### Date Set For Chemical Control of Mesquite

The date for the chemical control of mesquite has been established to begin June 1 through July 15. This is a correction from the final date that was shown last week as June 15. Check with the P. M. A. office in Silvertown for further information concerning this practice.

### Are Raindrops Shooting Your Farm Full of Holes?

A single raindrop on a field of unprotected soil may go unnoticed but that single raindrop may tell the story of erosion. As the drop of water hits the soil it splashes. In the splash that comes up are tiny soil particles which are moved from where they were. Where the raindrop hits a film is formed by the mixture of water and soil. There is a break down of soil structure.

While a single raindrop does little harm, it does demonstrate the beginning of erosion—how tons and tons of topsoil are carried away.

In a heavy rain, soil crumbs are broken up and the soil particles are churned into a puddle. This puddle seals the surface of the soil and starts the little collections of water that grow into a stream. The soil particles lifted into the air by the splashing raindrops fall back to earth farther down the slope. As the water moves down the slope, the loosened soil particles are carried along with it.

It is because a protective cover is so important in checking this raindrop bombing of loose soil that the Agricultural Conservation Program provides assistance to aid farmers in establishing and improving pastures and cover crops. When a raindrop falls on a blade of grass or a clover leaf, it loses its destructive force. Instead of the soil particles being broken up, the raindrop itself is battered and more water soaks into the soil.

### MORE MARKETING INFORMATION AVAILABLE

Market news covering the North Texas onion crop is now available and beginning on June 3 a similar service was started covering the East Texas tomato crop.

Both reports will be provided by the Dallas office of the U. S. D. A.'s Production and Marketing Administration, fruit and vegetable section. Eugene Paulson, market news reporter, will handle these seasonal reports.

The daily market bulletins will contain f.o.b. shipping point information and wholesale prices of the two commodities at the major terminal markets. Also shown will be the volume of shipments by districts and states as well as amounts being held on track.

Producers and other persons interested in receiving these daily bulletins should direct their request to the fruit vegetable office, Room 553, Terminal Annex, Dallas, Texas.

These services are provided without cost to those desiring them and are a part of the PMA's program of furnishing to agricultural producers, shippers, processors and others the latest available information on marketing.

Last year 79,376 trained leaders assisted county home demonstration agents in carrying home economics information to both rural and urban women and girls. This leadership training program was developed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

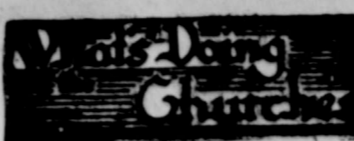
