## Farm News From The PMA Committee Briscoe County

**THAT FIFTH PLATE**

By this is not meant an extra trip to the dentist or a new form of baseball, but it relates to the big chore facing our farmers in 1952, when our population will be at least 38 million more souls—making an extra plate necessary at our present 4-plate dinner table.

Those added persons to feed well—plus enough food for exports and reserves—equals the present population of all the New England and Middle Atlantic States, or of eight Midwest States, or of all the South. Such a stock of extra provisions would include 5 1-2 billion more pounds of red meats. This translates into the 1950 pig crops of Nebraska and Iowa, all the meat from the 1950 beef herds of Texas, Oklahoma and Minnesota and the lamb crop of 1950 in Montana, Wyoming, Nevada and Utah. About 14.7 billion extra eggs would be required, which equals the 1950 output of California, Kansas, Missouri, Illinois and Pennsylvania.

Total gross farm production to meet the expected 1952 demand means 20 per cent increased output by a farm population which is not growing in numbers as fast as our urban consumers. Instead of a recent level somewhere around 138 percent of the pre-war average farm production, a jump to 167 per cent of that base period would probably be necessary by 1952. The answer lies, say our specialists, in making each 5 acres of farm land yield as much as 6 acres do. This is best secured through research, conservation, plant food, power equipment, adequate farm credit, and fair price incentive to farmers.

The 1952 final grain sorghums price support rate for Briscoe County is \$2.33 per cwt.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced that the loan rate for 1952 crop middling 7-8-inch cotton will average not less than 30.91 cents per pound. The 1951 loan rate for the same grade of cotton was 30.46 cents per pound.

## O. C. Thornton, Accident Victim Remains Critical

Panhandle, March 18—Condition of a Silvertown man, injured in a car-truck collision in which two Berger men were killed, remained critical tonight.

He is Oliver Caney Thornton, 42 years old, driver of a gasoline transport truck which was involved in a collision early this morning with an automobile in which Walter Langford, 56, and Ralph Banda, 46, were riding. Langford and Banda were killed instantly.

Thornton is at Roberts-Hessey Hospital and Clinic in Panhandle. His condition was described as "slightly weaker" late today. He suffered a fractured skull, punctured lung and multiple bruises.

The accident occurred about 4:30 o'clock 10 1/2 miles north of Panhandle on Highway 177.

Sheriff Clarence Williams said the loaded gasoline transport apparently struck a bridge abutment and jack knifed across the road. The car in which Langford and Banda were riding hit the truck from the rear. The gasoline did not catch fire.

Both vehicles were headed south, Sheriff Williams said.

The transport driven by Thornton belongs to a Silvertown trucking firm.

Word received in Silvertown early Wednesday from the Panhandle hospital reported O. C. Thornton's condition to be slightly improved.

## Soil Conservation District News

In the area around Quitaque, farmers cooperating with the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District have completed several miles of terraces. The terraces were built during January and February on the farms of J. C. Rhoderick, Ellis Urrie, H. J. Bailey and Elmo Pointer. The Soil Conservation Service and PMA assisted in the establishment of this practice.

E. J. Hamilton, a district co-operator northeast of Quitaque, expects to plant about 25 acres of blue panicum, 7 acres of weeping lovegrass and 7 acres of King Ranch bluestem some time this month. These are deep-rooted, perennial bunch grasses, which have their best growth during warm weather. These plantings will be grazed when they have become established.

Travis Morrison, also in the Quitaque area, intends to plant five acres of King Ranch bluestem.

Any farmer or rancher interested in planting grass this spring may obtain assistance from the Soil Conservation Service, or the PMA office at Silvertown.

The supervisors of the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District have a grass seed drill which is available for farmers or ranchers to use.

## Something Can be Done About Feed, Pasture Conditions

Moisture conditions, mostly on the short side, in all sections of the state for the past two years have clearly pointed up the necessity for farmers and livestock producers to plan for a reserve supply of feed.

A. W. Crain, associate pasture specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, points out that little can be done about the weather but much can be done to prevent situations such as have faced livestock and dairy producers since the beginning of the present drought. He advises as a corrective measure, the planning of a "complete" forage program.

He says regardless of how good a permanent pasture may be, supplemental pastures or stored forages are needed to provide adequate forage for farm and ranch livestock.

By properly planning his supplemental pastures, a farmer can usually provide ample forage for the seasons when permanent pastures do not furnish adequate grazing. Crain classifies the present extended dry period as an example of the "unusual season" and adds that it is the sort of situation that livestock men must always be prepared to meet. Neither permanent nor supplemental pastures will furnish adequate grazing under very adverse weather conditions and here is where storage comes into the picture.

Crain suggests that farmers provide at least one ton of hay and three tons of silage for each cow on the farm. Without silage, at least two tons of hay are needed. He says that forage stored as silage retains more of its nutritive value than when stored as hay.

To up production during favorable growing seasons, Crain recommends the use of fertilizers on both permanent and supplemental pastures.

## Cotton Varieties for Different Sections of Texas Are Given

Cotton varieties for the different areas of Texas are given in a new bulletin, "Performance of Cotton Varieties in Texas, 1948-1950."

This bulletin, published jointly by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, gives information obtained in the first three years of a state-wide cotton variety evaluation program. Other bulletins will be issued at the end of each succeeding 3-year testing period.

Experiment station agronomists divided the state into three regions for systematic testing. And the Extension Service designated 10 production areas to provide a practical basis for variety recommendations.

D. T. Killough, agronomist in charge of the cotton variety testing program, points out that varieties recommended for a given region or area often do not include all varieties in the highest yielding group.

Varieties are recommended on basis of yield of lint cotton per acre, adaptation to harvesting methods, fiber properties, disease resistance and maturity.

Sources of seed of the varieties tested also are given in this bulletin, along with a list of the available publications on cotton production practices. Copies are available at county agents offices.

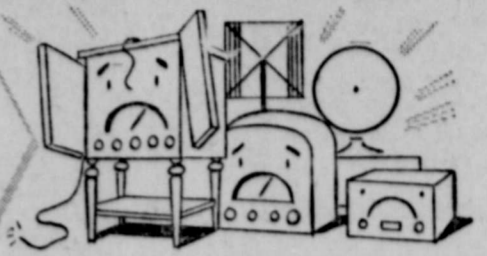

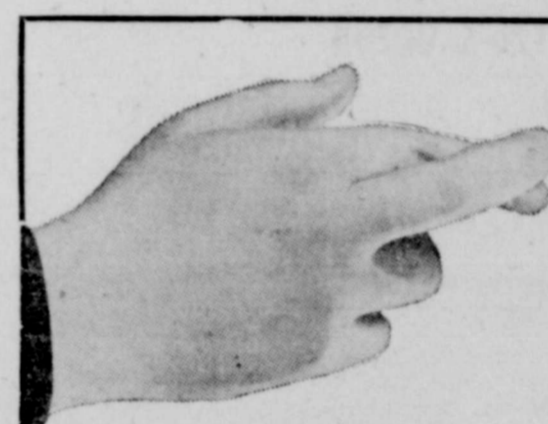

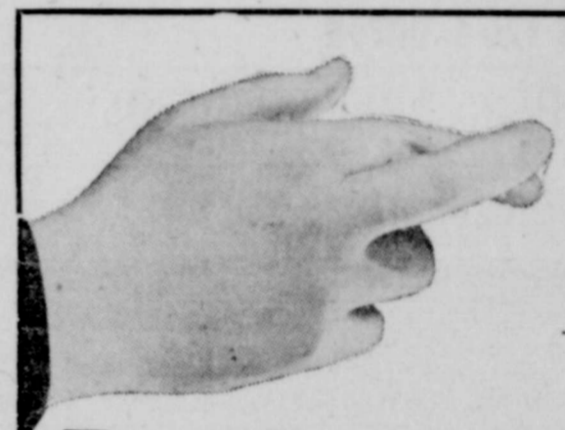
