### Farm Wagon Disappearing As Truck Takes up Burden

Not many farmers own both a truck and a trailer used for moving crops to market, says the U.S. department of agriculture. But nearly half the farmers own one or the other, according to a survey by the bureau of agricultural economics. Many farm trucks, of course, are heavy duty equipment, but the survey show that about 40 per cent of the trucks are rated at half-ton capacity or less. Some trailers are for delivery of heavy or bulky loads and are hauled to town by a tractor. Buyers do about 22 per cent of the hauling from farm to market. Hired equipment accounts for hauls about a third; and the farmers haul the remainder with their own trucks and trailers.



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

### Air-Minded Franklin

Benjamin Franklin was present at many of the trials and experiments with balloons in France. I's saw the first ascent of human passengers in a free balloon at the Chateau de la Muette in Passy. The Marquis d'Arlandes and Pilatre de Rozier, the scientist, were raised about 500 feet into the air, burning straw, as they went, in a grate hung underneath the balloon. Their perilous journey took them across the Seine to a safe landing in Paris. That evening, the Marquis, together with Mongolfier, called on Franklin. What was said by these adventurous spirits has not been recorded but the next day Franklin wrote to Sir Joseph Banks, "I am sorry this experiment is so totally neglected in England, where mechanic genius is so strong."

### British Life Insurance

Record purchases of new life insurance in British companies last year brought ownership totals in those companies to a new high level at the start of this year. This was accomplished in spite of a decrease in the other major savings channels, national savings. The '49 life insurance purchases of 550,-000,000 pounds were about 4 per cent over the record set in the previous year and double those of 10 years ago. Life insurance ownership had reached 5,350,000,000 pounds at the end of 1948, up 400,-000,000 pounds in the year and 50 per cent over the ownership of ten years before.

### Weight of Rails

Rails ranging in weight from 50 to 155 pounds per yard are in use class I railroads of the on the United States. On trunk line railroads, rail weights range from 85 pounds upward. The weight of rails in Class I railway track throughout the United States was increased from an average of 82.89 pounds per yard in 1921 to 100.73 pounds per yard in 1948. At the beginning of 1949, there were 132,904 miles of mainline railroads equipped, with rails weighing 100 pounds or more vard


Africa's "Gold Coast"


