





Scotland is generally regarded as the birthplace of golf but the assertion is open to some doubt, whatever the proud clansmen of the club may say. In fact it was probably a Dutchman that started the ball rolling, the Dutch word for a club being "kolf," meaning the thing you hit the ball with and not the place where you tell how you hit it. But Scotland's claim to and, second only to the Highland Fling, golf is the reigning obsession of the Celt.

Heavier Rails Needed

In 1890 the railroads carried 77 billion ton-miles of revenue freight, and by the turn of the century this had nearly doubled. 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





Man, Wife, Spend Life In Helping Stammerers

WINTER PARK, FLA .- A woman with 60 years of stammering ir her family has teamed with her husband to devote their finances and the latter years of their lives to correcting the stuttering of others.

They are 54-year-old Eleanor Weston Emery and her husband. Theodore, 60. They have been helping children and adults since 1935. Mrs. Emery's eldest brother was a stammerer. She herself stam mered so badly she could obtain no formal education and had to do with private tutors and several years abroad. Her first son, now 28, still stammers a little. Two other sons never stuttered.

Her first son was growing up when she realized no one could cure her-that she had to help herself and her son. She now speaks clearly. Her husband has a speech hesitancy, but it comes from difficulty in choosing the right word in conversation "and I guess association with stutterers hasn't helped, either."

The two conduct the nonprofit Emery institute here, incorporated under Florida law and so recognized by the United States treasury department. On the advisory committee are such persons as authors Irving Bacheller and Dr. Kathryr Abbey Hanna, also a professor at Rollins college here; Dr. Eugene R. Smith, Rollins trustee; and Rt Rev. Oliver L. Loring, Episcopal bishop of the diocese of Maine. "Strangely," Mrs. Emery says,

"a stammerer can talk perfectly when he is alone, when very angry usually while singing or when absolutely unconscious of self. He car always talk to a pet without stammering when he is alone with it."





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
