Local Board No. 20 Selective Service Childress, Texas

State Selective Service headquarters was called on Tuesday to furnish 1,188 men for the armed forces in September, the state's share of a national call of 30,000.

Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said quotas for local boards will be computed and put in the mail next week.

The September quota will be filled with men 20 years old or older. State Selective Service headquarters said that at present it appears Texas can furnish around 400 men in September who will be 21 or older. The remainder of the quota will have to come from the 20 year old group.

The local boards will not be able to send any man for induction in September below the age of 20 with the exception of delinquents and volunteers.

The September call compares with an August call of 1,129, previously announced. The September 1951 call was for only 619 men.

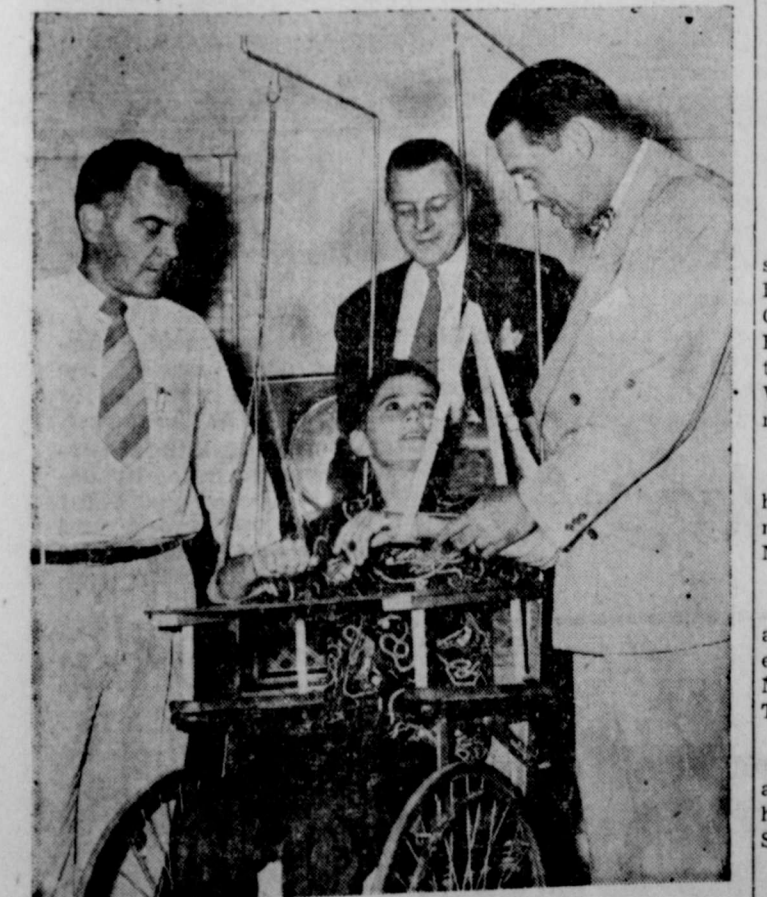
State draft headquarters also announced a call for six physicians for military service in August. A call for three dentists in July has been announced previously.

There will be no regular physical examination of registrants in August, according to present plans at state Selective Service headquarters. Examination of several thousand men may take place in September. No call for reexamination of 4-Fs in August or September has been received from national draft headquarters.

Through June, more than 97,000 Texans had been given combined mental and physical examinations since beginning of the Korean conflict. During the same period, more than 40,000 Texans were called for service.

Democrats May Vote July 26 and Still Ballot for General

Folks who want to vote for General Eisenhower for president, but would also like to have a voice in the election of their district attorney and county commissioners, have a date with a polling booth July 26.

That's the day of the first Democratic primary, and in order to vote in the primary—an election set up and financed by the Democratic Party of Texas—each voter must take this pledge:

"I am a Democrat and pledge myself to support the nominees of this primary."

The pledge says nothing about supporting all of the nominees of the Democratic party, and there will be no presidential nominees listed on the primary ballot.

No Moral Barrier

Thus there is no legal or moral barrier, as far as the party primaries in July and August and voting for the Republican candidate for president in the November general election.

However, there is a legal issue to be considered by persons planning to vote in the July 26 Democratic primary, and attending a Republican precinct convention that same afternoon.

Texas Democrats, whose votes are being wooed by the Republicans this year, have this situation staring them in the face:

A new state law provides a penalty of from \$100 to \$500 for anyone convicted of participating in the primary or convention of more than one party on the same day.

At the same time, Texas Democrats who feel no Democratic presidential candidate likely to be nominated are as good as elected and thus are desirous of switching allegiance to the GOP and attending Republican precinct conventions, face the opposition of disenfranchising themselves on the state and county level if they choose to attend a convention July 26.

In Texas, the men chosen as party nominees in the Democratic primaries are as good as elected. At any rate, they have been up to now. Failure to vote in a Democratic primary, therefore, means the voter loses the right to have his say on who will represent him in the Legislature, be he governor or United States senator, sheriff or district clerk.

Boys Ranch to be Host to Famous Riding Club

America's First Boys' Ranch, located 40 miles Northwest of Amarillo, Texas, will be host over the Labor Day weekend to the renowned Clay County Bit and Spur Club of Kansas City.

The world-famous riding club has made appearances all over the nation and will make the trip to the Texas Panhandle and Boys' Ranch to assist in the festivities and performances of the Eighth Annual Boys' Ranch Rodeo. A special train with two palace horse cars will carry the 70 club members and 48 horses to Amarillo from Kansas City.

The blue ribbon parade horses and silver mounted equipment, together with the colorful costumes of the riders, will add much to the young Boys' Ranchers' big event. It is estimated that the value of the 48 horses with equipment is about \$336,000.

Also featured in the Boys' Ranch Rodeo will be movie star Chill Wills who is famous for his voice characterization of Francis the mule, Minnie Pearl of Grand Ole Opry fame, Jack Dempsey, former world heavyweight boxing champ, and the Whippoorwills and Georgia Brown, who are featured with Roy Rogers in all his movies.

The actual rodeo events will be handled solely by the boys from Boys' Ranch. The young cowhands do a fine job of riding and will put on a show Labor Day weekend equal to, and possibly better than, professional performances.

Present plans call for four complete shows—matinee and evening performances both Sunday, August 31st and Monday, September 1st.

The Boys' Ranch Eighth Annual Rodeo will be held in Amarillo to accommodate the expected crowd and the boys are looking forward to seeing all their friends in the Tri-State area.

Texas Water Conservationists Visit New Mexico

Lubbock—A group of Texas water conservationists paid a good-will visit to the New Mexico state engineer, John Bliss, in Santa Fe last week.

The visitors included Tom McFarland of Lubbock, president-manager of Hi-Plains Underground Water Conservation District; Willis Hawkins of Hart, C. J. Taylor of Lockney and George Broome of Anton, precinct directors of the district, and Arthur P. Duggan, Jr., of Littlefield, legal adviser.

They talked at length with Bliss, E. G. Minton, a Portales water engineer, and Clyde Conover, head of the U. S. Geological Survey in New Mexico, on the two states' mutual water problems.

Texas High Plains farmers and Eastern New Mexico farmers both draw water from the Portales underground water basin, but under vastly different conditions. New Mexico has a rigid state ownership-control law which requires permits for drilling water wells, prorate the amount of water pumped for irrigation purposes, and provides stiff fines for all offenders. The Texas law, recently put into operation through the newly-organized district, gives each man uncontested title to the water under his land and puts him on his honor to abide by conservation rules set up by locally organized water districts. The rules may be enforced when necessary by court injunction to prevent such practices as waste and harmful spacing.

One suggestion advanced at the meeting, to avoid any possible conflict over pumping rights, was the spacing of wells one-half mile apart in a half-mile strip on each side of the Texas-New Mexico line.

The New Mexico geologist expressed the tentative opinion that well spacing in the mile-wide border belt would insure against any measurable drawdown from heavy pumping on either side. The matter will be investigated further before any action will be taken, High-Plains district officials said.

The drilling machinery was brought in this week by H. L. Hunt for the Penrod Drilling Company, of Shreveport, Louisiana.

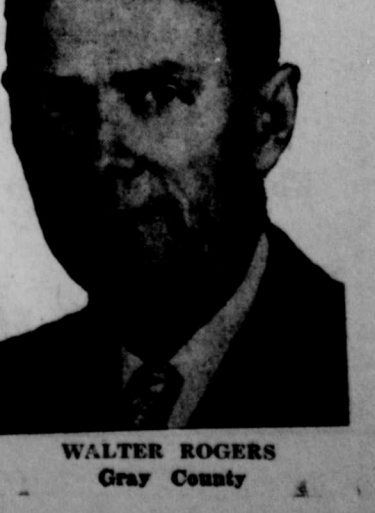

June's Bridegroom Is Luckier Fellow Than Ancient Hubby

CHICAGO—The June bridegroom in America today is a pretty lucky fellow, despite what his bachelor friends may tell him, in the opinion of history research experts.

They believe their findings, arrived at after digging through numerous rare documents and other references on romance, marriage, and wedded bliss, covering a period of thousands of years, will help to make business boom at the nation's marriage license windows during "the month of brides."

For example, Og, the Stone man, had to steal his bride from her family and drag her off in the dead of night to his cave retreat. No one worried about his wedding breakfast even if the bride had never learned how to skin a wild boar and cook it over an open fire. But the modern bridegroom is treated like "visiting royalty" by the family of the bride-to-be which traditionally foots all of the wedding bills.

Prospective husbands of primitive German tribes were required to bring a dower of worldly goods to their brides, including horses and cattle. Among these Germans, who lived during the latter days of the Roman Empire, "hope chests" and trousseaus were unheard of, and the bride's friends never felt obligated to give her a "shower" of household goods for her new home.

When a Mayan boy married, he had to live with the wife's parents and work for her father for at least five years in order to "pay" for his wife. Only then was the young couple permitted by law to set up housekeeping apart. In contrast, the modern bridegroom is expected to attend only an occasional Sunday dinner at the in-laws' home, and he can find an excuse now and then to evade even that obligation.

Probably the most miserable creature of all about to make that trek to the altar was the cliff dweller of ancient America. When he married he had to live in a house that his wife had built and that belonged to her. The children of the marriage were also regarded as belonging to her and took her name, rather than that of her husband as is the custom today.

Bugle Virtuoso Is Lure to Communists

IN KOREA—A Marine bugle virtuoso is luring the Communists to destruction.

At strategic moments, he blares the Chinese call for attack, which brings the enemy running straight into the muzzles of leatherneck guns.

He learned the call, note for oriental note, when his patrol surprised four enemy soldiers, and a Red bugler called for aid. The help came, but was promptly wiped out.

Next day, the Marine "field music" did a solo, with equal success. Among the captured: One perplexed Communist bugler, who complained bitterly that someone else was muscling in on his racket.

'Induced Insanity' Reported at Duke

PINEHURST, N.C.—A case of "induced insanity," a rare behavior phenomenon, was reported here by a Duke University psychiatrist.

Dr. Leonard J. Ravitz told the Southern Psychiatric Association about a strange case of fraternal twins, one of whom became the "echo" of the other's deluded ideas.

This case of "contagious insanity" has been recorded by Dr. Ravitz's newly announced electronic theory of psychiatry, linked with the solar system. By means of a microvoltmeter Dr. Ravitz measures the changes in a person's emotional disturbance from second to second, from one day to another, and from season to season.

Once, after twin "A" mentioned that he had produced many earthquakes, tornadoes, hurricanes, and floods, "B" thought a while, agreed, then asked, "Did you have anything to do with the snowfall 28 inches deep?"

This belief in A's power was clearly induced in B by A's suggestion, Dr. Ravitz said. However, B was much more suggestible to A's delusions when B's measurements—"electrical potentials"—were high. As his potentials decreased, B's suggestibility to these delusions decreased despite the fact that A's potentials were high. And A himself behaved much more normally as his potentials decreased.

Kentucky Minister Defies Racketeers

PADUCAH, Ky.—Threats against his life will not deter the Rev. William H. Estes, pastor of the Broadway Baptist church here, from continuing his exposure of gambling and vice conditions.

"I have no intention of keeping my mouth shut as long as these conditions exist here," Mr. Estes said. He recently received a phone call warning him to cease his crusade against the racketeers. It was the second such call.

The minister said that members of his congregation told him a group of "shady characters" attended a Sunday service in which he denounced vice conditions.

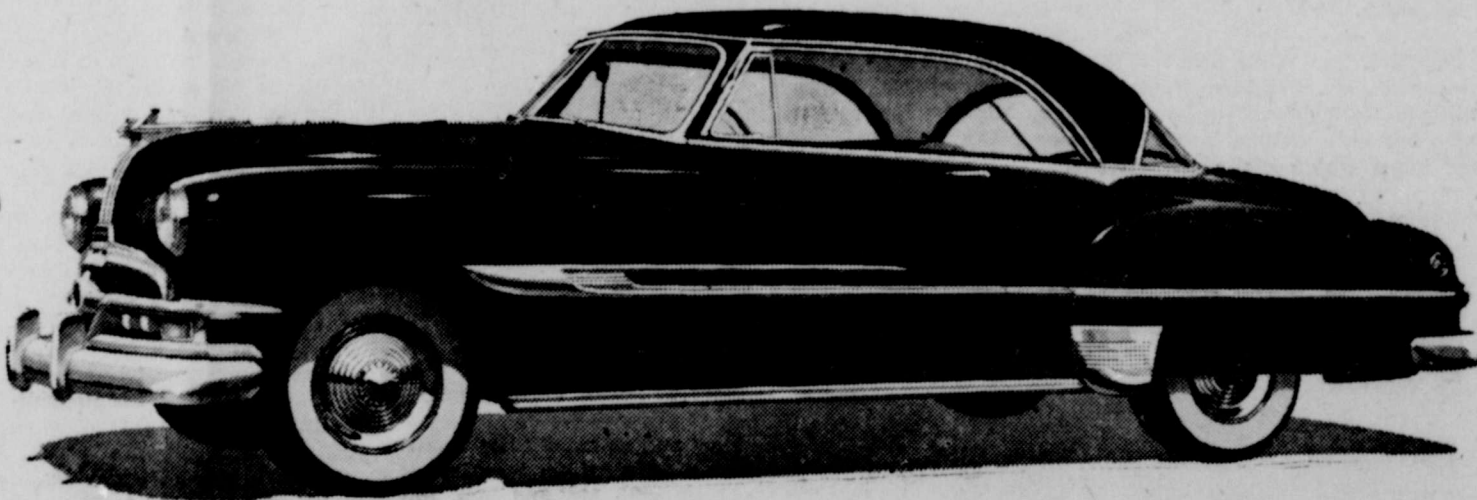

Farm to Market Road Building is Discussed Here

Governor Allan Shivers this week accused his opposition of making "fantastic" charges in a last-minute effort to minimize the greatest farm-to-market road building program in Texas' history, says a Texas Press Association release.

"The record shows that during my administration, there have been more miles of paved roads completed in Texas than anytime in history," Governor Shivers said. "And this is just the beginning—the program is just getting started."

"Yet in a desperate effort to confuse the people, this Washington-picked candidate for governor has plucked a lot of figures out of thin air, pieced them with some utterly ridiculous conclusions and passed them out as true facts."

Governor Shivers said that a tabulation of the distribution of state highway use tax money to counties revealed that \$299,867 had been channeled to Briscoe county for road building purposes in the county during the Shivers administration.

The figures show that since Shivers became the state's chief executive, a total of \$158,700 had been spent or is being spent in Briscoe county for the construc-

tion of 17½ miles of farm-to-market roads.

These figures prove conclusively that the Shivers administration has consistently supported local governments in their efforts to give rural areas paved roads, it was stated.

Governor Shivers has repeatedly said that he favors a paved road within sight of every farm and ranch house in Texas.

A breakdown of benefits received during Governor Shivers administration by this county from highway use tax money further shows that the county has received \$87,364 in license fees, \$44,881 has been paid this county in road bond funds, and \$69,218 paid by the state to retire bonds for this county.

The figures above do not include money spent by the state to build primary or main highways in this county.

State-wide since Governor Shivers took office, the state has spent \$102,797,972 for the construction of 7,632 miles of farm-to-market roads. Still to be built for which \$45,385,900 has been authorized are 3,654 miles of additional rural highways.

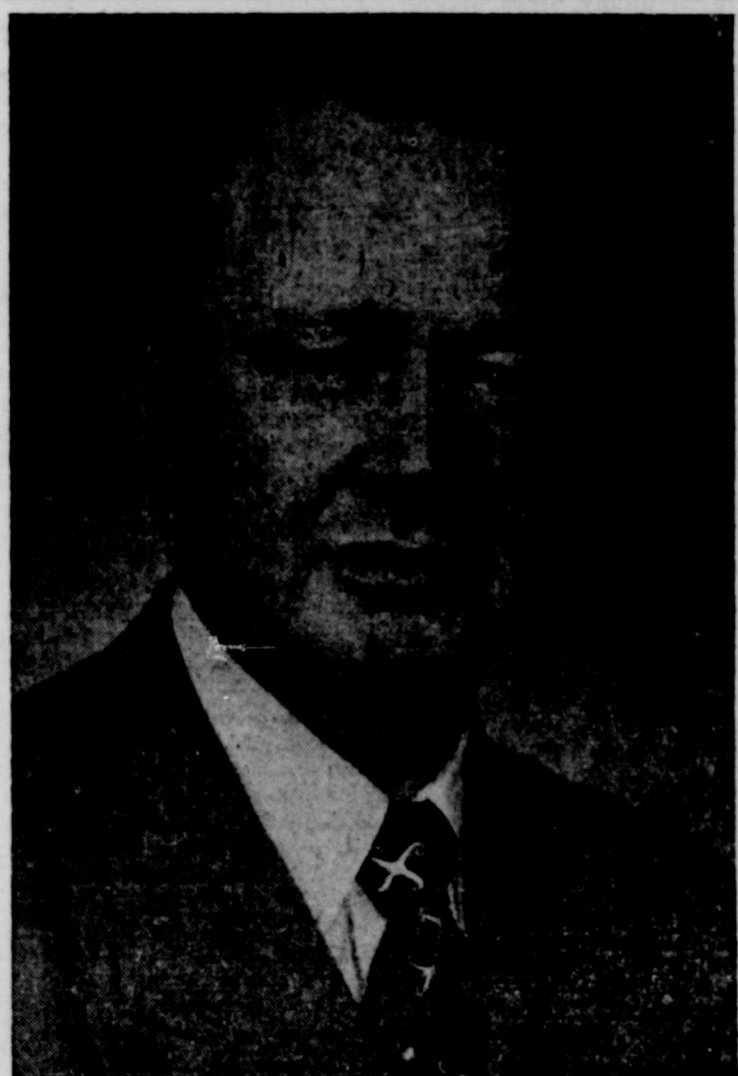

**Shivers Agin Auto Inspection Law;
"Shall Change it or Repeal it" He Says**

By Ben Kaplan, Press Staff Writer

Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed.

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law.

His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out of the law.

"The law was intended to bring about real safety and not inconvenience," said Governor Shivers.

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on the highways.

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it.

(Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature.)

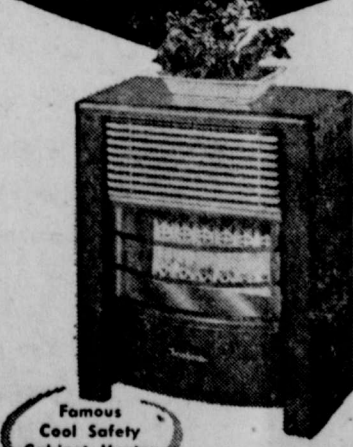
