Scientists Hope to Grow Food From Some Chemicals

PALO ALTO, CALIF. - Within two years, Stanford university scientists expect to be able to show hungry people how to use sunlight to produce nutritious food cheaply and in great quantities.

They have developed a method of controlling the process of photosynthesis by which plants use sunlight to convert water, carbon and a few other simple chemicals into

tissue. The scientists report that the chief problems have been mastered. They say the remaining job is to work out the technical and engineering details which will give the greatest yield for the smallest expenditure of materials and en-

Paul M. Cook, chemical engineer in charge of the project, thinks the researchers should have enough data soon to put the undertaking on an industrial basis.

Just now, scientists are starting their first small pilot plant. It is a futuristic looking collection of barrels and shallow rectangular tanks atop the Stanford chemical engineering lab.

Into each tank the researchers will put about 100 gallons of water. nitrates and a few minerals such as magnesium, iron and sulphur

A few hundred little green one celled plants, too small to be seen individually, will be dumped into the tanks. Small pumps will stir the water and add carbon dioxide occasionally. Sunlight will do the

These little plants are a type of alcae or seaweed called chlorella pyrenoidosa. Each contains chloropyll, which makes plants green and converts chemicals into cell substances with the aid of light.

Select Boulder, Colorado, For High Altitude Study

Physics and astrophysics - nat ural sciences that have captured public imagination since the atomic-power revelations-are taking to the hills these days. The selected site for the proposed new radiopropagation laboratory of the U.S. bureau of standards is in lofty Colorado, the state with the country's highest average elevation of 6,800

Boulder, Colorado, where the laboratory is to be built is 5,350 feet up, notes the National Geographic society. This resort and college town, home of the University of Colorado, is cradled in the high Rockies, about 25 air miles northwest of

Such mountain heights offer special advantages to scientists studying the mysterious actions of cosmic rays and the manifestations of the sun as it affects radio communications.

The greater the altitude, it has been found, the stronger are the cosmic rays-those invisible, highly penetrating particles that are constantly bombarding the earth. Hence, a few years ago, a permanent cosmic ray station was set up by cooperating universities on the summit of Colorado's 14,260-foot Mount Evans. It is 36 miles from Boulder.

At Climax, Colorado, 85 miles southwest of Boulder, is the Harvard - Colorado university coronagraph. This apparatus is a specially designed telescope which produces artificial eclipse conditions by blacking out direct sunlight, and thus permits scientific observations and photographs of the sun's surrounding gaseous

Acid Soil Fixes Phosphate And Makes Soil Infertile

What makes acid soils infertile? To find an answer to this question, John M. Heslep investigated two types of acid soils in northern Cali- equality with men. rnia and reported his findings in is dissertation.

Heslep found that one of the main easons for infertitity is the trendous power of acid soil to fix sphate. So tightly is phosphate held by the soil that it would require a forbidding amount of fertilizer to satisfy the phosphate needs of the soil and make the element avail-

Using Romain lettuce as test plants, the investigations disproved wo theories of what causes infertility in acid soils; manganese toxicity while present in acid soils s not responsible for the slow plant growth, and neither is lack of calium. Calcium applications in the form of lime do neutralize the acid in soil and produce good growth, but infertility apparently is caused by soil acidity rather than by lack

Heslep's work was the first study of infertility in acid soils in Calirnia. It was limited to two types of soil, and it remains to be seen whether his findings also apply to the several hundred other kinds of acid soils in the state.

Threat to Cattle

Owners should be particularly watchful at this time of the year for signs of prussic acid poisoning in cattle, the American Veterinary Medical association advises. Wiltng, drouth, or frost causes the formation, in certain kinds of plants, of large amounts of prussic acidwhich contains deadly cyanide-and cattle that feed on these plants become sick and usually die if not treated immediately. Most Czech women live by this rule now:

"If you want to stay clear of informers denouncing you for exorbitant living, lock up your finery and keep your clothes drab.'

The Czech woman remembers only too well the many cases where wearers of expensive clothes have been accused of living above their means and by implication dealing in black market currency. They have been punished or severely admonished by the local national committee. So whether she likes it or not the

average Czech woman conforms to the "popular" fashion. This year's winter style is a dark colored coat, slacks, high felt or leather boots and a scarf wrapped around her head. This combination may look well on tall, slim women but is not particularly suited to the Slav figure of broad hip and cheek bones. Scarves have a long tradition in this country, being part of many peasant national costumes, but city women have never taken kindly to



> Last year, the BAE reports, that the increase of three and one-half in use of cigarettes was per cent, bringing the total for the year to 352 billion. But population increased more than 1 per cent. The increase in cigarettes for the first half of the year was about 2 per cent, and for the last half was just about even with the 1948 conption for those months. With estimated population increase of more than two and one-half million, this figures to a per capita supply of 2.435 cigarettes in 1949 as
