## 1,200 4-H Winners to Receive Coveted Trips



A panel of 4-Hers discusses Club Congress theme "Serving as Loyal Citizens Through 4-H." More than \$750,000 in college scholarships, savings bonds, trips, leader training and other rewards is being contributed through the National 4-H Committee to promote the activities of 4-H—the world's largest volunteer youth organization.

CLIMAX of a year of earnest 4-H Club work for some 1,200 enthusiastic 4-H boys and girls will be the 31st National 4-H Club Congress scheduled to convene in Chicago, November 30—December 4. These outstanding young people, selected from more than 2,000,000 4-H Club members in the 48 states, Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico, are winners in 4-H projects conducted through the Extension Service.

For this select group of 4-Hers, the trip to the Congress is a coveted honor earned only through diligent effort. As Congress delegates, they receive various 4-H awards arranged through the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, a citizens' group which lends support to the 4-H program.

More than 40 business firms, foundations, and public-spirited individuals sponsor national and sectional 4-H award projects as their contribution to this sound, successful youth program. The donor organizations provide to the National Committee grants totaling more than \$750,000 to be used for 4-H medals, trips, college scholarships, watches, savings bonds, leader training, and other aids.

Donors also sponsor educational tours, meal events, and entertainment, which make the National 4-H Congress a memorable experience. However, sober purposes of the meeting are not overshadowed by festivity. Fortnight group discussions, addresses by prominent speakers, exchange of ideas with youths from other countries, and other stimulating features will stress the theme of the year: "Serving as Loyal Citizens Through 4-H."

## Court Votes to Place Road Funds on Turkey Highway

From the Memphis Democrat. Approximately \$44,000 in farm to market highway funds will be applied to helping pay cost of paving the gap in Highway 70 north from Turkey to the new Red River bridge.

This decision was reached Monday afternoon by the Commissioners Court of Hall County, and was made in an effort to rush completion of the proposed paving. M. O. Goodpasture, county judge, explained this week. It represents this county's allotment of federal funds which will be applied to the secondary road construction program beginning after July, 1953, and will be matched by state funds.

Meeting with the commissioners was Palmer Massey of Childress, district engineer of the Texas Highway Department. His recommendation to the court was favorably received. Judge Goodpasture said. After discussing the matter, a vote was taken of the four commissioners. By a vote of three to one, the 1953 secondary road allotment for this county will be applied on the gap in Highway 70.

Also present at the meeting Monday were in-coming members of the court, who will take office on January 1, 1953. They were brought up-to-date on road problems of the county.

Goodpasture explained that approximately 10 or 11 miles of the proposed pavement will lie within the boundaries of Hall County, and that the fund will be applied to construction of this mileage. The remainder of the unfinished gap is in Briscoe County.

"The court's decision was made to speed up construction of the letting of contracts for the pavement, which has been under consideration for many years," Goodpasture explained. "The fund referred to will come from a federal allotment made especially for farm to market roads."

He explained that engineers of the highway department will go ahead with plans, the first of which will be a survey of the proposed route. When it is definitely marked, the commissioners court will begin work to obtain right of way deeds from landowners along the route.

## Boys' Ranch Unit Complete; Cowboys Move in New Home

Twenty four lucky boys have been excitedly hanging curtains, washing windows, waxing floors and putting the final home-like touches in their rooms in the recently completed housing unit at America's First Boys' Ranch, 40 miles northwest of Amarillo, Texas.

Most of the boys had a hand in the construction of the building and for months they waited anxiously for the date when 24 boys would be chosen to take up residence. Since all the boys could not live in this first of the proposed series of units, a merit system was devised to select those who would call the new unit their home.

The young Ranchers are keeping their rooms spotless, perhaps more than necessary, but they are very proud of their new home and intend to see that nothing is done to mar its beauty and comfort.

The housing unit has an exterior of red Colorado stone and green vertical siding. The boys' rooms have a natural, varnished finish with exposed roof beams. A masonite tile bath adjoins each of the six 4-boy rooms and every boy has his own private closet.

Quarters for a counselor and his wife are provided at one end of the unit and a recreation room, complete with library, is situated at the other end. The counselor has charge of the unit and is responsible for the program of the boys.

All furnishings are Brandt heavy oak pieces that are finished naturally. Double bunks, four chairs and a desk complete the furnishings of the boys' room. And each room has an Arvin radio, the gift of Hollywood's Queen for a Day when she visited Boys' Ranch. The boys' personal effects are arranged to suit individual tastes.

Plans for the new unit were drawn up by the 5th year architectural class of Texas A and M, the same group that will plan and design most of the buildings in the long-range Boys' Ranch expansion program.

The boys are extremely proud of their new home and invite all their friends to visit the Ranch and see it. This, and other new units will gradually make it possible for Boys' Ranch to take more homeless and destitute boys from all over the nation and give them a home and the training and education they need so badly.

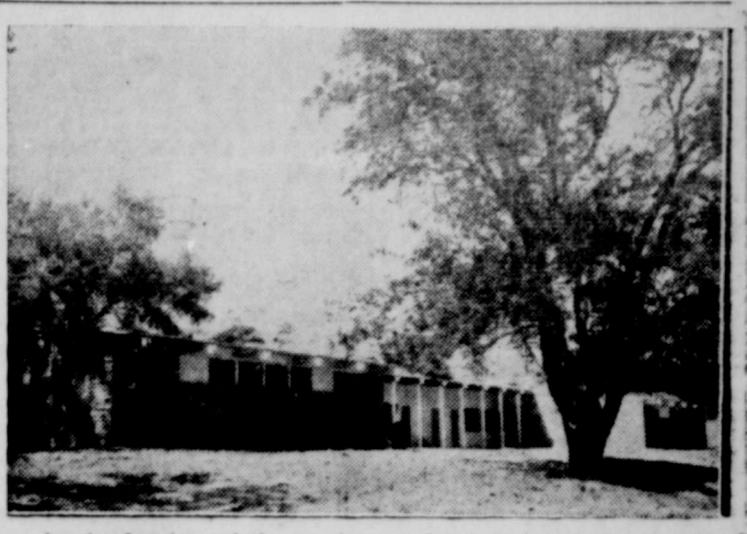

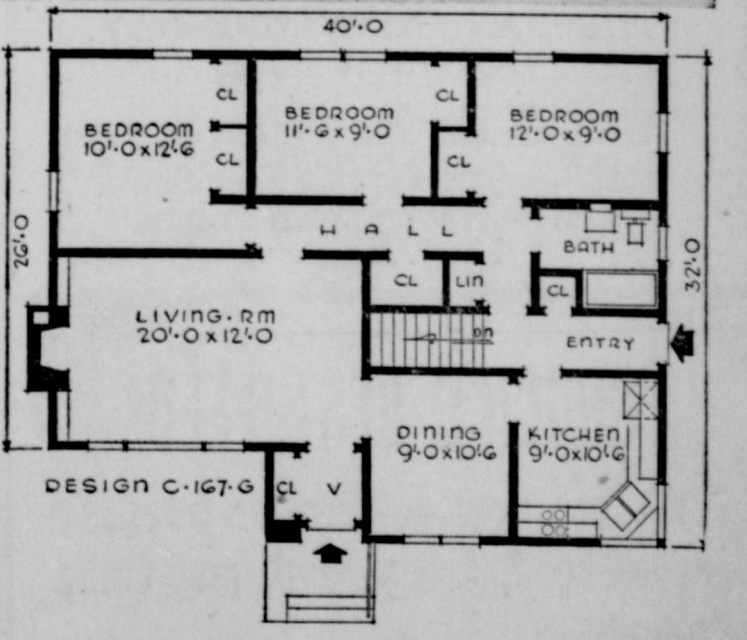

## Feeding Hints For Livestock Producers

The stage is set for another winter of narrow nutritive margins for livestock. The continuing drought is responsible, says C. M. Patterson, veterinarian for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, for conditions that can cause trouble for livestock producers unless corrective measures are taken.

Animals during the past months, have had little chance to build up reserves of vitamin A for carrying them through the winter and according to Patterson, it appears that conditions are becoming favorable for the reoccurrence of "white-muscle disease." This disease caused heavy livestock losses last winter in the north-east fourth of the state.

Patterson warns that unless rations of pastured animals are supplemented, with vitamin A rich feeds, respiratory troubles will increase as changes in the weather become more sudden. If the lack of rainfall prevents the growing of winter grazing crops, green hay or vitamin A enriched concentrates must be supplied. In addition to bronchitis and pneumonia prevention, the veterinarian points out that vitamin A also plays a very important role in animal reproduction. The large number of aborted, still-born or weak and deformed calves dropped last spring, he adds, was a direct result of the lack of green feed last fall and winter.

The condition known as "white muscle disease" also results from dry weather. A deficiency of vitamins A, E and C, ordinarily furnished in ample amounts by native forages, develops as a result of disturbed processes of storage of vitamin E in the cured grass and the inability of the animals to store normal amounts of other vitamins during the periods when grass is ordinarily green and succulent. The lack of these essential nutrients, points out the veterinarian, prevents the normal metabolic processes which are essential to the proper functioning of the muscles. As a result of this interference, muscle tissues, primarily of the rear legs, loins and heart, degenerate causing paralysis and usually death of the affected animal.

Dr. Patterson urges livestock producers to plant crops for winter grazing but if moisture is not sufficient for growth of these crops, then, he says, other sources of supplies must be provided. He recommends the feeding of good quality hay, silage and or vitamin A enriched concentrates.
