West Texas Music Camp Scheduled for August 3rd and 4th

Canyon, March 25. — A "West Texas Music Camp", with some of the nation's outstanding choral, band, and twirling authorities as instructors, has been planned for high school music students and teachers on the West Texas State College campus August 3-4, M. J. Newman, music department chairman, has announced.

The camp will feature such music lights as Jack Lee, University of Arizona band director who formerly was with the University of Michigan music department, as director of the band program; Charles Bryan, Birmingham, Ala., composer, author, and folk-music artist, as director of choral work; Ted Otis, drum major in the movie "Stars and Stripes Forever," and six-time winner of the twirling contests of the Chicagoland Festival, as teacher of twirling; and Joe Bermyan, nationally recognized percussion and band authority.

Dr. Houston Bright, Newman, and others of the music faculty of WT, will assist during the camp, which will feature primarily band and chorus work. Classes will also be offered in ensemble, theory, conducting, and a "Squad-leaders" class designed to train band members to help directors with marching band drills, will also be offered.

While camp participants will be "living with music," with concerts, faculty and student recitals, and informal listening sessions, a recreational program of sports, dancing, picnics, and "amateur night shows" is being planned, Newman said.

Several courses, in connection with the camp, are being offered for graduates credit, including such work as "Marching Band Techniques," taught by Lee, and "Choral Techniques," offered by Bryan.

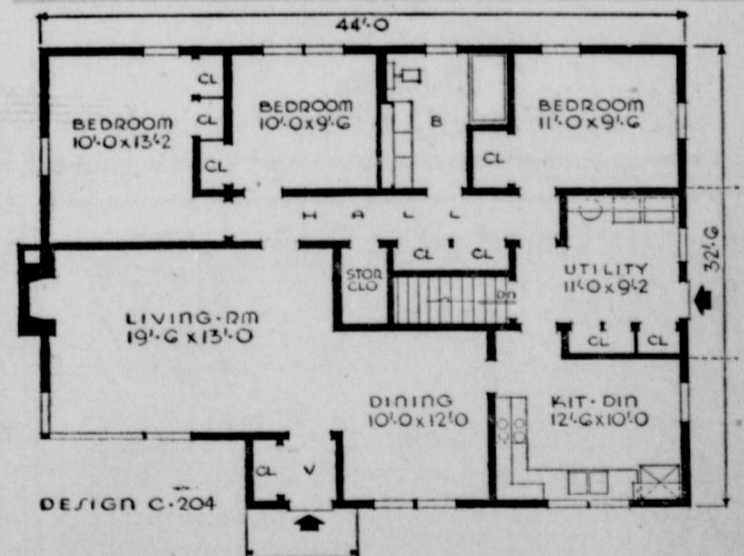

This room has coat closet, cabinet and storage closets for housekeeping supplies, as well as space for washer and dryer. Storage is also provided in the Bedroom hall closets where linen, supplies, games and equipment can be stored.

Three bedrooms and bath are in the rear and living-dining room and kitchen in the front. Working drawings include a breezeway and garage on the utility side, but these can be omitted, if desired.

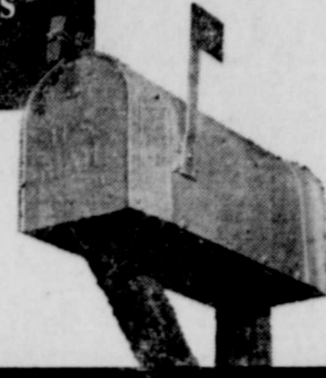

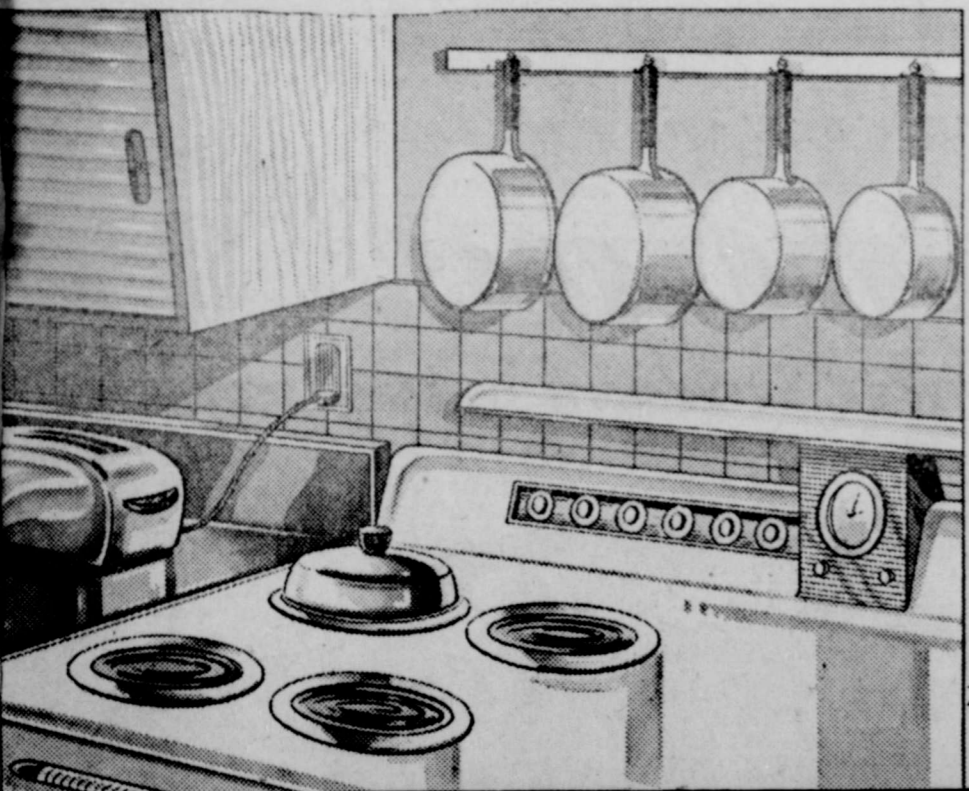

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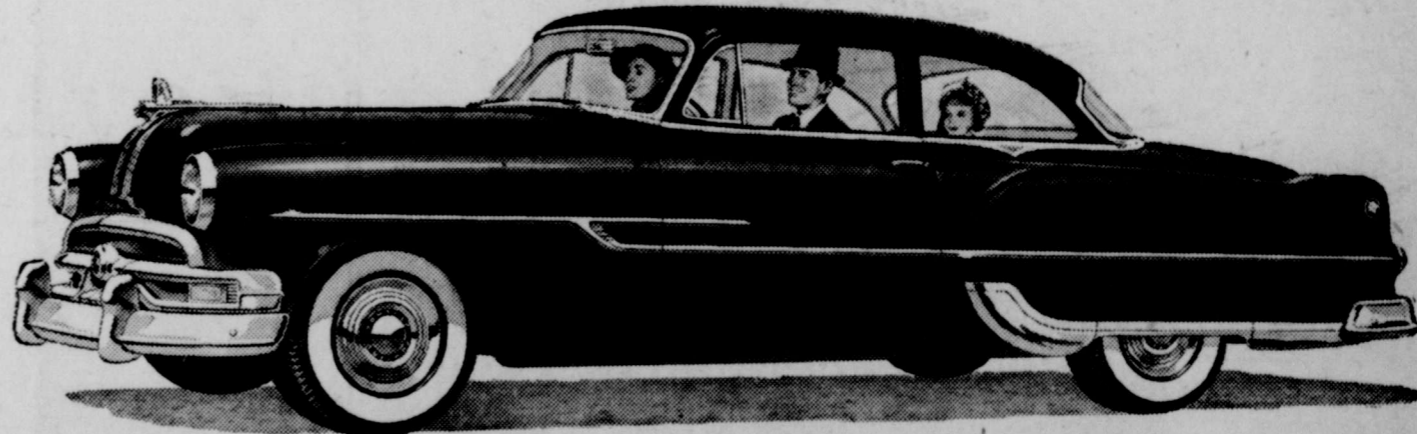
