## Top o' Texas Rodeo Parada Wednesday Afternoon, Aug. 5

Pampa, July 8.—The big Top o' Texas Rodeo Parade will be held in Pampa, on Wednesday afternoon, August 5th at 4 p. m., and Holly Gray, chairman of the Parade Committee, has issued a call for all types of frontier and cowboy parade entries. Gray stated that his committee was particularly interested in chuck wagons, covered wagons, buggies, surreys, oxcarts, and anything of a frontier nature. A beautiful trophy will be awarded to the best ranch or frontier type parade entry.

Invitations are also extended to all towns with riding clubs to participate in this year's parade. All riding club entries in full uniform will be admitted to the first performance on Wednesday at 8 p. m.

## State Health Department Will Enforce New Legislation

Austin, July 8.—The State Department of Health moved this week to make sure that all nursing and convalescent homes in Texas are looking after the health and safety of their elderly residents.

Acting under authority granted by the last legislature, the health department mailed licensing application forms to several hundred operators, all of whom must now conform to humane standards of operation or close their doors.

As state health officer, Dr. Geo. W. Cox is administrator of the new licensing law. These are its terms:

Any establishment which provides food and shelter to four or more persons unrelated to the proprietor, and which provides services which meet some need beyond basic provisions of food and shelter and laundry, must apply for an operation license from the State Department of Health.

Hospitals, hotels and similar institutions are not included. Nor are homes conducted by or for adherents of a religious order who depend exclusively on prayer or spiritual means for healing.

Application fees have been set by the legislature as \$25 per year, plus \$1 for each bed maintained by the home. Fees will be applied to paying administrative costs of the law.

The health agency has the authority to make inspections on homes and to revoke licenses for shoddy operation. Home operators can file grievance complaints in district court in any instance of unfair or arbitrary treatment by the administrators of the law.

Dr. Cox, outspokenly in favor of the licensing law as a method of inspiring proper treatment of elderly people in nursing homes, says "some homes in this state are little more than fire traps." He adds:

"This is one condition we hope to eliminate. We will not tolerate unscrupulous persons in the nursing home profession, not when the health and safety of disabled old folks are at stake."

## Local P. M. A. Office Taking Orders for Emergency Feed

The local P. M. A. office is now taking orders for feed under the drought disaster program.

The feeds on order include cottonseed products (cake and meal) \$35.00 per ton; shelled corn \$1.00 per bushel; Oats 50¢ per bushel and wheat \$1.10 per bushel.

The present program is intended to furnish feeds on the bases of thirty day supply. The main purpose is to protect foundation herds. Anyone with stock who doesn't have a thirty day supply of feed and needs this emergency feed should fill out application at P. M. A. office in Silverton or First National Bank at Quitaque.

No information is available on the credit phase of drought program as of now.

## Marshall Formby Will Open Office in Plainview

Formby moved to Plainview in 1941 and bought the Old Community Weekly Newspaper, changing the name to the Plainview Tribune. 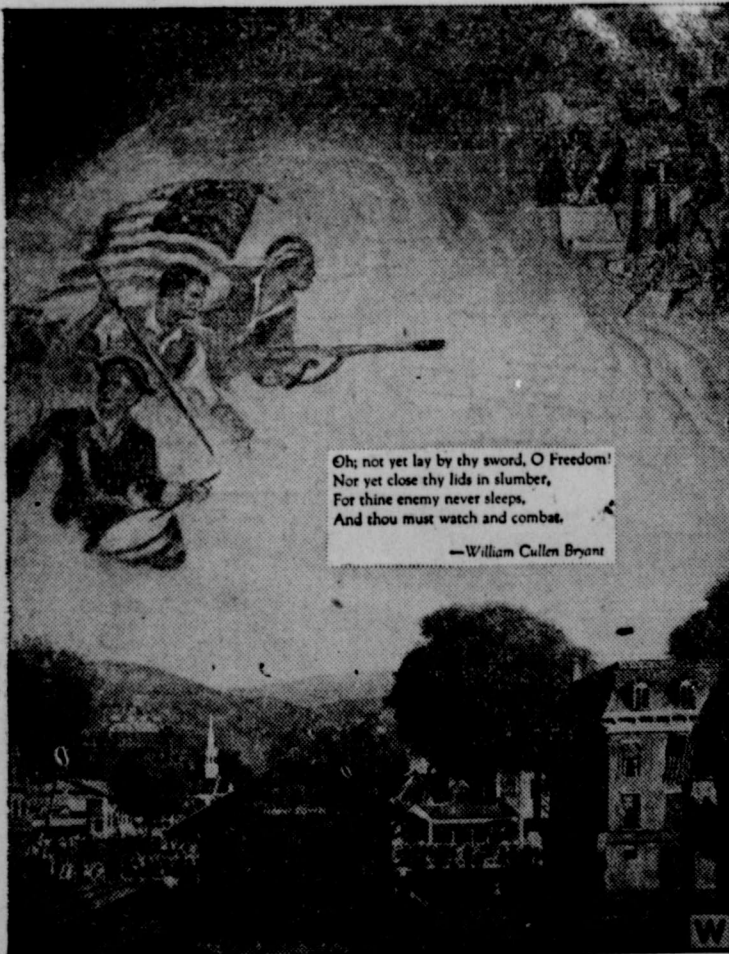
## GM Signs TV 'Game of Week' Pact

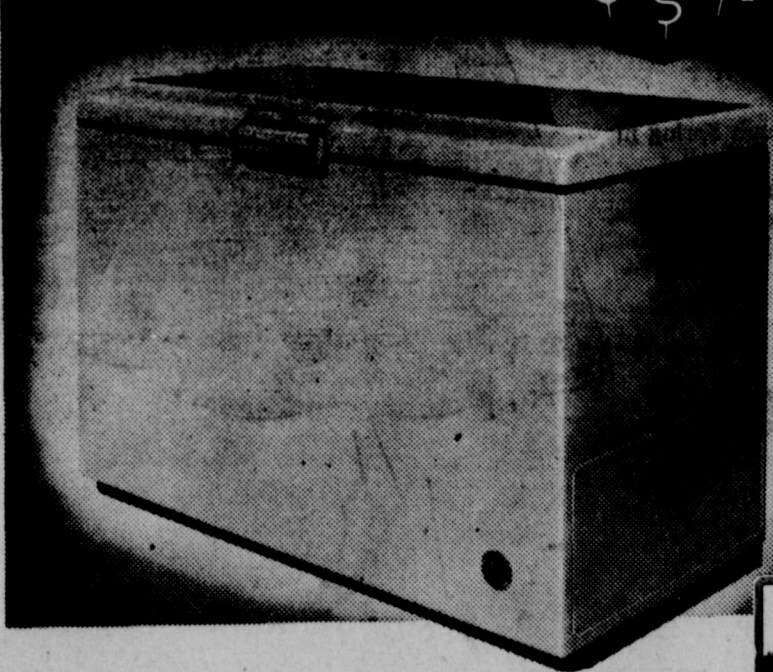

Stir until mixed. Press into smooth ball and flatten slightly. Place between two sheets of waxed paper (12" square). Roll out gently to edges of paper. (Dampen table top to prevent slipping.) Peel off top paper. If

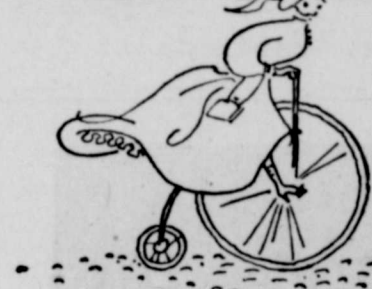
