

ordinance, and declaring an emergency Be It Ordained by the City Coun-

> SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, to sell or offer for sale any fire-crackers, torpedoes, Roman candles, or any other fire works, within the city limits of the City of Silverton, Texas.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to fire or explode any fire-crackers, torpedoes, Roman candles, or any other fire works, or any other amusement or practice tending to annoy and disturbing the peace of any person or resident, within the limits of the City of Silverton, Texas.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of any peace officer having jurisdiction to the enforcement of this ordinance, and he is so empow-

Section 4. PENALTY: Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions or any section or subdivision of this ordinance, shall be fined not less than One Dollar, (\$1.00) and not more than Two Hundred Dollars, (\$200.00). And each and ever violation shall constitute a separate offence.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication, and it is so enacted. Passed and approved this the 5th day of December, 1949.






