hockey play-

"I'll never forget Johnny Mowers, the Detroit goalie," the doctor says. "One night about five years ago he was smashed squarely in the teeth by a flying puck. He took 20 stitches and was back on the ice in 15 minutes."

# He Needled 1,500

The biggest single job the doctor ever had at the Garden occurred in 1947, when he inoculated some 1,500 circus employes, including the tatooed lady, for smallpox.

One of the most tragic involved treating a trapeze flyer for shock and hysteria a few years ago. The man had tried to jump from an aerial platform after seeing his wife and partner miss her grip and fall to her death.

The performers closest to the doc's heart are the fighters. He used to be one himself, fighting for a time as a lightweight to work his way through medical school. Dr. Nardiello is 60 and still very busy. He generally doesn't leave the Garden until after midnight, and the Garden is dark only one or two nights between Labor day and

late spring, when the circus ends.

Erosion needs to be controlled on grassland as well as on cultivated land. Excess water and wind can have a very destructive effect on overgrazed or mismanaged native pasture

To properly manage a range we must know the grasses that are most palatable, produce the most forage and grains, and protect the land. Grasses are indicators of the condition of the range ald whether it has been used properly. Nature has provided that the grasses present on different sites before they are disturbed, produce the highest yield in forage and pounds of beef. When over used the better grasses are taken out, and annual weeds and poor quality grasses fill the bare spots. This reduces the pounds of beef that can be produced o na given area. A rule of thumb often used in correct grazing is to take half the grass and leave half. This system provides ample protection for the land and produces enough

Several practices aid in correct grazing. Under certain conditions rotational or deferred grazing gives the grass a chance to pick up vigor and produce seedlings. Water and salt can be used in getting a proper distribution of grazing. Where it is difficult to get enough water from well, it may be that a dam will alleviate the problem. The Cap Rock Soil Conservation District is anxious to help the ranchers anyway posible in the application of grassand conservation practices.

### Cotton Stripping Is Stressed by Many Farmers

College Station, September 28-Cotton has made exceptionally good growth in most sections of the state this year. Right along with a heavier set of bolls there has been rank growth of leaves Many cotton growers are turning their attention to cotton defoliation-that is, using chemicals to make the leaves fall of so cotton at the News office. will mature faster and be easier to pick.

The chemical which has been used the longest and has given good results is finely ground calcium cyanamid (SI-AN-AM'-ID) according to M. K. Thornton, Extension agricultural chemist of the Texas A & M College System.

Thornton says cotton should be dusted with calcium cayanamid at the rate of 30 to 35 pounds per acre. It can be dusted from airplanes or with ground dusting machines. The dust must stick to the leaves in order to get good ness sessions. Mrs. A. H. Jackson defoliation. Early in the morning, while dew is still on the leaves, is a good time to dust, says Thornton, or after a rain while the air is still moist. He adds that defoliation is likely to be a failure if dusting is done during extremely dry weather or when there is no dew on the cotton

> A spray of ammonium thiocynnate (THI-O-SI'-AN-ATE) dissolved in water and applied at the rate of 10 pounds pe racre gives good results in drier sections of the state. This spray has not been tested thoroughly under Texas conditions and therefore cannot be definitely relied upon.

Removing leaves from cotton has several advantages. It makes picking easier-whether it's done by hand, by spindle picking machines, or by mechanical strippers. There is less leaf stain on lint. Bolls open more uniformly and earlier. And there's less greenstuff left for boll weevils to

Thornton suggests that you see your county agricultural agent for more information on chemical defoliation of cotton.
