Wildlife Refuge gives youth a lesson in nature

It is not a typical summer job.

Five area youth have been spending their summer learning about the great outdoors, about Mother Nature and about the nation's natural environment and heritage.

They are all interns who are currently working at the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge as part of the United States Youth Conservation Corps program.

"The purpose of the program is to provide them with summer jobs and teach them about the refuge, environment and wildlife, as well as soil and water conservation," said Tim Boutell, a group leader and teacher at Watson Junior High School.

Boutell has been assisting youth in the program this summer. Participants include Rob Clapp of Muleshoe, Monty Turney of Enochs, Brady Coffman of Morton, Albert Alvarado of Morton and Lissa

Leffler of Muleshoe. The youth are all in high school and are between the ages of 15-18.

They were all chosen at random after applying for the program, which is held every two years at the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge. The youth work approximately eight weeks, 40 hours a week.

Don Clamp, director of the Wildlife Refuge said, "They do a lot to keep the area attractive and maintained, doing things we are normally not able to do with the small staff we

"The program began June 6 and will finish on Friday, July

"The youth are paid for their work and earn every dime of it," Boutell said. "They spend a lot of time out in the hot sun."

"The program teaches them good work ethics and for many of them, it is their first real job," Boutell said.

Rob Clapp, a participant in the program, said, "This job is something that keeps me out of the house. It feels good to finish a project here and know it will be here a long time for people

evaluates grazing

At the July 20th meeting of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County (ASCS) committee, a group of interested farmers met with the county committeemen to discuss changing the six-month grazing period dates.

A random phone poll of farmers who own cattle, who lease their wheat grazing to others and those who have no cattle, showed there was a great deal of interest and possible need to change the grazing dates.

The phone poll included a large number of voters in Bailey County. The majority of these saw a positive benefit derived from moving the grazing date forward two weeks in the fall, resulting in two weeks more grazing in the spring, since most of the wheat is not ready by Oct. 15 anyway.

The majority view from cattlemen was that cattle gain the most in the spring not in the fall. For example cattle on feed in early fall generally gain one pound as opposed to three pounds in late spring. From this assumption you could expect 42 pounds of gain per head from a two week extension at an estimated \$.75 x 30,000 head

More urban kids to be eligible to ride school buses

After some discussion Monday night, The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees approved a new bus route plan for the 1994-95 school year. The new plan will save the school district on mileage but calls for the elimination of one route. The new plan will also involve the elimination of one driver.

In adopting the new plan Monday, MISD also labeled two of the bus routes as "Hazardous" since they will all pick up students on high density traffic streets, major highways and/or areas where they would have to cross railroad tracks.

Buck Johnson, superintendent of operations for MISD said, "This new route favors routes in urban areas. Essentially, what we have done by rerouting is we are now eligible to increase the amount of reimbursement we get (from the state)."

The new route favors urban

Bill Moore, superintendent for Muleshoe Schools said, "If a child lives two miles from the school but has to cross an area the state considers a hazard, such as a railroad crossing, then we will be able to pick him up in a bus so he doesn't have to cross that area."

Johnson said that with the two bus routes that are considered "hazardous", more students will be eligible to ride the buses.

He said, "By having these two routes designated as hazardous, we can pick up people in a two-mile limit from schools and get reimbursed from the state,'

According to Johnson, the school will reduce its mileage by almost 200 miles under the new bus routes.

Board member Edwin Cox asked if the rerouting will mean longer time spent on the bus for some kids.

Johnson responded, "The

average time will be about the same. Prolongness may be increased by 10-15 minutes at the most for some."

MISD will have 14 bus routes this school year. The rerouting is also expected to reduce maintenance costs slightly with the reduction in mileage.

In other business Monday, the board continued discussing the 1994-95 budget.

Cotton conference to be held in January in San Antonio

MEMPHIS — "Expanding a Resourceful Business" is the theme of the 40th annual Beltwide Cotton Production Conference set for January 4-5 at the Marriott Rivercenter in San Antonio.

U.S. cotton producers and other conferees will hear about the newest production technology and tools available and innovative trends in production techniques and environmental stewardship.

They also will get insight on issues and legislation affecting U.S. cotton, a cotton supply and demand outlook, an update on the National Boll Weevil Eradication Program and an assessment of the 1994 crop's fiber quality.

The forum's second day will feature in-depth workshops on the latest trends in biotechnology, physiology, conservation tillage, nematode management, fiber quality, weed/insect management, Pima production and ginning technology.

The New Developments From Industry session offers additional information on new cotton varieties, implements, plant protection chemicals and information delivery systems.

"Each of the topics and sessions offered is aimed at helping today's already resourceful cotton producers increase their efficiency and profitability," said Dave Guthrie, manager of

production technology for the National Cotton Council, which sponsors the Beltwide Cotton Conferences.

"That's consistent with the conferences' goals of helping producers reduce their production and marketing costs and improve lint and seed quality."

Guthrie, who is responsible for developing the production program, said, "We must continue to provide cotton producers with a full range of timely information, from innovative farming techniques to impending regulations, to help them succeed."

"They don't just grow a crop. They're in the business of producing America's No. 1 food and fiber crop. They're in the business of supplying our nation with an industrial raw material that is essential to our economic and physical wellbeing."

The production conference will be followed by 12 cotton technical conferences January 6-7. Producers and other conferees can hear cotton scientists share what's in the research pipeline in disciplines ranging fro soil management to fiber quality measurement. They also can visit The Cotton Foundation Exhibit, where 40-plus cotton suppliers discuss their newest products and services.

The Beltwide Cotton Conferences is one of the fastest growing events of its kindwith attendance having soared from 700 in 1975 to 4,000 plus today. Much of that growth is due to a steady increase in attendance among cotton producers, ginners and their family-business partners, a sector that now comprises more than a third of attendance.

The annual forum also is experiencing a healthy growth in attendance among cotton processors, scientists, Extension personnel, county agents, consultants, agribusiness representatives and others with direct involvement in the U.S. cotton industry.

does more than busy the youth with chores.

"It opens up the possibility of career opportunities and encourages youth to go into the wildlife service."

The participants have also had many opportunities to learn about wildlife and nature. They were visited by officials from the Soil Conservation

Service, who came out and talked to them about soil conservation, thus increasing their understanding.

The youth were also educated on how the refuge affects farmers in the area.

"They are not just out here painting, they are also learning about wild life and about the environment," Boutell said. Boutell said the youth also attend a safety meeting at least once a week, where they are taught how to use equipment and given advice.

Boutell said that an average of 1,000 visitors go to the Wildlife Refuge a month. Many come out during October through March, when the crane are there. He said a large number also come out to do other types of bird watching.

on feed could produce near 1 million dollars of income for the county on a resource we already have simply by extending the grazing date two weeks less in the fall and two weeks more in the spring.

Without exception those polled with no cattle interest saw no negative effect on themselves as a result of this change and felt that what is good for the county is good for everyone. The three counties adjoining ours have already changed the grazing dates and are enjoying the increased revenue produced.

This change would give' those not wishing to reseed their wheat acres extra time to plow it under. It would also give those wishing to bale their wheat more time and for those in the custom baling business an opportunity to bale more acres of wheat. Most farmers bale their haygrazer from flex acres in the summer not ACR acres in the fall, when it has very little protein value. A two week change should make little difference on those who use haygrazer or the custom baler.

As a result of the committee meeting it was agreed to allow all voters a chance to have a say in this matter. Our committeemen give of their time to serve their community and should be commended for the job they do and their willingness to listen to the voters. You will be receiving a ballot in the mail. If you feel

as those people polled, that changing the grazing period to November 1 - June 1 would benefit Bailey County, then mark this on your ballot and return it to the ASCS Office by August 12th. You do have a voice, it's your program and you can make a difference.

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

Tips offered for keeping Muleshoe beautiful

The following Keep Muleshoe Beautiful suggestions have been offered by the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce & Agriculure:

Plan your landscape design so that plants with similar watering needs are grouped together. By doing so, over and underwatering plants won't be a problem. Also, select drought-tolerant plants indigenous to this area. Native plants demand less water than transplanted exotics.

Ideally, plants should be watered early in the morning. This will drastically reduce the amount of water lost to evaporation..

Watering roots too much and too often can be a problem. A good rule of thumb is to water roots deeply, about one inch, but water less often.

Install a low-volume drip irrigation sytem. More effective than traditional sprinklers, root feeders and sprayers can reduce water use by 50 percent by delivering water straight to thirsty plant roots.

Apply an antitranspirant spray to foliage such as shrubs and flowers, to protect against wind and sun scald, as well as reduce the amount of water lost through transpiration.

Keep the landscape maintained. Pruning, fertilizing and proper mowing are important as manicured plants use water more efficiently than overgrown ones.



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

Number of endangered species on the decline

Nearly 40 percent of plants and animals protected under the Endangered Species Act are now stable or improving, according to a report to Congress prepared by the Interior Department's U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Of 711 U.S. listed species for the reporting period ending Sept. 28, 1992, 10 percent were found to be improving and 28 percent were considered stable as a direct result of recovery

"These statistics tell us we are making significant progress toward restoring endangered and threatened species," said Service Director Mollie Beattie.

"All 711 species were declining when listed, and it is often difficult to identify the causes of a species' decline and stop its downward trend. A success rate of nearly 40 percent in only 20 years is remarkable."

The report, "Endangered and Threatened Species Recovery Program - Report to Congress," evaluates the recovery progress of all U.S. listed speciies and notes whether a species' status is improving, stable, declining, unknown or extinct.

This is the second such report. The first, covering species listed through Oct. 1990, found about 41 percent of listed species stable or improving.

"The difference between the 1990 report and this one can be attributed to the fact that we have added a large number of species to the list in the last two years, and many of these still require considerable work to determine their status," said

Beattie.

Among the recovery achievements documented in the report are the Aleautian Canada goose, which has rebounded from a low of 300 birds in 1967 to an estimated 7,900 during the winter of 1991/92. The Aleutian Canada goose was reclassified from endangered to threatened in 1990.

New populations of the California condor and the black-footed ferret, once extinct in the wild, have been reintroduced. The bald eagle and Arctic and American peregrine falcons have also responded to recovery efforts, and the service has proposed removing the Artic peregrine from the threatened list.

The report lists 25 species for which the service is considering proposals to remove from the list or reclassify from endangered to threatened.

The 1992 recovery report found the percentage of species considered declining dropped from 38 percent to 33 percent, but those whose status is unknown climbed to 27 percent from 19 percent.

Budgetary and staffing constraints within the service were identified as reasons for the undetermined status.

As in 1990, two percent of listed species were believed to be extinct, and it is believed that most reached that status before being listed.

However, service biologists are reluctant to delist these species if there is a chance they could still be found. Recently, a species of butterfly - the Palos Verde blue - thought to be extinct, was rediscovered in California.

Of the 711 U.S. speciies included in the report, 410 or 58 percent had approved recovery plans. Draft plans had been developed for an additional 58 species. Of those remaining, 170 species had been listed for less than three years.

Under a new policy recently anounced by Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt, recovery plans will be drafted within 18 months of a species' Visting and completed within another year. While these plans are being developed, recovery activities are often already underway, conducted by the service and other agencies.

Recovery plans function s working guidelines which outline specific tasks required for species recovery.

While they carry no legal authority, recovery plans provide a framework for recovery used by federal, state, county and private agencies. Many plans are developed by the service in coordination with these other agencies and organizations.

Legal Matters

By Dan Morales, Texas Attorney General

For almost three decades, Medicaid has helped pay for medical care for poor Texans. Medicaid is a vital lifeline, but it is threatened when unscrupulous health care providers try to defraud the system to get more money than they legally deserve.

To help eliminate this kind of fraud and protect our citizens, our Medicaid Fraud Control Unit vigorously conducts criminal investigations into allegations of fraud and abuse

by Medicaid providers.

These complaints include, but are not limited to, abuse

and neglect of our elderly in nursing homes, overpayments to Medicaid providers, and misappropriation of patient trust funds by health care facilities.

How do providers defraud Medicaid? Some unscrupulous providers cheat the Medicaid program by billing for services that are either unnecessary or are never actually done. Our Medicaid Fraud Control Unit recently investigated a case where an ambulance company netted more than \$60,000 for transporting a man to a dialysis clinic that was located only five blocks

from his home.

To maximize their illegal gains, the company was billing the state for non-emergency transportation of a severly disabled patient when, in fact, the man was not disabled and easily could have walked to the clinic.

We also investigated a case where a mother took her five children to the doctor to be treated for lice. The doctor treated only two of the kids, but billed Medicaid for all five.

How Can You Help? You can help us prevent Medicaid fraud. If you are visiting a medicaid provider and you

have a feeling that something is just not right, don't hesitate to ask these questions:

*Are the services you are receiving medically necessary?

*Are the services you are receiving consistent with your medical condition? Remember, you always have the right to ask questions about the treatment you receive. If you suspect health care providers of Medicaid fraud, abuse or neglect, contact our office at 1-800-252-8011 or 1-512-463-2011. Our mailing address is Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, P.O. 


