

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FOIL-AND WHAT A DELICIOUS USE IT IS

Roast the holiday turkey in aluminum foil if you want the "juiciest" and tenderest turkey that you have ever eaten, says Louise Mason, extension foods and nutrition specialist of Texas A & M College. She especially recommends this method of roasting for those who do not own a roasting ing job is done. pan or an adequate roaster.

The procedure for roasting in foil is simple and easy. Just dress, stuff and truss the turkey in the usual manner, says Miss Mason. Use a sheet of foil that is twice as long as the bird for the wrapping job. Place the bird lengthwise on one end of the foil sheet and then bring the foil up and over the bird and close all foil edges to-

Russians Remove Prisoners' Pallor With Sun Tanning

UDINE, ITALY - The Russians want their prisoners to appear healthy. As a result nine Mussolini diplomats got a month's sun-tan treatment to remove their war-prison pallor before they were returned to Italy.

The diplomats, arrested in the Italian legation at Bucharest and Sofia in 1943, were-returned to Italy after seven years' confinement in Russia.

When a reporter expressed surprise at their healthy ap pearance, one of the group said they were taken from their Moscow prison and sent to a Soviet camp near Vienna. There they were ordered to spend their days in the sun.

Trawlers Dragged at Sea, Captains Blame Submarine

PORTLAND, Me.-Two fishing dragger captains reported recently that they thought the mysterious underwater object that almost sank their ships was a Russian subma

Capt. Arthur W. Jordan of the 110-foot Cherokee said that ten minutes after he had lowered his nets and made them fast with heavy steel cables, the nets were pulled taut and the boat was pulled, sternfirst, for 25 minutes until the cables snapped.

Soon after that, the Cherokee picked up a distress call from the dragger Evzone, commanded by Captain Jordan's brother, Thomas, The message said it had been pulled astern for 90 minutes until the cables snapped.

Both captains ascribed their experiences to a Russian submarine because the Coast Guard reported there were no American submarines in the area. Neither did Canada have submarines there and it was not a whale, they held, because the cables had been snapped by

Making a Comeback From the County PMA Committee

Since 1933, government price support programs on basic farm commodities have shown a profit of \$45 million, according to B. F. Committee. As defined in legislation, the "basic" commodities are corn, cotton, peanuts, rice, tobacco,

Mr. Vance said that a study of the figures on program operations of the Commodity Credit Corporation from 1933 through June 30 of this year shows that, of the total \$9.9 billion invested in programs for these crops, \$8.7 billion represented loans including those on farm storage facilities, and the balance purchases. Losses were sustained on four of the basic crops, but these were more than offset by gains of \$203 million on cotton and \$5 million on tobacco.

Loans and purchases for all commodities, basic and others, rep esented an investment of more than \$13 billion, of which \$9.5 billion were loans. Losses realized on all programs were \$636 million, or 5 cents out of every dolmals. To meet the demand he has lar invested. A total of \$578 million was spent in supporting prices for white potatoes, and losses in connection with this crop amountof each dollar invested. 

Kris Kringle Isn't Really Santa Claus

Popular notion seems to imply hat Kris Kringle is a German erm of endearment for Santa Claus. Just what motivates this dea is not at all clear, since Kris Kringle is really a modification of Christkind who, although endowed by German legend as a gift-giver, resembles Santa Claus not in the least.

Santa Claus, as we know him in America, never really caught on in Germany. St. Nicholas comes around on his liturgical feast day—December 6 — with his pockets bulging with candy and nuts and winkets. Well and good, but German parents maintain, as did their predecessors of the Reformation era, that the central idea of Christmas, the birth of Jesus, should dominate the observances.

Nor is Christkind depicted as the Infant Jesus himself, but rather as his messenger and gift-bearer who comes to earth at Christmastime to bring happiness to good children. The Christkind is usually represented as a child dressed in white robes, wearing a golden crown and having big, golden wings.

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

Danger of Fire Is **Greatly Enhanced** By Christmas Tree

THE AVERAGE CHRISTMAS tree can go up in smoke in only two minutes. That doesn't leave much time for the fire department to get

A live tree with roots packed in a bucket of earth is the safest. Be sure and keep the dirt moistened. A small tree is safer than a large one and festive trimmings can make up what it lacks in size.

Keep the tree outdoors until you are ready to set it up inside. When you bring it in, keep it in the coolest part of the house with the radiator nearest it turned off. Use noninflammable aluminum

foil-not cotton or paper-to conceal container in which tree is "planted." Use noninflammable trimmings on the tree. Don't use lighted candles. (This

may seem an unnecessary precau-tion in this day of electric lights, but lighted candles contribute to tragic fires every year.) Check the wiring for the tree to

see that it's not frayed and is in perfect condition. The switch for turning off and on electric lights should be at some distance from the tree. Don't plug or unplug lights beneath the tree. Don't leave tree lights on when

it isn't necessary and especially when the family is away from home. From time to time, check over the tree and see if needles near the lights are turning brown. If they have, move the lights. Watch the calendar. New Year's

is the day for the tree to go down. If you should extend the time, don't leave the lights on the tree for more than a half hour at a time.

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

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Poliomyelitis Researcher Offers New Theory on Virus

The nucleus of cells in the spinal cord may be the place where polio-myelitis virus is manufactured when infantile paralysis attacks

the body. This new theory about the origin of the mysterious virus, whose exact composition still baffles science, was advanced by Joseph L. Melnick, associate professor of microbiology at the Yale school of medicine and one of the leading investigators in the field of poliomyelitis. He was assisted in his research by John B. LeRoy, who received his M.D. degree from Yale in June and is now an interne at the Hospital of St. Raphael in New Haven.

The work of Drs. Melnick and eRoy was aided by March of Dimes unds from the national foundaion for infantile paralysis, and was conducted in the section of preventive medicine at Yale.

Dr. Melnick said that his research, if verified in subsequent work, suggests also that small amounts of poliomyelitis virus may be locked away in the nucleus of the cell for as long as several months after the disease and recovery have occurred. This opens a new field of investigation on the significance of the duration of im-

He presented his findings at the ding scientific session of the seventh congress of the International Society for Cell Biology, which ecently met at Yale. In his audiice were some of the greatest scithem authorities on some aspect of

Universal "Medicine" for All Diseases Is Reported

A universal "medicine" good for treating all diseases has been reported by Dr. W. W. Bauer of Chi-

medicine, and other great sci entific advances of the past 50 years enable the modern doctor to relieve suffering and save lives in many situations in which he would have een helpless a half-century ago, Dr. Bauer pointed out. These victories and the growth of specialism in medicine have not subtracted from the responsibilities of the family doctor as was believed until recently. They have added to them.

The control of this disease is best accomplished by one of the following plans: Test, segregation and slaughter. The entire herd should be tested as the test has its limitations in detecting infection in individual animals. The reactors should be disposed of as soon as possible. If breeding stock is to be raised from the herd, pigs should tested at weaning and all negative animals removed and placed on clean ground away from the old pens and herd. The gilts should be retested prior to breeding, and should be bred to a noninfected boar. The other plan for controlling brucellosis is the sale of the entire herd for slaughter. The premises should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected. Replacements should fe purchased from herds free of infection if possible and placed on clean ground.

When Nickel Was A Nuisance

Only in comparatively recent times has the value of nickel to the steel industry been realized. Once, the metal was considered a mere nuisance. In the early part of the 18th century, miners in Saxony started to develop a deposit of what they thought was copper. The metal they obtained proved to be so tough that they could not work it into useful articles, and in exasperation they called it "Kupfer-Nickel," which translates into "Old Nick's Copper." It was not until 1751 that a Swedish scientist named Cronstedt, after considerable research. found that "Kupfer-Nickel" contained a previously unknown metal along with the copper. Since there was already a name to describe the alloy, he dropped the inaccurate part of it and called his discovery

Time Vs. Mileage

The theory that time rather than miles should be the basis for automobile maintenance inspections, guarantees, etc, is attracting attention. Those advocating the idea stress the fact that stop and go driving in crowded traffic is harder on cars, takes less miles, and uses more time. That is why they contend that lubrication jobs and oil change should be "every two weeks or every 1,000 miles which-ever comes first."
