





# Italian Colony Unhappy On Tierra del Fuego

BUENAS AIRES .- All is not going well with one of the world's most unusual immigrant resettlement schemes-the colony of 1,000 Italian immigrants on the island of Tierra del Fuego, which forms the southern side of the strait of Magellan.

Last year the Peron government closed down the country's notorious prison colony there, shifted its inmates to the mainland erected additional housing and ht Clear. made way for the bodily transfer of an entire factory from Italy to that antarctic outpost.

Since the first enthusiastic welcome given the hardy pioneers by the press here, news from the colony has been slim. In recent weeks, however, several newspapers, including a local Italian periodical, have reported that the rigors of readjustment have resulted in considerable disillusionment.

The peasant element among the settlers has taken well to the island's sheep-raising, its chief industry, according to these reports. But the workers, many of them in skilled categories, are said to be ill-prepared for the rigorous climate. The temperature occasionally drops to 15 below zero

Major discontent has arisen over the wage-and-employment policies adopted by the Bolsani corporation, which was transplanted from Italy. Promised a wage of three pesos hourly (60 cents), the workers complain that while this might be adequate in a more temperate climate, it is inadequate on the island.

The tests were made in two adoption institutions with normal healthy Marvin Boyd. babies. For comparison, records were kept of 15 babies who re-Mrs. N. S. Daniel. ceived no meat. Report Supplies, Mrs.

The infants readily accepted the Fewell. formulas containing strained meat and showed no adverse symptoms from it. Dr. Leverton reports, thus disproving the old theory that C. A. Bickley. meat is hard to digest.

The nurses reported that in gentral Jurisdiction. eral the meat-fed babies were more satisfied and slept better than the Mrs. W. W. Watkins. others, and the physician in charge considered them in better physical District President. condition.

Most significant, however, is the fact that none of the meat-fed babies developed the anemia characteristic of their age, and that the meat apparently promoted the formation of hemoglobin and red blood cells.

## Spare Water in Cooking To Preserve Vitamin "C"

Spare the water and save the vitamins. Six vegetables-cabbage, rutabagas, peas, asparagus, cauliflower, and spinach-were tested for vitamin C before and after cooking. All were cooked in four different ways: (1) in a pressure cooker above the water level; (2) in a tightly covered pan with only water to prevent scorchenough ing; (3) in a steamer: and (4) in an open kettle with water enough to cover during the entire cooking time Cooking by the last methodthat is, with the most waterproved most wasteful of C in all the vegetables. The other three methods in which the vegetable came in contact with little water during cooking proved about equally good for saving C in cabbage, rutabagas, peas and asparagus. Cabbage, for example, kept two-

thirds of its C after cooking by the three water-sparing methods, but kept only a fourth after cooking in ater to cover. Rutabagas and peas kept three-fourths of their C ey cooked in steam or very little water, but had only two-fifths

after cooking under water

This total, however, does not accurately reflect the number of farmers who belong to marketing or purchasing cooperatives, because many farmers belong to more than one organization, FCA said. Minnesota headed the list of states, with 602,000 farmer cooperative members. Illinois was second with 542,000, and Wisconsin was third with 334,000 members.




