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SILVERTON STUDENTS DRIVE ABOUT 3,078 MILES TO ATTEND NIGHT SCHOOL

Dr. Roy G. Boger, director of the Amarillo Center of West Texas State College, reports that four persons from Silverton have been making the trip to and from Amarillo to attend night classes at the center this spring semester; They are: Nan Bunch, Florence Parker, Mrs. A. L. Redin and Mrs. Jack Wingo, all Silverton teachers.

Dr. Boger figures that each of these students has traveled a total of about 3,078 miles since January 23 to attend night school. Mrs. Wingo attended the Amarillo Center during the Fall Semester and she has traveled at least 3,150 miles during the two semesters. That is a lot of traveling to get no farther than 83 miles from starting point.

The Spring Semester at the Amarillo Center will close on May 26 with a total enrollment of 726. Dr. Boger says plans are being made for more space to take care of an even larger enrollment which is expected for the Fall Semester of 1950-1951.

"The student who is willing to go to night school after a day's work deserves exceptional praise," says Dr. Boger. "If he is willing to drive many miles to attend a night school, I claim both the student and the school have rare qualities that are well met. When classes are resumed next September, I hope to prove my statements to more folks from Silverton."

Biography Tells Colorful Story Of Adventurer

NEW YORK—"Mr. Catherwood also is missing."

In that single line, hastily tacked onto a list of shipwreck victims, the New York Herald in 1854 gave out the news that fate at last had caught up with a man who had been defying it for decades.

It was not much of a requiem for the strange, cold adventurer who time and again had risked his life to paint a picture, who had ventured in disguise into Mohammedan holy of holies, who had surveyed South America's first railroad, who had helped open to the ken of Americans the lost cities of the Mayas, deserted and moldering in the central American jungles.

There were two significant things in the sentence. One was the "missing." Catherwood had been missing things all his life, particularly fame and fortune.

The second was the use of the term "Mr. Catherwood." For throughout his life, that was what he was. Reticent, quiet, silent, modest almost to the point of protective coloring, he was "unlike an adventurer as an adventurer could be. His body went on deeds of daring do; his manners remained in a cutaway coat.

Biography Tells Story
A biography of the adventurous artist has just been published: "Frederick Catherwood, Architect." It seems the first real attempt to show more than a wraith.

Catherwood was born in London, England, in 1799, attended a school where he learned Latin, Greek and Hebrew, was apprenticed to an architect when 16. He became a member of "the Keats circle," headed by the poet, then, when 22, went to Rome where he probably had a romantic interlude with an eccentric noblewoman to whom such episodes were no novelty.

Then he went to Greece to study and sketch the ruins of her classic buildings, and dipped for the first time into adventure: Greece was revolting against the Turks and Catherwood was caught in Athens by a besieging Turkish army. He continued his artistic studies in the beleaguered city, making castings with his own hands, then escaped—no man knows just how—to Syria.

Effected Escape
There he found a merry private war raging between a sheik and an emir. He and a friend disguised themselves as Arabs and scurried into Egypt.

Egypt then was boiling as a center for archeological research. Giovanni Belzoni, a circus strong man who had turned archeologist, had broken into the Khafre pyramid and discovered gold plated mummies "as thick as leaves." A number of wealthy Britons had gone to the country to record the wonders already uncovered and to look for new ones.

For the next nine years, Catherwood stayed in Egypt, with the exception of one trip, not too successful, to London to make more money. He became part of a Nile expedition financed by Robert Hay, a wealthy Englishman.

Catherwood sketched from Nubia to Tunis. He was one of a group of engineers whom Mehemet Ali, the pasha of Egypt, hired to repair the mosques at Cairo, Egypt.

Scientists Hope to Grow Food From Some Chemicals

PALO ALTO, CALIF. — Within two years, Stanford university scientists expect to be able to show hungry people how to use sunlight to produce nutritious food cheaply and in great quantities.

They have developed a method of controlling the process of photosynthesis by which plants use sunlight to convert water, carbon and a few other simple chemicals into tissue.

The scientists report that the chief problems have been mastered. They say the remaining job is to work out the technical and engineering details which will give the greatest yield for the smallest expenditure of materials and energy.

Paul M. Cook, chemical engineer in charge of the project, thinks the researchers should have enough data soon to put the undertaking on an industrial basis.

Just now, scientists are starting their first small pilot plant. It is a futuristic looking collection of barrels and shallow rectangular tanks atop the Stanford chemical engineering lab.

Into each tank the researchers will put about 100 gallons of water, nitrates and a few minerals such as magnesium, iron and sulphur compounds.

A few hundred little green one celled plants, too small to be seen individually, will be dumped into the tanks. Small pumps will stir the water and add carbon dioxide occasionally. Sunlight will do the rest.

These little plants are a type of algae or seaweed called chlorella pyrenoidosa. Each contains chlorophyll, which makes plants green and converts chemicals into cell substances with the aid of light.

Road Bond Election Ordered By Court May 27

NOTICE OF ROAD BOND ELECTION

The State of Texas, County of Briscoe.
To the resident qualified electors of Road District No. 7, of Briscoe County, Texas, who own taxable property in said district, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 27th day of May, 1950, within Road District No. 7 of Briscoe County, Texas, to determine if said Road District shall issue bonds and if an annual ad valorem tax shall be levied annually on all taxable property within said Road District, sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity, in pursuance of an Election Order made and entered by the Commissioners' Court of Briscoe County, Texas, on the 24th day of April, 1950, and which order is in words and figures as follows to-wit:

ORDER FOR ROAD BOND ELECTION

The State of Texas, County of Briscoe.

ON THIS the 24th day of April, 1950, the Commissioners' Court of Briscoe County, Texas, convened in special session at the regular meeting place in the Courthouse at Silverton, Texas, with the following members of said Court being present and in attendance, to-wit:

J. W. Lyon, Jr., County Judge, Presiding; and H. A. Bomar, Commissioner Precinct No. 1; B. K. Hamilton, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2; Alton Steele, Commissioner, Precinct No. 3; O. M. Dudley, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4; and the following absent: NONE, constituting a quorum; and passed the following order:

ON THIS the 24th day of April, 1950, came on to be heard the petition of more than fifty (50) of the resident taxpaying voters of Road District No. 7, of Briscoe County, Texas, the said petition having been set down for hearing on this date by an order of the Commissioners' Court of said County, entered on the 3rd day of April, 1950; and

WHEREAS, at the time and place set for said hearing the matter came on for hearing and consideration, and it appearing to the Court that due and legal notice of the date and place of said hearing has been given in the manner and for the length of time required by law, the Court proceeded to hear all evidence offered for and against said petition, and it appearing to the Court that the said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property taxpaying voters of said Road District No. 7, who own taxable property in said district and who have duly rendered the same for taxation; and

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court that the proposed improvements would be for the benefit of all taxable property situated within said Road District No. 7, of Briscoe County, Texas; and

The said petition prays that an election be held within said Road District No. 7, of Briscoe County, Texas, to determine the following proposition:

"WHETHER OR NOT the bonds of the said Briscoe County, Texas, Road District No. 7, shall be issued in the amount of \$16,000, bearing interest at a rate of not to exceed 4 1-2% per annum, payable semi-annually, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed twenty (20) years from the date thereof, in conformity with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, and Chapter 16, Acts 1926, First Called Session, as amended, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout Briscoe County Road District No. 7, and whether or not taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in said Road District sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity."

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that if voted and issued the proceeds of said bonds will be applied to the construction, maintenance and operation of the following roads:

(a) Beginning at a point on State Highway 207 at the Southwest corner of the town section of Silverton;

Thence East approximately one and one half miles to the cemetery gate;

(b) Beginning at a point on Main Street in Silverton, Texas, said point being at the intersection on the south edge of Blocks Nos. 62 and 63;

Thence South on Main Street to the edge of the town section.

AND IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court that said Road District No. 7 of Briscoe County, Texas, has been duly and legally established by order of the Commissioners' Court of Briscoe County, Texas, passed on the 12th day of May, 1921, recorded in Volume 2, pages 618-620, of the Minutes of the Commissioners' Court of said County; and

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court that said petition is in all things regular and that the proposed bond issue of SIXTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$16,000) does not exceed the constitutional limitation of one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Road District No. 7 of Briscoe County, Texas; and

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court that no money derived from the proposed issue of bonds is to be expended on the construction of any designated State Highway;

IT IS THEREFORE considered, ordered, adjudged and decreed, and the Court does now so order, consider, adjudge and decree that the said petition be granted and that an election be held within and for said Road District No. 7, of Briscoe County, Texas, on the 27th day of May, 1950, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order to determine the following proposition:

"WHETHER OR NOT the bonds of the said Briscoe County, Texas, Road District No. 7, shall be issued in the amount of \$16,000, bearing interest at a rate of not to exceed 4 1-2% per annum, payable semi-annually, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed twenty (20) years from the date thereof, in conformity with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, and Chapter 16, Acts 1926, First Called Session as amended, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout Briscoe County Road District No. 7, and whether or not taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in said Road District sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity."

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that if voted and issued the proceeds of said bonds will be applied to the construction, maintenance and operation of the following roads:

(a) Beginning at a point on State Highway 207 at the Southwest corner of the town section of Silverton;

Thence East approximately one and one half miles to the cemetery gate;

(b) Beginning at a point on Main Street in Silverton, Texas, said point being at the intersection on the south edge of Blocks Nos. 62 and 63;

Thence South on Main Street to the edge of the town section.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 16, General Laws of the State of Texas, passed by the 39th Legislature at the First Called Session thereof.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and of this County, and who are resident property taxpaying voters within said Road District No. 7 of Briscoe County, Texas, who own taxable property within said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with House Bill Number 357, passed by the Fifty-first Legislature in 1949, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof"

"AGAINST the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof."

EACH VOTER shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote.

THE POLLING PLACES and the officers for said election shall be, respectively, as follows: Voting Precinct Number One, Polling Place, Briscoe County Courthouse (County Judges Office). Election Officers: J. W. Monroe, Presiding Judge; Mrs. Florence Fogerson, Judge; R. L. O. Riddell, Clerk; Mrs. Georgia Allard, Clerk.

Courthouse (County Attorneys Office). Election Officers, J. E. Minyard, Presiding Judge; Carl Crow, Judge; Mrs. D. T. Northcutt, Clerk; Mrs. Gordon Alexander, Clerk.

Voting Precinct Number 8, Polling Place, Briscoe County Courthouse (Sheriff's Office). Election Officers, W. C. Smithee, Presiding Judge; Bryant Eddleman, Judge; Mrs. Bob Dickerson, Clerk; Mrs. Dean Allard, Clerk.

THE MANNER of holding said election shall be governed by the General Election Laws of the State of Texas, when not in conflict with the provisions of the Statutes hereinabove referred to.

NOTICE of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in a newspaper of general circulation published in said Road District No. 7 for three successive weeks prior to said election. If no newspaper is published within said Road District, then such notice shall be published in some newspaper published in Briscoe County, Texas. In addition thereto there shall be posted three copies of this order at three public places in said Road District No. 7, of Briscoe County, Texas, and one at the Courthouse door in Silverton, Texas, for three weeks prior to said election.

THE COUNTY CLERK is hereby directed to cause said notices to be published and posted, as hereinabove directed, and further orders are reserved until the returns of said election are made by the duly authorized election officers and received by this Court.

The above order being read, it was moved by Commissioner Steele and seconded by Commissioner Bomar that same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Court voted "AYE": Commissioners Bomar, Hamilton, Steele and Dudley; and none voted "NO".

Several new irrigation wells have been drilled in the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District and part of the wells are exceptionally good producers. This change from dry land farming to irrigation farming causes many problems for the inexperienced irrigator. Often, he fails to take into consideration the change in varieties of crops needed and the planting rate and seed factors as land preparation, distribution of water, time of watering, soil fertility, etc. All of these factors considered will contribute towards the gain or loss in irrigation.

For the best results there are some basic principles that the farmer needs to observe. Of course the first thing the farmer thinks of after the well is drilled is getting the water on the land. Usually this is no great problem where the slope of the land is less than one foot fall per 100 feet. It will be necessary to thoroughly float the land or level it by other methods so that the water will be evenly distributed. On the flatter slopes the gravity method of irrigation will probably be satisfactory, whereas, on the steeper slopes it will probably be necessary to use a sprinkler system or bench leveling.

An even distribution of the irrigation water is dependent on the laying out of a proper irrigation system. The type of system used will be based on the slope of the land (as discussed above); the depth, permeability, and water holding capacity of the soil; the amount of water available; and to some extent the type of crops to be grown. These factors influence the length of runs, row direction, number and location of ditches and laterals needed, type of outlets, etc. By designing a proper system, not only is greater irrigation efficiency obtained but there is a saving in time and labor and a reduction in soil erosion.

Cigarette Use Tapers Off After Long Upward Tread
 Although U. S. smokers used three and one-half billion more cigarettes in 1949 than in 1948 there was a decrease of about one package of cigarettes per capita says the U. S. department of agriculture. The bureau of agricultural economics reports suggests that the demand for cigarettes may now be leveling off after a series of record breaking years.

Last year, the BAE reports, that the increase of three and one-half billion in use of cigarettes was about 1 per cent, bringing the total for the year to 352 billion. But population increased more than 1 per cent. The increase in cigarettes for the first half of the year was about 2 per cent, and for the last half was just about even with the 1948 consumption for those months. With an estimated population increase of more than two and one-half million, this figures to a per capita supply of 2,435 cigarettes in 1949 as compared with 2,455 in 1948.

The steady and sometimes sharp upward trend in cigarette consumption in the United States has been under way for many years, the BAE records show. Only one drop in civilian consumption has been noted. In 1944 the civilian use ran below the 1943 record. But the bureau says that "when allowance is made for the great volume consumed by large numbers in the armed forces and overseas personnel, total consumption in 1944 substantially exceeded that of 1943."

During and since the war, cigarette smoking has continued to gain. The figures for the last half of 1949 are the first indication of a break in the climb.

Eniwetok Atoll Ranks High Among Battered Land Spots

When the history of the 1941-1950 decade is written, Eniwetok Atoll will take top rank among the most bludgeoned of Pacific land spots. Typhoons, World War II bombs, and atomic weapon tests will have pooled their awesome power to put it there.

Eniwetok, soon again to feel atom blasts in its role as proving ground for the Atomic Energy commission, has already been battered by all three of these forces in the now waning decade.

This northwest outpost of the scattered Marshall Islands, 2,725 miles southwest of Honolulu and about the same distance southeast of Tokyo, was home to 138 island natives two years ago when its destiny in the atomic program was announced. The inhabitants were moved to Ujeing, 150 miles southwest of Eniwetok, a few weeks before the first
