Children First



The establishment of community dental health programs which will make dental care available to all children is being urged by the American Dental Association.

In a statement unanimously ap-proved by the Association's House Delegates, representing more than 70,000 dentists, it was urged that children be given priority over adults for dental health care.

Such programs, it was pointed out, would permit a practical solution to the problem of dental disease in the nation without resorting to a federal system of compulory health insurance which Association described as "costly and unrealistic."

Many of these programs are now in operation throughout the coun-try and the dental profession is attempt to blow up the UAW -- CIO Hdqtrs. Bldg. here in Detroit, a urging that one be placed in operation in each community. The Association pointed out that the com-munity is the ideal medium for such activities as dental care needs and facilities vary widely. Local pro-grams, therefore, should be adapted to the situation at hand.



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



New Motion Camera Lens University of Rochester scien-

tists have developed a new motion picture camera made from artificial sapphire which is believed to have several advantages over optical glass lenses.

This was revealed by Dr. Robert E. Hopkins, associate professor of optics, and Dr. Brian O'Brien, professor of physiological optics and director of the institute of optics at the University of Rochester.

In perfecting the sapphire lens, Rochester researchers have overcome difficulties which delayed its development for many years. The Zeiss company of Germany gave up on the problem 20 years ago, it was said.

One advantage of the sapphire ens is its extreme hardness. It is second only to the diamond in the hardness of natural gems. Used for the outside element of an optical system, it is almost impossible to scratch it. In fact, it can be cleaned by scouring with sand without injury, Dr. O'Brien said. The sapphire lens' high refractive index and low dispersion gives the lens designer far greater freedom in eliminating aberrations and improving the quality and sharpness of images produced, the Rochester men reported.

"Light, in entering sapphire from the air, is slowed down to only a little more than half its speed," Dr. O'Brien explained. "The bending of light rays by a lens is thus accomplished with flatter lens curves and many advantages are derived from this. In addition to having the very high refractive index, sapphire has what is known as a very low dispersion. That is, the refractive index changes very little with the color of the light, and no glass as

Overlapping Near East and Middle East Baffle Readers

Where are the Near East and the Middle East?

The U.S. department of state has a division of near eastern affairs and a division of South Asian Affairs within its Office of Near eastern and African Affairs. It thus, in general, avoids the term Middle

East. The United Nations, on the other hand, uses Middle East freely, as do British and American journalists in referring to much the same region meant when the term Near East is used.

The three Easts-Near, Middle, and Far-come into use as a matter of convenience. They have never had an official status, and their boundaries have always been rather vague. They served to break into handier sections the vast, misty East or Orient that had remained little known since the days

of the Roman empire. Its outlines first began to appear distinctly when Portuguese explorers, soon after the discovery of America, sailed around the southern end of Africa, crossed the Indian ocean, pushed into the Pacific, and nosed along the Indochina and China coasts. Those coasts and their hinterlands became the Far East-for from a Europe which considered itself the center of the world.

By way of contrast to "Far East. writers began to use "Near East," referring to the fringe of countries along the Asiatic mainland nearest to Europe. "Middle East" did not come into such common use but was employed by some writers in a hazy way to cover parts of the intervening East

The terms Near East and Middle East have never been applied to regions north of the almost continuous mountain fall formed by the Caucasus, the mountains of northern Iran (Persia), the Hindu Carl Wimberly. Kush, and the Himalayas. Near East was adopted pretty generally by American writers and geographers to apply to Turkey, Syria, Palestine, and sometimes Egypt. In some cases Iraq, the Hashimite

Kingdom of the Jordan (formerly Transjordan), and parts of northwestern Arabia were included.

The hospital is in the midst of an elaborate research, financed by the ministry of health, to learn the truth about colds, what starts them and how they can be cured. So, it offers holidays with pay

to persons who don't mind putting up with a little fever. The incon venience of enduring a nice little controlled cold, of having aches scientists, hasn't discouraged volunteers.

In three years more than 1,500 persons have agreed to be guinea pigs and what they have contributed to the literature of cold research has filled many fat volumes.

Could Use Chimps

"We could use chimpanzees," hospital officials say, "but they are more, expensive to get and support than human volunteers." Certain conditions are attached to the paid honeymoon or holiday

offer. Volunteers are paid three shillings (about 42 cents) a day and are entitled to a pint of free beer. They live in comfortable, prefabricated apartments with radios and telephones. There is a lot of good food, and for entertainment there are walks in the pleasant countryside, books and facilities for badminton and table tennis.

But the volunteers must keep to themselves. Their colds must be strictly their own private affairs, uncontaminated by wildcat colds other vagrant diseases they might pick up from outsiders.

Must Remain Aloof

They must not go into taverns, shops or theaters, or ride on busses and trams. They must not permit an outsider to approach within 30 feet

So strict is this condition that a special technique has been developed to deliver food to the pampered folks who have colds on purpose. A waiter goes to a pre-fab door with food in specially designed containers. He sets it down, rings the bell and runs. The volunteer within must count to 60 before opening the door, and by that time the waiter is expected to be 30 feet

For the isolated volunteers it usually is a pleasant fortnight to sit quietly and think about things. It's an ideal opportunity for a couple of friends to get off by themselves. Honeymooners are favored because they are less likely than others to stray around impatientl



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


