

In addition, where slight cracks have begun to appear in your wooden possessions, they can be filled in quite handily by simply applying a shellac stick, obtainable at any hardware store.

America's Bald Eagle

There are two sub-species of America's living bald eagle, the big northern and the smaller south ern varieties, the latter ranging as far south as northern Mexico. These eagles build their often huge nests high in tall trees or on lofty, rocky crags. Almost invariably they nest near lakes and other waters, for fish and water fowl are favorite foods. Most of the fish captured are dead or spent, although some are taken from the successful hunter. the osprey, which is forced to drop its victim in flight.

Frozen Crushed Fruit Crushed frozen fruit gives a delightful flavor to ice cream, sherberts, and beverages. With this fact in mind, food preservation specialists urge that some fruits be crushed and frozen for this purpose. Why can't we see the other side of the moon? The moon goes around the earth once in 27 1/3 days, and in this same period turns once on its axis. This is just enough to keep the same hemisphere always turned toward the earth. Sometimes people find it hard to understand why we say that the moon is rotating when it always keeps the same region toward us. However, an observer out in space toward the sun, watching the movements of the two bodies, would see all parts of the moon during the 27-day period.

Warning to Motorists

Even motorists with excellent vision are warned that the spacing between cars of one length for each 10 miles of speed-as stated by law in some states—is not enough. A safe stopping distance can be calculated by squaring the speed in miles per hour and dividing by 10. Thus, at 30 miles per hour, 30 times 30 equals 900; divide by 10, and you find that your safe stopping distance is 90 feet. On packed snow or partly lcy pavements divide by five instead of 10, and on ice or sleet

Bad for Calves

There's trouble ahead when calves make pigs out of themselves pastures, veterinarians warn. Calves under six months of age are inable to store large amounts of grass, due to underdevelopment of the rumen. Moreover, grass is largely water and does not provide nutrients in the volume needed for rapid growth. The result, usually, is that the youngsters scour and fail to gain weight, especially if they fill up on grass and refuse grain.

#### Future Operation 'Haylift' **Guide From Starved Sheep**

Starvation experiments on sheep have turned up information that will aid stockmen in the event of another "Operation Haylift" emer-

These studies, made by veterinarians in South Africa, showed that sheep getting their first feed after several days of starvation do better on a poor ration than a good

Sheep ate sparingly for three to five days when given a high-protein ration following a 96-hour starvation period. But when offered bulky, lowprotein rations-of a type commonly regarded as poor feed in the United States-the animals started to eat normal amounts immediately and regained strength much fast-

The explanation is that starvation temporarily reduced the numbers of helpful bacteria in the rumen of the sheep. Without sufficient numbers of such bacteria, normal digestion could not take place and appetite for concentrated feed was diminished accordingly. In all such cases, it is impor-

tant to get a large amount of bulky feed into the rumen without delay, so as to restore rumen function. When western blizzards left thousands of cattle and sheep near

death from hunger two winters ago, many stockmen learned the hard way that animals cannot be started back on full feed abruptly. Severe digestive troubles were common and in many cases were traceable to failure of owners to provide light, easily digestible rations following the extended starvation pe-

#### Beasts, Fish, Join Birds, Invade Air Travel Lines

The air travel market is booming with lizards and boa constrictors, cows and bears, race horses and frogs.

Prior to 1940 live cargo was shipped, with few exceptions, via rail, boat and truck. It took World War II and the international transport of war materials by airplane to demonstrate the commercial potential of the flying boxcar.

Today an impressive fleet of airow ratio as one to three was borne Noah's Arks is carrying everything from chickens to tropical fish, mice, and monkeys. No less than 1,150 scheduled and 15,000 nonscheduled cargo planes operate from within the U.S. alone.

Animals have become such an important part of skyway traffic that the British Royal Society for the prevention of cruelty to animals has established at London airport an animal reception center and hospital, equipped with everything from oxygen tents to exercise yards. Machines Cut Cotton Labor

Complete mechanization of cotton production "from seedbed preparation through storage and ginning," is the goal of the program in which 15 Cotton Belt States are cooperating with the U.S. department of agriculture, says Dr. P. V. Cardon. administrator of agricultural research. He summarizes one phase of this program as follows: "Studies in the Mississippi Delta show that 155 man hours are required to prolous industrial growth has been duce a bale of cotton with one-row mule-drawn equipment, and hand chopping and picking. The use of tractor-drawn equipment and a mechanical harvester reduce the manhours to 45, and by also using the rotary hoe and flame cultivator the time was further reduced to 30 hours. If cotton production were completely mechanized and all hand work eliminated, the study indicates that a bale of cotton could be produced in the Delta with only 10 man-hours.

> Test for Stomach Cancer An ingenious balloon test for cancer of the stomach has been devised by a group of doctors from and New York hospital, New York.

A rubber balloon covered with short pieces of braided silk and attached to the end of a tube is swallowed into the patient's stomach and then inflated, the doctors say. Cells from the stomach lining cling to this balloon "brush." The apparatus is deflated and withdrawn and the cells are removed by washing in a special solution. The cells are then examined by means of the smear test.

Pillows Need Airing

Now is a good time to get all your bed pillows outside and give them the air. Either hang them on the clothesline or lay them on a sheet on the ground. Place them in the shade, as the sun's heat may destroy the natural oil in the feathers. Let them breathe the fresh air for at least a half day and fluff them up periodically. During this process, you might test them for resiliency. Push down in the center and notice whether the pillow rebounds to plump fullness when pres sure is released. If not, you need new pillows. That "rebounding" quality is necessary to give proper

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

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

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
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
