Home Economists Compare Rib Roasts From 3 Types

A taste test to compare Brahman, Braford, and Hereford roasts was recently conducted on the Davis campus of the University of California.

Rib roasts were taken from all three types of cattle, cooked to medium, and tasted by 26 persons in the college of agriculture, including home economists and members of the division of animal husbandry.

The seven home economists rated all three similar in flavor, but gave Braford first place in texture and tenderness. Second place went to Hereford.

Of 19 tasters in the animal husbandry division, 14 placed Hereford first in tenderness. Eleven said Hereford had the best flavor, while ten declared all roasts equal in

Braford sliced more easily, and had more dripping fat, though it took longer to cook to medium, a fact which may have been due to a variation in size, said N. R. Ittner, associate specialist, and H. R. Guilbert, professor of animal husbandry, who conducted the test.

Corrosive Wash Discolors

A corrosive wash which comes from copper frequently stains exterior wall surfaces that are white or light in color. Copper screening, flashings or downspouts, are often the cause of such unsightly screening should be coated with screen enamel or with spar varnish thinned slightly with turpentine surfaces should be coated with regmake sure that the copper is thoroughly clean. A fine grade of sandpaper-6-0-is usually employed for cleaning such a metal surface or for roughening new copper that is hard and slick. This preliminary treatment will aid the adhesion of the new coating.

Handle "BHC" With Care Veterinarians have issued fresh warning that the insecticide. BHC, must be used with caution on farm animals and around the feeds they consume. Careless or untimely use of this parasite-killing chemical, which has a slightly musty odor, may produce a moldyhay flavor in hog meat, poultry, eggs, and milk, according to the American Veterinary Medical association. The association adds that farmers will do well to investigate "the disadvantages as well as the advantages of benzene hexa-chloride (BHC), and the specific indications for its use.

Ulceration of Colon

Cancer tends to occur as a complication of chronic ulceration in the colon, two doctors from the Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minn., say. Writing in the Journal of the American Medical association, Drs. William G. Sauer and J. Arnold Bargen point out that sufferers from this condition of the colon should have periodic medical examinations. The doctors report 41 cases in which cancer occurred as a complication of the disease, known medically as chronic ulcerative colitis. The cancers occurred both among men and women, with no particular affinity for either sex, the doctors say. Chronic ulcerative colitis generally had been present about 16 years before cancer was discovered in these patients, according to the article.

Cues for Color Scheme

Prized paintings are frequently used as cues for a room's color scheme. In one room where this was successfully accomplished, walls and woodwork were painted a soft blue which set off the beauty of several fine pieces in mahogany and maple. Other colors from the paintings which were introduced in the room's decoration were soft red and bluish-green. Food for Ocean Fish

For both big and little fish in the oceans the staple food is what is called "plankton." This includes a great variety of plants and animals with little or no powers of movement of their own, which are carried about by tides and currents. The name comes from a ploy, first, a special undercoater Greek word meaning "wandering." In contrast, animals such as whales and fish, which are able to swim, and thus more or less independent of tides and currents, are called "nekton." This is derived from another Greek word, meaning "wimming."

Snake Skin Nests

The list of birds habitually using snake skins in their nests is short, as follows: 1. Great-crested flycatcher - belonging to the New World flycatchers, breeding in eastern North America and nesting in holes. 2. Arizona crested flycatcher-a relative of the greatcrested variety, with similar habits. 3. Blue grosbeak-an American member of the sparrow family, making an open nest in bushes. 4. Black-crested titmouse-a member of the chickadee family, living in western North America and nesting in holes. 5. Bank mynah-a starling, living in southern Asia and nesting in holes in banks. 6. Rifle bird-an Australian bird of paradise, making a cup-shaped nest in trees. 7. Madagascar bulbul-making a cup-shaped nest in trees.

Getting Woodwork Ready

Before repainting interior woodwork, properly prepare the surface to be coated-in order to insure the best results. Wash all glossy surfaces with a mild alkali, such as sal soda, trisodium phosphate, or sodium silicate, and rinse thoroughly. Scrape off any loose or blistered paint, then fill all cracks or minor surface irregularities with putty or a spackling compound. Next, prime all bare wood and, when it is dry, sandpaper the edges where the primer joins the old coating. Also sand the spots where filler was applied.

"Trim and Trellis" Paints

So-called "trim and trellis" paints are actually exterior enamels. They produce a glossy enamellike finish with better gloss and made by the manufacturer who produced the "trim and trellis" material. These trim colors are wery high in hiding power and one coat covers the undercoat satisfactorily. For best durability, they should be brushed out well, so as not to apply too thick a film.



Earth Is Growing Warmer, **Urey Explains to Chemists**

Radioactivity, which man has now begun to harness for his own ise, was largely responsible for the development of the earth as we now it, according to a new theory of the planet's origin which has been described by Dr. Harold C. Urey, Nobel prize-winning chemist of the University of Chicago institute for nuclear studies.

Dr. Urey suggested that heat enerated by radioactive materials n the heart of an ocean-covered earth brought about vast structural changes which gave us the great land masses on which we live to-

Urey differs radically from the W. M. U. Monday view, widely held in the past, that | Sunbeams Monday the earth was formed at a very high temperature and has been cooling off ever since. On the contrary, according to the new theory, the earth has grown warmer since it "accumulated" some two billion years ago from a huge dust cloud PREACHING which the sun had acquired during its travels through space.

At the start, Dr. Urey suggested, the earth probably consisted of a low-density core, followed by a layer of a mixture of iron and stone, and on the surface a very thin layer of rock. Covering the whole was a layer of water. During the first stage of the

earth's history, Dr. Urey continued, radioactive uranium, thorium, and potassium in the story regions raised its temperature until the iron layer melted. Then the iron dropped to the center of the globe, forming a heavy, dense core, which displaced the lighter materials originally there and floated them up the surface. It was thus that the continental land masses and the deep Pacific basin were formed, he ex-

An indication that dry land first appeared about 500 million years ago was seen by Dr. Urey in the fact that no fossil' specimens from an earlier time have been discovered. Such creatures as may have lived more than half a billion years ago presumably were sea animals, whose skeletons were too light to be preserved, he pointed out.

Study of Home Accidents Gives Kitchen No. 1 Spot

Notwithstanding the popular belief that the bathroom is the most dangerous room in the house, more home accidents occur in the kitchen and dining quarters than in any ther part of the home, according to Dr. Donald B. Armstrong, second vice-president in charge of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company's health and welfare activi-

This statement is based upon the findings of a year's study of home accidents to policyholders for which service was utilized. The study revealed that 30 per cent of the accidents happened in the dining and kitchen areas, while substantially lower percentages occurred in other parts of the home and home property. Only a negligible proportion of the total took place in the bathroom the report noted.

Falls of one kind or another, but most of them on a level surface, accounted for more than half of the accidents. Walking or running was the activity at the time of the accident which was reported most frequantly, and more legs, feet, and toes were injured than any other part of the body.

A composite picture of the typical mishap was presented as "a fracture (or dislocation) of lets (feet or toes) as a result of a fall on a level surface while walking (or running) in the dining room or

Overeating Disease in Lambs Three effective ways to keep

leeder lambs from eating themselves to death are given by Dr. G. T. Woods, a veterinarian at the University of Illinois. Lambs started on heavy grain feeding sometimes have enterotoxemia or overeating disease. Dr. Woods says the germ which causes the disease is found in the intestines of most lambs, but too much grain causes it to produce a deadly poison. One easy way to prevent losses from this disease is to put lambs on pasture or hay for one or two weeks while gradually starting them on grain. Or you can have your veterinarian vaccinate the lambs against overeating disease as soon as they are brought into the feedlot. The third control method has been used by Colorado scientists. They have found that daily feeding of onethird ounce of sulfur with each lamb's feed will greatly reduce death losses.

Hard Water Damage

Hard water even affects the flavor and texture of foods, like peas and beans; and if such water is used for making tea and coffee, some of the flavor of these beverages will be lost. One of the best known examples of what happens when hard water is heated appears in the scale clinging stubbornly to the bottom and sides of a tea ket-tle. This same kind of scale also causes damage and high costs in your piping. Without softening devices to prevent this accumulation of scale, hot water piping may seen elog up. That means costly

Polluted Air Very Costly, Research Scientist Claims

Polluted air which assaults the dirties his clothes and curtains, and obscures his view of the sky is a costly nuisance that will yield only to scientific research.

That is the opinion of Morris A. Fisher, supervisor of fine particles research at Armour Research Foundation of Illinois Institute of Technology.

"Cleaning up the contaminated air of cities will require more than laws and good intentions. Atmospheric pollution is primarily a technical problem, and-until we gain enough knowledge about it through research-progress toward cleaner air will be slow," Fisher de-

"We are on the threshold of important developments in the field because of recent research," Fisher says. He cites newly discovered facts about weather and the behavior of tiny particles suspended in air, along with smoke abatement facilities and careful surveys of pollution in a number of cities, as | years with proper care. aids to future control of atmospheric

Fisher named three causes of contaminated air: natural sources. activities of individual citizens, and large scale industrial and commercial activities. He suggested ways so constantly. to control each one.

Volcanic dusts, salt nuclei from sea spray, combustion products of forest and grass fires, and sand or of natural contaminants. The type and number of such pollutions can affect fog, rain, and other weather

"It is likely that the presence of certain natural dusts and nuclei accounts for problems like Los Angeles' smog," Fisher said. "What one city can tolerate in man-made pollution could be extremely annoying where bad weather and many natural nuclei are found in combi-

Information about wind, air turbulence, and the movement of atmospheric contaminants is important to city planners who can better choose plant sites and stack designs, while providing more open spaces and park areas."

Ladder-Climbing Accidents Traced to Poor Equipment

You can't hang up a safety record with a shaky ladder.

Climbing around the farm has nough hazards without using unsafe ladders and most elimbing accidents can be traced to improper or defective equipment.

Farmers should inspect ladders periodically of rusted or loose bolts and nails and for cracked, rotted or loose rungs or supports. If defective, repairs or replacements are in order.

A ladder should not be left where it will fall, be tipped over or bumped place where it can be reached in a hurry in case of fire or other emergency is a good idea.

Safe use of ladders is possible if the following suggestions of the National Safety Council are followed:

Be sure the ladder is placed prop-Always face the ladder going up or down and use both hands.

Take one step at a time-don't

Work facing the ladder and hold on with one hand. Do not work in high wind. Avoid over-reaching or over-exertion in pushing or pulling while working on ladders because it is

easy to lose balance and fall. Use a rope hoist to raise sharp tools, heavy objects, or bulky materials.

Rheumatic Fever

Impoverished and disrupted homes are breeders of rheumatic fever, according to Dr. Robert L. Jackson of the University of Iowa, Iowa City, writing in the Journal of the American Medical association. Rheumatic fever, an infectious disease which runs a long course and which frequently results in a damaged heart, causes more deaths among children than other communicable diseases combined. It has been estimated that 2 per cent of school children of the United States have heart disease as a result of the rheumatic condition.
'The disease tends to breed in families where serious, long-standing social problems exist," Dr. Jackson says. "In our experience the economic factors are secondary in importance to the sociologic factors, because society has ways and means of helping the needy.

Brucellosis Development

German veterinarians have reported that an animal may develop brucellosis in as little as six days after it first comes in contact with germs of this disease. Usually, however, it takes several weeks for this infection to start its criminal career in an animal's body. Once on its way, it cuts down milk production in cows, causes abortion or renders newborn animals so weak they are unable to survive, and produces sterility in both males and females. Cattle, swine, and goats are its preferred victims and human beings get the disease from them, usually by direct con-tact or by consuming unpasteur-

Fourteen-foot bamboo blowguns and other trophies from recent South American expeditions of which Dr. Bassett Maguire, curator at the New York Botanical garden, has been the leader, are on display in the garden.

On his most recent trip, which followed the Kunhardt Sipapo expedition which he undertook in Venezuela a year previous, Dr. Maguire acquired specimens of the famous blowgun bamboo which no white man had succeeded in bringing out of its native habitat in more than a century.

The plant, which has a distance of from 12 to 20 feet between the points where leaves arise on the tall, hollow stem, was first discovered by the explorer Robert Schomburgk in 1839. The Maquiritare Indians of Cerro Marahuaca in Venezuela use poison darts in these

No "Universal" Adhesive

No single adhesive will bond satisfactorialy all types of materials, and each particular job seems to require its own adhesive for best results. However, during and since World War II, considerable progress has been made in the development of greatly improved adhesives. Some of these will make a satisfactory bond between such dissimilar substances as metal and plastic, or metal and rubber. Not many of them are available for home use because careful control of the conditions of application as, for example, heat and pressure, are usually necessary.



SOIL CONSERVA-TION DISTRICT **NEWS**

Since the crops have been harvested below the Cap Rock, many farmers are terracing their land and others are planning to farm on the contour. These two conservation measures alone can't fully control the water erosion, but are an important step towards that end. They also help to a certain extent in the control of

With the aid of Soil Conservation Service technicians, terraces have been constructed on farms of C. E. Bedwell, John Martin, J. T. Rogers, and Gerald Smith during the last two weeks. Mr. Bedwell has two farms on which terraces are being built. One is located 3 miles west of Quitaque and the other is located 1 mile west and 1 mile north of Quitaque. Terrace construction has been completed on the south farm. Mr. Martin, Mr. Rogers, and Mr. Smith have one third of a section each, lying 3.5 miles west of Quitaque Terrace construction has been completed on these three farms. The lines were run and terrace construction supervised by Soil Conservation Service technicians. They are level, wide terraces that can be farmed with large equipment without too much difficulty.




