Hq. Third Reserve District Air Force, Austin, Texas

The Air Force is trying to locate 117 air reservists in 10 Texas counties in the Childress area.

The search is in no way connected with recall to active duty, but is part of 3rd Air Reserve District's current mail-type reserve personnel survey in the area, according to Colonel W. B. Magness, Executive Officer for the district, headquartered in Austin.

Questionnaires were mailed to all air reservists in the 10 counties early this month, and the 117 men are those who have not yet returned their completed forms to the district headquarters.

The entire survey program is intended to give the Air Force accurate and correct facts and figures on its reservists in case of a national emergency. However, the program also is designed to enable reservists to determine where they stand in today's Air Force Reserve program.

Surveys underway in more densely populated regions of Texas and New Mexico feature personal interviews with reservists. The Childress area mail survey is the second undertaken by the district. The Big Bend region of Texas was surveyed earlier this year via the mail avenue.

Counties included in the Childress survey are, in addition to Childress County, Wheeler, Donley, Collingsworth, Briscoe, Hall Hardeman, Foard, King and Knox.

In an attempt to locate the "lost" reservists who may have moved from the area since their last contact with the Air Force, the district has forwarded lists of the reservists to newspapers and radio stations in the region. Citizens are requested to advise their Air Reservist friends listed in the group that the Air Force is endeavoring to contact them in order to correct their obsolete military records.



For a BETTER COTTON CROP



Bacterial blight is a disease which cotton growers have become more and more aware of in recent years. The disease is also known as angular leaf spot, boll blight, blackarm, sore shin and damping off, depending on time of year and part of the cotton plant affected.

On the leaf, bacterial blight appears as watersoaked, angular spots which become brown upon drying. On the bolls, the watersoaked round lesions become sunken and black upon drying. The blackarm phase of the disease occurs as black elongated lesions on the stems and fruiting branches. Sore shin and damping off are seedling diseases and infect the shank of young cotton just after it comes up.

The angular leaf spot infection maintains the disease in the field during the entire growing season and may then spread to the boll blight phase of the disease which probably causes the greatest loss. In boll blight, the bacteria may stain fibers, thus reducing the grade of the lint. Boll blight lesions may serve as avenues of entrance for boll rot fungi which normally would not infect healthy cotton.

Treating cotton planting seed with Ceresan M is helpful in preventing bacterial blight during the seedling stage.
