### Doctor Recommends Special Treatment For 'Thumbsuckers'

CHICAGO — A recommendation that special treatment, both psychological and dental, be given to the child who sucks his thumb beyond the age of three and one-half was made in The Journal of the American Dental Association.

"It is a habit which produces a penalty of subsequent deformity out of all proportion to the crime," Dr. Edward S. Mack, of San Francisco, instructor of dentistry for children at the School of Dentistry, College of Physicians and Surgeons, declared.

"A feeling that he is loved and is secure should be instilled in the young child," he said.

Dr. Mack, however, took issue with the point of view that prevention of thumbsucking can cause a deep-seated frustration. Pointing out that there are many natural behavior patterns which must be curbed or stopped in the child, he named lying, stealing, showing hate openly for persons, having temper tantrums or putting all available objects in the mouth.

"Each of the training processes involving these acts . . . are to a great degree frustrations," Dr. Mack said. "Since it is natural for an infant to put most available matter into his mouth, the stopping of this act is a frustration of a natural behavior pattern."

"Compared to the intensity of frustration involved in the aforementioned necessary frustrations, the correction of thumb-sucking hardly bears mentioning. It is by no means capable of disturbing the psychic balance to as great an extent as some of these. Yet, this habit is not tampered with because of fear of frustration alone."

Dr. Mack listed possible effects of thumb-sucking as abnormal development of the jaws, misshapen nose and lip structure, irregular permanent teeth, speech defects and mouth breathing that may lead to respiratory infections.

### Hummingbird Wing-Beats High as 50 to the Second

MONTREAL, Can. — Motion picture studies have revealed that the ruby-throated hummingbirds who breed in Canada and often fly as far south as Panama during the winter have wing-beats averaging 50 to the second. Scientists have never been able to discover how these little birds keep going on their long flights, although the legends that they hitchhike on the backs of large birds, such as the Canada Goose, are generally not believed.

The chimney swift is also something of a traveler. One banded in Ontario was discovered along the Amazon river in Peru.

### Birds Place Live Ants In Feathers, Expert Says

WASHINGTON, D.C.—A variety of kinds of small birds, among them the hermit thrush, place live ants in their feathers, apparently to rid themselves of feather lice. This curious custom is described in a bulletin on North American thrushes by Arthur Cleveland Bent, issued by the Smithsonian Institution.

The birds, according to the bulletin, seize the ants and place them in their feathers, usually under the wings. They may also crush the ants with their bills and rub the juices on their feathers, or they may dust themselves in ant hills.

Various theories have been advanced to explain this behavior. It is generally believed that both the live ants and the formic-acid secretions from the crushed ones repel feather lice. Some believe that birds eat ants for the formic acid, which may act as a medicine to increase muscular energy and expel internal parasites.

Mr. Bent describes the hermit thrush as the most gifted songster of North American birds and gives an extensive analysis of its somewhat complicated song. Relatively few, he says, have heard the bird at its best because of its solitary woodland life.

### Duchess of Windsor Named Among Fascinating Women

CHICAGO—The History Research Department of The BOOK HOUSE FOR CHILDREN has selected the Duchess of Windsor as "one of the ten most fascinating women of all times."

Others named in an evaluation made to determine the outstanding "femme fatales" down through the ages were nearly all women who helped to make history or to break it.

They include: Salome, Cleopatra, Helen of Troy, Marie Antoinette, Catherine the Great of Russia, George Sand, Mata Hari, Zenobia, and Theodora, a musical comedy star who ascended to the throne of the Byzantine Empire through her marriage to the great emperor, Justinian.

The beautiful Zenobia, who ruled the Kingdom of Palmyra in the Arabian Desert during the third century A.D., was a descendant of Cleopatra.

"Also rans" in the balloting were Mary Garden; Sappho, the Greek poetess; and Lady Wu, the harem girl who became Empress of Ancient China.

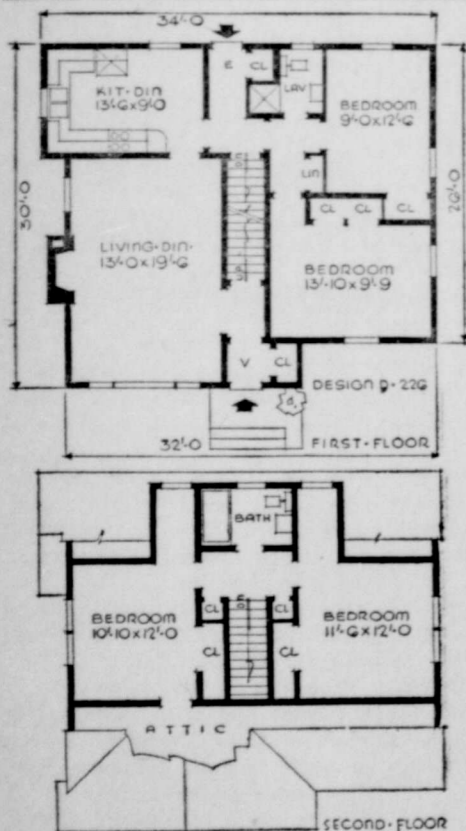

### Small House Plan- ning Bureau, St. Cloud, Minnesota

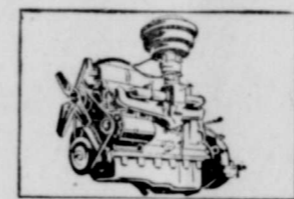

the bedrooms with double doors and storage space above, linen closets on both floors and coat closets at the front and rear entrances.

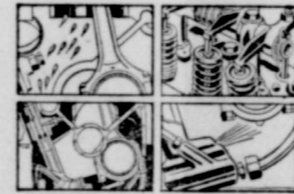
Cabinets in the kitchen are in the efficient U-shape with sink in the center, stove on the left and refrigerator on the right.

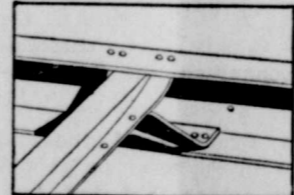

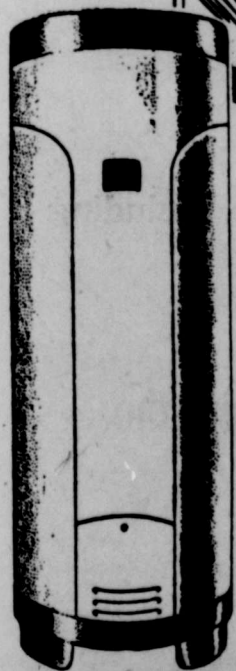

**Plastic Eyeglass Frames  
Attractive and Durable**

Plastics improve on nature in their variety of colors, their beautiful textures, and their design. But the plastics that are used for making eyeglass frames are much more than merely attractive. They are soft and smooth, yet tough and almost unbreakable. They can be accurately tailored to give just as scientific a fitting and placing of lenses as do metal frames. But they, like metal, must go through many complex processes before they can meet the exacting standards of spectacle frames.

Optical plastic is called zylonite. The raw material for it is either cotton or clean wood pulp. This is dissolved to make a sort of cellulose jelly, which can be dyed or tinted and given decorative effects by mixing with it wood-flour or pigments or, sometimes, aluminum powder. In this stage it is plastic and can be formed into any shape. Then it is baked and becomes permanently hard, strong and transparent.

Flat sheets of this plastic are run through a series of precision machines. The first one drills holes that are very accurately located where the optical centers of the lenses will later be put. Then another machine cuts out the entire frame to make any one of a wide variety of fashionable shapes. Next the frame moves to a machine which cuts tiny slots and holes where the hinges for the earpieces are to be inserted. Still another precision cutter takes out pieces that have exactly the shape of the lenses, and then makes grooves to hold the lenses.

Meanwhile, in other machines strips of zylonite are cut into the right length for earpieces and ground on a lathe to give them the proper thickness and curvature. In the next operation, holes are drilled in these earpieces for attaching the hinges. Now the entire frame is ready to be put together.

**Nitrofurantoin Chewing Gum Users  
Develop Fewer Dental Cavities**

Another development in research on tooth decay was made known recently when two scientists reported on a preliminary experiment with a sugar-free chewing gum containing a nitrofurantoin.

Nitrofurantoin is a substance used principally as anti-bacterial agents in dressings for wounds to prevent infection.

Writing in The Journal of the American Dental Association, Dr. Samuel Dreizen and Dr. Thomas D. Spies, of the department of nutrition and metabolism of Northwestern University, Chicago, said that a group of individuals who chewed the specially-prepared gum immediately after eating showed a substantial reduction in dental decay.

"Because of the relatively small number of patients included in this study," the scientists cautioned, however, "these findings must be considered as preliminary in nature."

Their report was based on a one-year study of 80 persons between the ages of six and 38 at Hillman Hospital, Birmingham, Ala.

During the test period, an experimental group of 30 persons chewed the gum for at least 10 minutes directly after each meal. A second group of 25 persons chewed a similarly-prepared gum not containing the nitrofurantoin. The third group did not chew any gum.

X-ray examinations at the end of the year revealed that the experimental group had developed an average of only .8 new cavities compared with an average of 3 new cavities for the group that chewed the specially-prepared gum without the nitrofurantoin. In the third group an average of 3.8 new cavities developed.

**Congo Mines**

Belgian Congo tin output ranked behind that of Malaya, Indonesia, Bolivia, Thailand and Nigeria before the war. As wartime needs of the Allies reached to all unconquered corners of the world for the humble metal of many uses, the Congo production rose to stand second only to Bolivia. If the Far East were once again cut off from the West, the tin arsenal in deepest Africa would again be vital. Katanga Province is a treasure chest of many minerals. One of the last regions of the Congo to be explored and conquered, its wealth cannot yet be estimated in dollars and cents. The Manono field also produces columbium and tantalum, valuable alloys for steel. Cobalt, industrial diamonds, zinc, coal, cadmium, lead, silver, and precious metals such as platinum, palladium and gold are mined in the Congo.

**Key Deer**

Scientists labeled the Key deer *Odocoileus virginianus clavium*. The name is translatable as "Virginia whitetail of the keys" and indicates that it is a subspecies of the Virginia white-tailed deer, its widespread mainland neighbor. The conviction grows, however, that the virginianus should be dropped, since the Key deer can stand alone as a species. The Key variety does not change color in summer, as does the larger whitetail. Its horns are quite different, and other characteristics make it more like some western species than like its common eastern neighbor. Adult Key deer, on the average, weigh 35 pounds and measure less than two feet high at the shoulder.

**Vancouver Island Indians  
Were Superstitious People**

A weird supernatural world was that of the Nootkan Indians of Vancouver Island.

A monograph on the history, ways of life, and superstitions of these people by Dr. Philip Drucker, of the Bureau of American Ethnology, has just been published by the Smithsonian Institution. It deals with the tribes of these Indian fishermen before the adoption of the white man's culture.

They believed in an Undersea World where the Salmon-people and the Herring-people lived, each tribe occupying half of a great house. These beings lived there "just like people," in human form when they doffed their fish guises, which they put on or took off like robes. Another important race of spirits was called the ya'ai. They were similar in form to men with tufts of feathers projecting from each side of the head.

According to other Nootkan superstitious beliefs, several races of anthropomorphic beings inhabited the woods. There were the teiniath, for example—tall, shaggy-haired, red-skinned beings who pursued people with spears. In the same forests dwelt the "maloh," a race of peaceful giants whose women had long hair that dragged the ground when loosened.

Far more feared than either of these by the superstitious Nootkans were the lost human souls, called pugmis. When a person nearly drowned and then made his way ashore, he might see flickering fires inviting him into the woods. Should he try to go to them to warm himself they led him, like will-o'-the-wisps, on and on until he turned into a pugmis. He became an ugly white color with protruding eyes that looked like icicles. The nails of his hands and feet became long claws, and he could run with incredible speed. Such a mythical being was supposed to be thoroughly malevolent.

**World Peace Has Eluded Man  
Since Prehistoric Times**

A peaceful world has been the dream of man for more than fifty-thousand years, ever since Early Stone Age man struggled against the forces of nature in the prehistoric wilderness.

The "book house for children" tells how the idealistic young Pharaoh, Akhnaton, tried to wipe out warfare about 1360 B.C., during the Eighteenth Dynasty in Egypt. He fought with words while others fought with swords, sending messages of good-will to his enemies on all sides and making countless efforts for reconciliation. But, the barbaric tribes around Egypt, were not ready for peace tables and peace talks. They continued to live by the laws of the jungle, raiding his lands and ignoring his pleas.

In 545 B.C., a minister of the State of Sung in Ancient China was instrumental in organizing a league to preserve peace among the warring feudal lords of the Chou Dynasty. However, within less than a decade, the fourteen states that had joined the league to end war, abandoned the plan as "hopeless," and hostilities were resumed.

"To maintain the frontiers as they were, to keep peace by diplomacy, and never to wage war save in the interests of peace" became the chief aims of the great Emperor Augustus who ruled the Early Roman Empire between 27 B.C., and 14 A.D. During his reign, the Roman senate erected a great altar of peace to glorify his achievements. For two centuries afterward the Empire enjoyed an unbroken period of prosperity which became famous throughout the world as the "pax Romana" or Roman peace.

**Swiss Resources**

Switzerland has no oil resources and very little coal, but rushing mountain streams and waterfalls are plentiful. A harnessing of these waterways with the construction of some six thousand power stations in the 20th century gave the country an abundance of cheap hydroelectric power. Electricity now runs her railroads; supplies her industrial plants, which absorb almost half the nation's workers, and lights nearly every Swiss home, regardless of how remote. The paucity of good farming land poses for Switzerland a perennial problem of how to feed her four and a half million people. By yeoman efforts during World War II the nation managed to bring more than a thousand square miles of previously unfermed land into cultivation, but two-fifths of her people still depend on imported food. The most prosperous farms lie on the fertile plains east of the Jura mountains, which serve as a boundary between France and Switzerland.

**Dreaming Time**

Though it is known that one dreams with considerable rapidity, psychologists cannot say how long a dream lasts. Some experiments with a hypnotized subject have shown that in a hypnotic trance a person can, in a few seconds, go through experiences which would take ten minutes when awake. It seems certain that under hypnosis one can arrive at judgments in a time which is inconceivably fast compared with normal time. In the case of hypnotism, as with dreams during normal sleep, we are dealing with what is commonly called the unconscious mind.

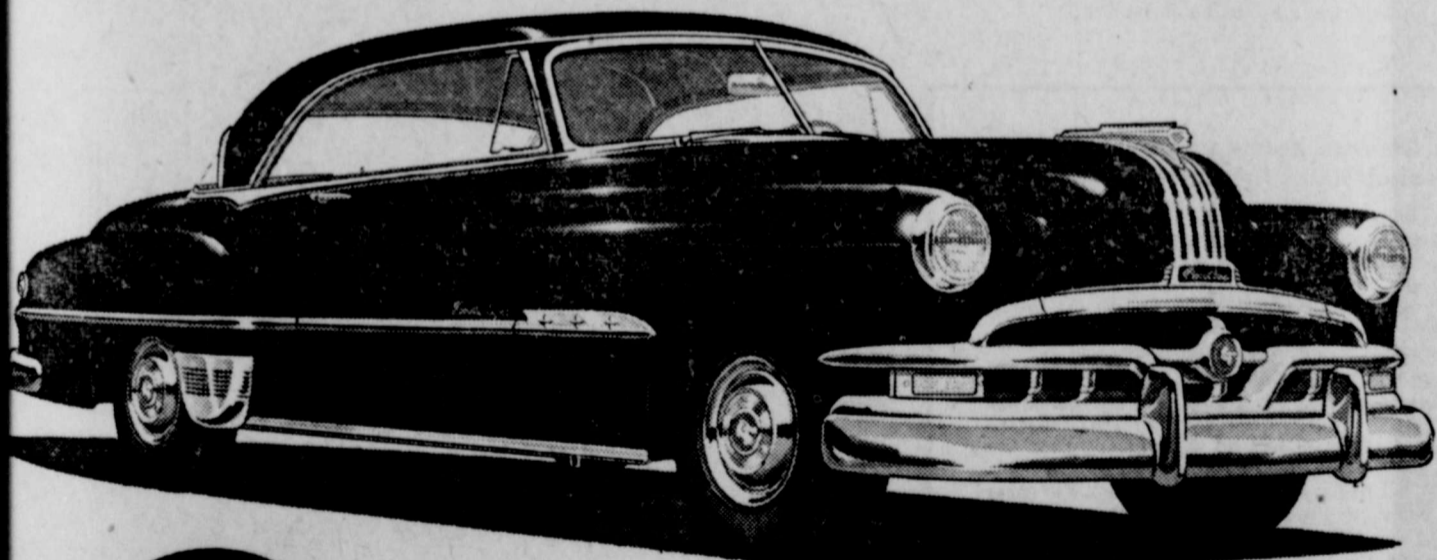

### Fact and Fancy Shrouds Popular Pelican Clan

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Is it true that the pelican is the only bird offering social security benefits to its aged?

The romantic but persistent voice of legend says yes. The tale is told that when parent pelicans get old and feeble the younger members of the family take over. The "children" catch and store fish in their own pouches, it is said, in order to serve dinner to nest-ridden elders.

On cold and bitter nights the young are reputed to pull the warm blanket of their wings and bodies across the shivering oldsters. And, according to legend, if a move from the nest is necessary, the strong younger generation will bear weak parents away on their own broad backs.

The pelican's reputation for parental self-sacrifice, however, is even stronger than that for filial devotion. During ancient and medieval times it was generally believed that the mother pelican would give her own life's blood to starving youngsters in days of famine. The story lives today on the official seal of the State of Louisiana and in countless examples of early religious art throughout England and France.

Although most authorities discount such tales, the facts of pelican peculiarities often do seem stranger than fiction. The big bird lives almost entirely on fresh fish. He is, therefore, conveniently equipped with a fish-net like appendage that swings grotesquely beneath his long beak.

North America's two members of the family—the brown pelican of the southern coasts and the white pelican of western lakes—both show astonishing skill in fishing. Yet their methods are entirely different. The smaller brown pelican works alone. He cruises along at from 25 to 50 feet above the water until he sights a fish. Going into a power dive, he hits the water fast with his mouth open. The fish goes into the pouch, the water drains off, and dinner is served.

The white pelican—one of the oldest surviving forms of bird life in the world—is highly social, flying in companies and nesting in colonies. His fish are caught in cooperation with his fellows. Working as a team, white pelicans fly to the off-shore fringe of a school of fish, land on the water in a semi-circle and drive the school toward land. In the shallow water the fish are scooped up in the pouch-nets.

The pouch has another, equally serviceable, use. Bald and helpless baby pelicans cannot digest whole fish. Their parents do it for them. At meal time the older birds provide a highly nourishing fish soup which is served to youngsters from a large, leak-proof soup tureen—the pouch, of course.

Although no longer considered a paragon of virtue, the pelican has retained the respect and affection of mankind through the centuries. It is now generally understood that the bird confines his diet largely to trash fish, which have little or no commercial value to man.

### Automatic Unit Lifts Car Top When It Starts to Rain

MIAMI, Fla.—The newest thing on the automobile market will be available soon—an automatic unit that puts up the top of a convertible at the slightest start of a rain.

Jimmy Long, 35-year-old amateur inventor, says he has solved the problem of getting up the top when it starts to rain—without leaving the comfort of the office or home. Called an automatic rain cell, the gadget is the size of a shoe polish can and can be easily mounted on any flat surface of the car.

The secret of the operation, the inventor says, is that water conducts electricity. When rain begins, it completes an electrical circuit between a series of disks, starting the raising mechanism. The first drop of water that strikes the disk will set off the action to raise the top and all the windows.

The unit, which will sell for around \$80, should be on the market during August.

### Owning Unique Automobile Has Drawbacks, It Appears

PITTSBURGH, Pa.—Johnny Tortore doesn't have the largest car in town, but he certainly has as many, or more, parking troubles than anyone else.

Johnny points with pride to "Old Betsy", but admits that owning such a model sure has complications. The car is a sleek maroon Buick—vintage of 1911. It takes a bit of cranking to get "Betsy" rolling and even then she looks awkward being driven from the right side.

The trouble, however, is in parking. The vehicle just draws too much attention from pedestrians. Johnny always seeks out the most inconspicuous of parking places, but such is hard to find. Admiring passers-by have snatched everything from the rubber ball on the horn to the brass lantern from time to time.

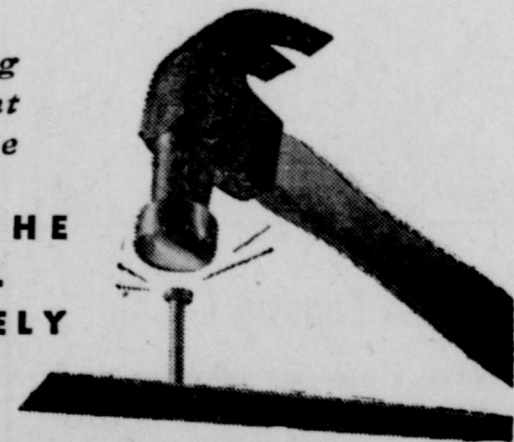
