Urge Restoration French 'Azilum' On Susquehanna

WASHINGTON, D. C .- Farm meadows now spread over the 2,400 acres in northeastern Pennsylvania where the French village of Asylum (Azilum) sprang up in

Yet the strange story of that short-lived wilderness retreat of French exiles still holds a deep interest in the region, as a current proposal of Pennsylvania State officials for its restoration shows.

The colony was founded by aristocratic refugees fleeing the bloodletting of the French Revolution. Its site was the land within a

Liberal Royalists

Descendants of the builders still live in the neighborhood. Most of the Frenchmen made Asylum their home for a scant ten years, however, and returned to France under an amnesty proclaimed in 1802 by Napoleon.

The refugees had been part of Quitaque's Panthers, 26-20, in a set the fashion and conversation for the world. Many were deputhe tradition-smashing French National Assembly of 1789 which voted to surrender numerous feudal rights and sought to establish a Constitutional monarchy. Liberal, yet loyal to the Crown, they stayed in France after the fall of the Bastille and until the Revolution's excesses forced them to flee for their lives.

The colony's founders were Vicomte Louis de Noailles, LaFayette's brother-in-law and brotherin-arms during the American and Antoine Omer Revolution: Parisian jurist. Robert Morris, American financier, acted as land agent.

Gay Despite Hardships

An American wilderness was a far cry from the highly cultivated estates many of the colonists left behind in France; yet the royalists faced their program of community building with vigor, even gayety. In summer, French ladies planned picnics and boating parties along the scenic Susquehanna River, danced in outdoor pavilions and organized fetes under riverside trees. In winter the Grande Maison was the scene of News office. concerts, chess and card parties, and amateur dramatics,

All was not play, however. Houses were built, papered, shingled, and fitted with glass windows, then a novelty in America. Gardens, orchards and vineyards planted; blooded bulls and imported. Roads were built nto the forests, which were felled for building, tar, and potash industries.

But most of the colonists had left family, wealth, ancestral homes, and hearts in France. When Napoleon made it safe for them to return, they were content to bid farewell to their Penn's-woods Asylum,

Scientist Scales Peak Of Himalaya for Rhubarb

The Himalayan Expedition of the California Academy of Sciences has found rhubarb growing in the melting snow at an altitude of 17,500 feet in a previously unexplored area near the Nepal-Tibet border, according to Dr. Robert C. Miller, Director of the Acad-

F. A. Charlton-Thomas, leader of the expedition, describes the rhubarb in a recent report to the Academy. It is superior in flavor and free of tough fibers. He says it made a welcome addition to the camp fare. As this plant grows through a range of 900 feet at high altitude the expedition leader expressed the view that this rhubarb might be introduced into the high mountains of other continents and countries for the benefit of mountaineers, or perhaps crossed with varieties to develop domestic early, fast-growing strains. He proposes to collect seed, which he will send to the Academy.

Officials at the Academy are keeping an open mind on the subject, and any communications from mountaineers will be carefully considered before any action is taken.

Officer Tells Importance Of Tanks In Modern Wartare

Patton-like dashes by American tanks have been few and far between in Korea, but the past year of fighting over the rugged terrain has proved that tanks are essential to an Army wherever it fights.

Colonel Sidney G. Brown, Chief of the Armor Branch of the Army Field Forces' Combined Arms Section, says even an over-whelming superiority in infantry does not make to for a lack of tanks.

"Korea proves this beyond a doubt," said Colonel Brown. "The losses of the Communists in their attacks have been terrific, and one reason these losses have been so high is the fact that they no longer have tanks working with infantry."

He recalled that when the Communist forces were using tanks, their attacks carried more punchfirst early in the fighting when United Nations forces had been driven all the way back into the Pusan beachhead and later when the Chinese Communists entered the con flict and struck south.

Addison's Disease

A new treatment for Addison's disease has been revealed by a University of Michigan doctor. Dr. Jerome W. Conn, professor of internal medicine, reported that first research results with a newly manufactured drug. Corticosterone (pro nounced kor-tik-OS-te-ron), pro duced remarkable effects in the treatment of four patients suffering from the disease. The disease, which has been rapidly increasing in the United States, is caused by an abnormality of the adrenal glands situated on top of the kidneys, he explained. In Addison's disease, the gland fails to supply the body with hormonal substances necessary to maintain adequate balance of salt, potassium, water, sugar protein and other elements, Dr. Conn indicated. The disease was described by Dr. Conn as follows: (1) general muscular weakness; (2) a marked drop in blood pressure; (3) poor appetite, nausea and vomiting resulting in considerable loss of weight, and (4) a generalized darkening of the skin. Forty-eight hours after Corticosterone was given to the patients by injection, their body functions re turned to normal.

You-and the SCRAP METAL ENGENCY

ANSWERS every farmer should have to questions about scrap iron and steel

Q. Why is iron and steel scrop a matter of importance to farmers? A. Steel for our Country's defense program and civilian economy is being produced at the highest annual rate ever . . . and this will be greatly increased in 1952. Farm machinery and equipment needs must come from this over-all supply. As steel production increases the need for scrap increases.

Q. How does scrap figure in the production of steel?

A. One pound of scrap is needed to make two pounds of steel.

Q. Is scrap getting scarce?

A. Yes, the supply of scrap at the steel mills and foundries is not increasing fast enough to meet the needs of expanding steel production. Yet, there are millions of tons of idle iron and steet scrap, in small amounts, on farms throughout the country.

Q. What if the needed scrap isn't obtained?

A. That will mean a serious loss of steel production...fewer products will be made of steel. It will mean more shortages of civilian products. Defense needs come first.

Q. Why not use pig iron instead of scrap?

A. Every ton of scrap conserves ap-



Beryllium Study

Detection of as little as a billionth of an ounce of the beryllium in the body has been made possible by means of a new chemical technique Prior to 1949, beryllium was used in the manufacture of fluorescent tubes, and it is for this reason that warnings were issued against breaking old tubes in disposing of them. New compounds, which are not toxic, are now used. In an attempt to understand the nature of the action of beryllium, numerous studies are being conducted on animals, it was pointed out in a report by Dr. T. Y. Toribara and Dr. P. S. Chen, Jr., of the University of Rochester, who said: "Distribution and excretion studies using radioactive beryllium have shown where the element is deposited and its rate of elimination. These quantities of beryllium are very small, and accurate analyses are very important."

Closer Than You Think

South America's Iguassu Falls, usually bracketed with Niagara and Africa's Victoria Falls as the world's cataract giants, is closer than you think. Air travel has brought Brazil and Argentina days closer to U.S. centers of population in recent years. The two Latin Republics, sharing opposite banks of Iguassu's wide, double-horseshoe brink, are slowly and steadily beating better paths for tourists from their own big coastal cities to this majestic natural wonder in their wilderness. So far, Argentina has had the better of the competition. For decades it has maintained a good, small hotel in the national park on its side, west of the falls.

Sink Stains

Most stains on the sink can be removed with a mild abrasive. Rust stains are best removed by treating with an acid. Vinegar or lemon juice may be used, but dilute hydrochloric acid is more effective. A bleaching solution, such as Javelle water, is also quite effective in removing general stains from porcelain. It is more difficult to remove stains from the tray, since the color tends to penetrate into the plastic. Soap and water, with a mild abrasive, and perhaps lemon juice, might be of some help. Unfortunately, active organic solvents would be likely to dissolve the celluloid itself, and hence they cannot be

Powdered Peaches Produced By U.C. Food Technologists

BERKELEY - Canned peaches may soon be available in several new forms, says W. V. Cruess, professor of food technology, University of California College of Agriculture.

Crushed, pureed, thickened for pie fillings, and julienne style canned peaches have been produced. Cruess explained, in an attempt to eliminate waste from overproduc tion of clings for regular canning.

Cruess, working on this problem with Rolie O'Neal and William Rivera in the food technology department, has also produced dehydrated shoestring peaches, vacuum dried peach "nuggets," powdered peaches for baked products and

puddings, and candled peaches. These new products were reported at the annual meeting of the Institute of Food Technologists in New York.
