Little League Baseball Comes To Silverton

The existence and growth of Little League Baseball is dependent solely on local sponsorship and support of the teams, more than financial aid is required. Finances provide the uniforms, equipment and playing fields but the organizers and supporters of the idea have learned that the broader aspects of the program require the physical support of the entire community, men, women and children. Each man engaged in the operation of a league should be a man the boys will respect. This factor is of vital importance. It results in making each boy a true sportsman and inspires him to refrain from doing things which would be wrong or harmful to himself or others.

Communities where little league is established are satisfied and happy regarding its value. They are supporting their teams and the players realize it, so they respond to the best of their abilities. They also realize that their every move is being watched and discussed. This creates pride, ambition and self respect. The true values of good citizenship.

The practice sessions are arranged each boy tries out for his favorite position on a team until all managers are aware of the different candidates capabilities. The selection of players follows. The managers meet to make their selections. This insures strength and gives every youngster a fair chance to play and eliminates completely any thought of favoritism.

Little League Baseball was founded in 1939. It has now spread to 46 states. It also operates in Alaska, Hawaii, Canada, Canal Zone, Puerto Rico and Cuba. Today we have 7,650 teams with 115,000 boys in uniforms. It was founded by Carl E. Stutz, who was trying to make a few young boys happy.

We wish to thank the friends and neighbors, mothers and fathers of these fine boys for their interest and support they have given. Those boys may not say thanks to you in words, but with their pride, their hearts, and respect of that uniform they will say "Thanks a Million Times."

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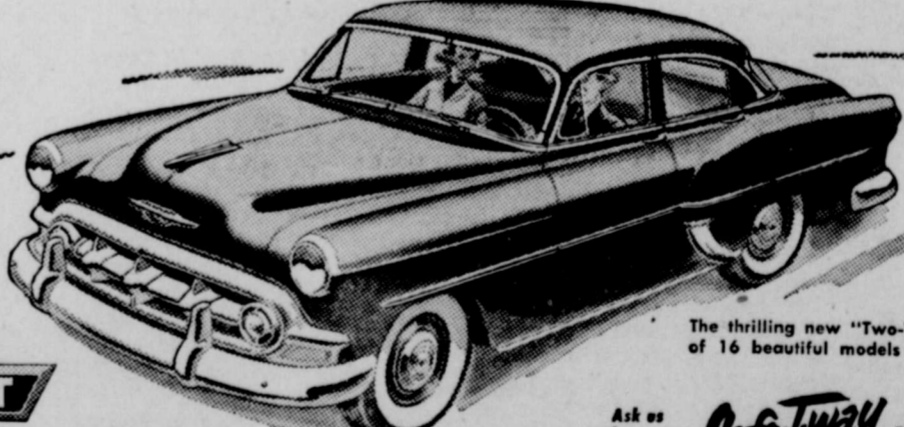

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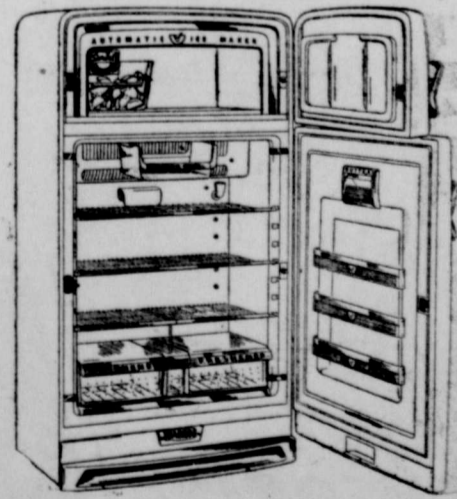

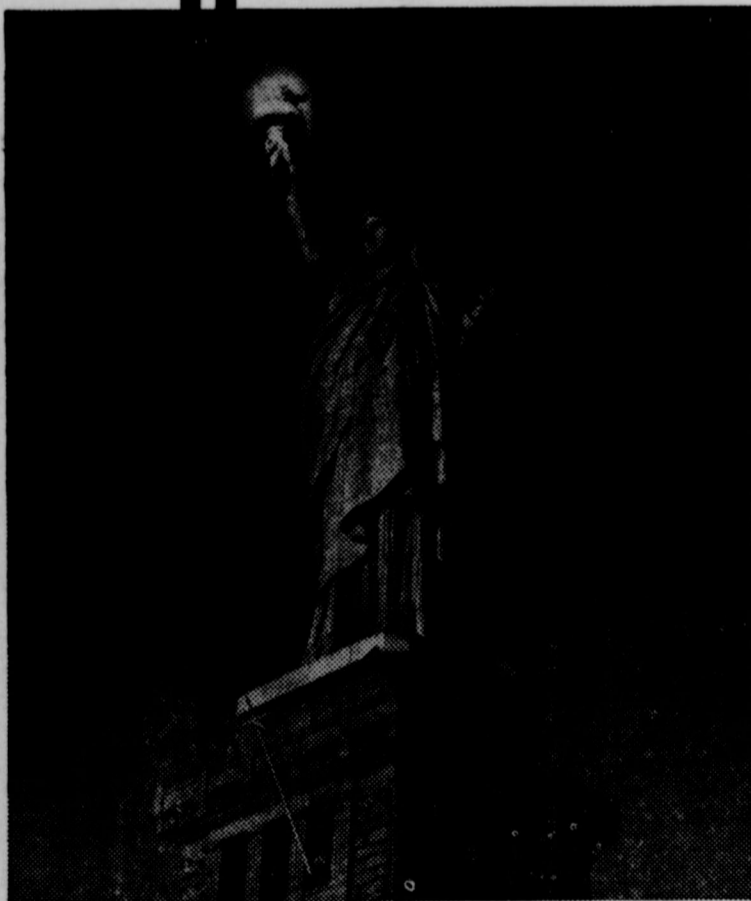
