



CITY ORDINANCE

An Ordinance Regulating the arking of Vehicles on the streets of the City of Silverton, Briscoe County, Texas, and prescribing a

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Silverton,

SECTION 1. Every person in charge of any vehicle, when parking the same upon the streets of the City of Silverton, Texas, degrees with the curb, and with gives longer life to cars. the right front wheel of said vehicle not more than six (6) inches from said curb; no vehicle, when parked at such an angle, shall have any part of same or any accessory attached, or anything carried thereon, extending more than eighteen (18) feet from curb line; and where markers and painted lines adjoining the curb and extending outward at an angle of approximately forty-five (45) degrees have been placed along any of the streets by the police officer of the City of Silverton, Texas, or under their direction, then all vehicles parked along said streets where such lines or markers are located shall be parked between

such lines with no part of such vehicle upon or over or across such lines. There shall be no double or center parking, except where the streets are marked for center parking. No vehicle extending more than eighteen (18) feet or any part of same or any accessory attached or carried thereon, shall be parked on Main Street between blocks, 36, 37,

blocks 37-48 and 36-49. SECTION 2. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$25,00.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be cumulative of all other ordinances or regulations of the City of Silverton, Texas, unless in conflict with the terms of said ordinances and regulations, in which case the terms of this ordinance shall prevail.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall become effective from and after its passage and publication, according to law.
