Family Employment Not Covered by Social Security Act

Recent changes in the Social Security Act do not change the old provision in the law that family employment, in general, is not covered by the Social Security Act. John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office, points out that work by a parent for a son or daughter, or of a spouse for the other spouse, or of a child under age 21 for a parent is not covered by the law and should not be reported.

Work done by an employee for a parent is covered if the employee is age 21 or older. Also covered is work for a partnership unless all members of the partnership are within the relationship excluded by law. Thus, work by a parent for a partnership would not be covered if all partners were his sons or daughters, but would be covered if one partner were not a son or daughter.

Junior Class Will Sponsor Talent Show October 14th

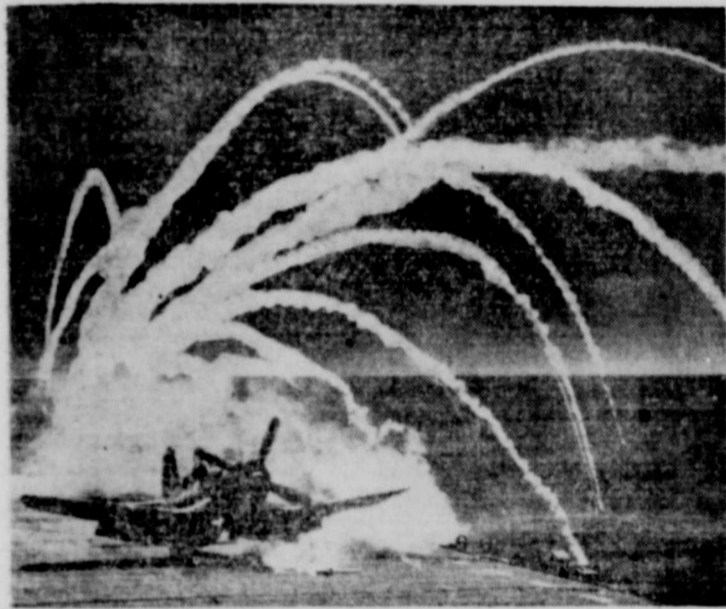

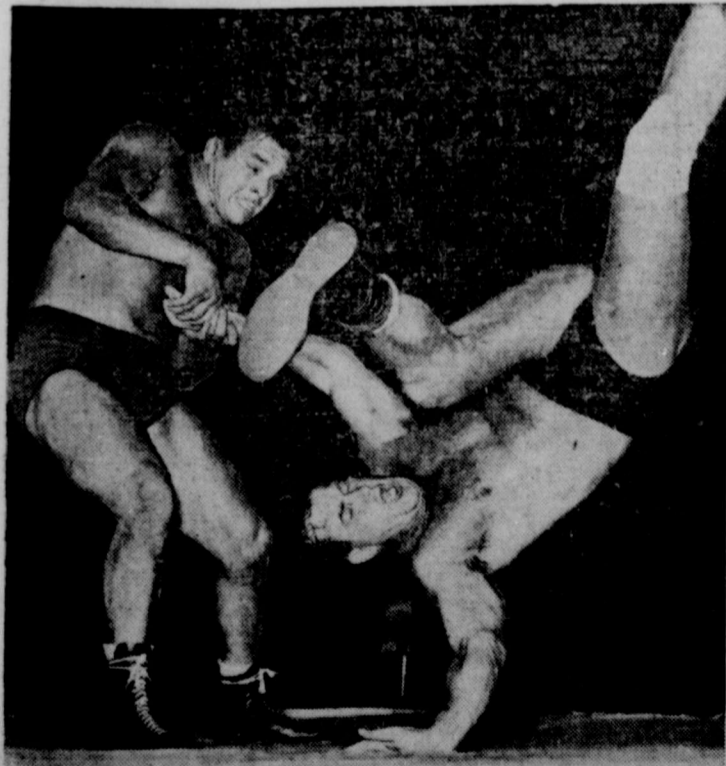

We urge you to be there since plans will be made for the annual Halloween carnival. It is time for membership enrollment and year books are ready for all members.

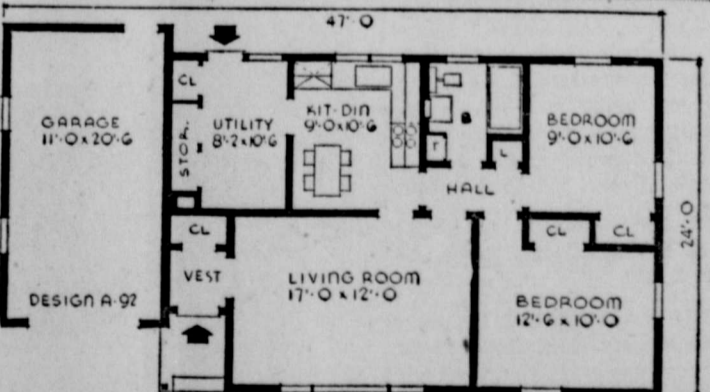
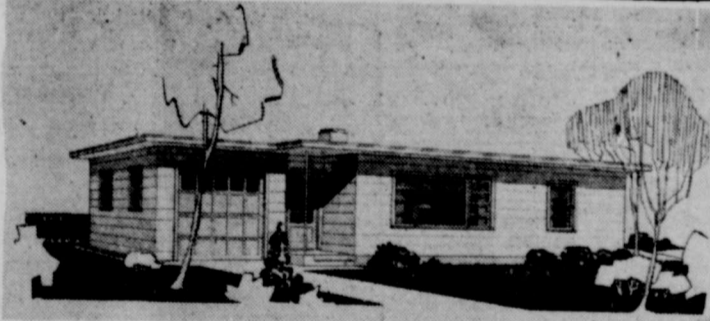

Design A-92. The first floor arrangement includes a utility room for laundry equipment and heating unit. An insulated concrete slab is laid over a cinder or gravel bed for the first floor and cubage is further deduced by use of a flat roof, combining roof and ceiling joists.

For privacy all rooms open into a hall only large enough to

accommodate the necessary doors. Sink, refrigerator and stove are built into the cabinets on two walls of the kitchen, leaving ample dining space.

Storage is provided in the bedroom wardrobes, linen closet, towel cabinet, coat closets and large storage cabinet above laundry equipment in the utility room.

Exterior finish includes two foot eaves, wide siding and built up roofing on insulation. This design is also available in concrete blocks.

The floor area is 829 square feet with 8290 cubic feet, excluding the garage.
