## 600,000 4-H's Say "Let's Help Correct Safety Hazards"



Chicago—(Special)—The largest volunteer army ever organized for a peaceful mission is now "invading" farms and rural communities throughout the Nation. It consists of more than 600,000 4-H Club boys and girls whose objective is to show rural folk how to prevent accidents and fires which result in 14,000 deaths and 1 1/2 million injuries among farm people, as well as destruction of millions of dollars' worth of buildings and equipment annually.

Falls account for 36 percent of all fatal accidents in farm homes and 19 percent outside. More than 50 percent of all fatal accidents in working with farm machinery involve tractors, and overturning accounts for more than half of the tractor accident fatalities.

Safety experts give considerable credit to the contributions made by 4-H'ers for the reduction of one-fifth in the number of fatal accidents to farm people in 1951—the last year for which estimates are available—from the estimated annual rate in 1941, the first year of the National Farm Safety Week, which will be observed this year July 19-25.

Illustrative of the 4-H'ers do "approach" to the accident problem, a Tennessee club girl reported that she picked up broken gears, rusty nails protruding from boards, and other sharp articles in the farm lot; helped her father and brother become safety conscious in working with farm machinery; had a ladder with two broken rungs repaired; per-

suaded her mother to use a step-ladder in reaching high places in the house, and to always wipe up grease or water immediately if it is spilled on the floor.

A Texas 4-H boy reports that their farm tractor often was filled with gasoline to overflowing when the engine was warm. He called this unsafe practice to the attention of his father and brother and now the tractor is filled correctly. His small brothers frequently asked to ride on the tractor, but this safety enthusiast taught them to understand how hazardous it was to hitchhike a ride on a tractor.

Similar reports of the 4-H'ers participating in the National 4-H Safety program are legion. Instead of using "don't" admonitions, expressions such as "Let's Correct This Hazard" prevail.

Outstanding 4-H records of achievement in safety are rewarded with awards provided by General Motors for the ninth consecutive year. They include sterling silver medals for the blue award group in each qualifying county, and an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago next November for the state winner. Six state winners will be chosen to receive a national award, which is a \$300 college scholarship. A handsome plaque, appropriately embossed, will be awarded to the county reporting the most outstanding county-wide 4-H safety program.

The National 4-H Safety program is conducted under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.

## Mass Chest X-Ray Survey Friday, July 31, August 1,

Sponsored by the Texas State health department, a mass chest X-Ray survey will be held on Friday, July 31 and Saturday, August 1 from 8:30 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. in Quitaque for all individuals 15 years of age or older. There is no charge. The entire project is for the benefit of your health and your children's health. It will take only a few minutes of your time.

X-rays are provided by the State Health Department free of charge.

Reports are confidential. It is not necessary to undress. Healthy people should be X-Rayed once per year.

No one under 15 years of age is eligible. Children are infected with tuberculosis from adults. Find the adult with unknown tuberculosis first and the child will be protected.

All those who have had X-Rays made during the last survey are urged to do so again.

The state urges 100% participation.

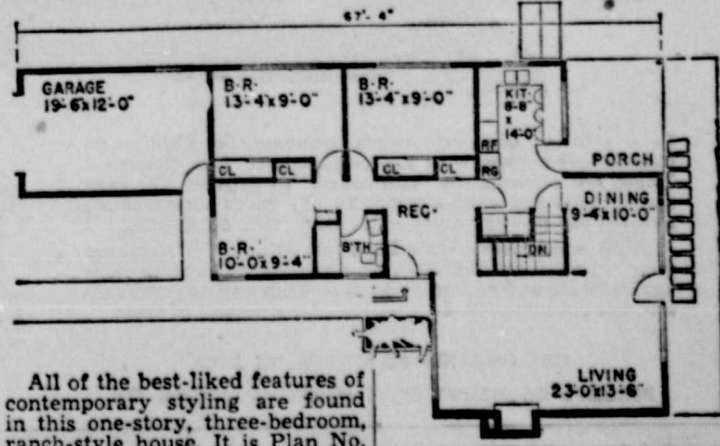

## Center Hall in Ranch House



All of the best-liked features of contemporary styling are found in this one-story, three-bedroom, ranch-style house. It is Plan No. 303 of architect Walter T. Anicka, 617 Forest, Ann Arbor, Mich. A reception hall at the hub gives easy access to all parts of the dwelling, yet the bedroom wing is well separated from other living quarters. The exterior is low and long in the best modern manner. For color interest, the architect suggests a pastel asphalt shingle roof chosen from among the many new colors available in that material. A light-colored roof would draw the eye upward, giving the house a look of greater importance. The dining room is an annex to the living room. The two are separated by a folding partition, which can be closed for privacy or opened for spaciousness. The U-shaped kitchen includes a breakfast bar. The porch opens off the kitchen, making it convenient to eat outdoors in pleasant weather. The house has a full basement. ## Long Rain Changes Woodlot Near New Jersey Community

BRIDGETOWN, N.J. — What would happen to the U.S. landscape if 30 times the average rains fell, for example, on the crowded region between New York and Washington, D.C.?

For the last three years, in a patch of woods in southern New Jersey, millions of gallons of water have hissed from gun-like spray nozzles as man-made rain. Strange changes have taken place. Where once was an ordinary scrub-oak woodlot, a jungle now grows.

Measured against world's record rains (Cherrapunji, India, was doused with 1,041 inches in 12 months, and averages 426 inches a year) this spot in New Jersey has the wettest forest on earth. The region's normal rainfall is 41 inches a year, but these few acres have received up to 1,200 inches in a year's time.

The jungle stands on Seabrook Farms, a huge mechanized vegetable garden and processing plant near the town of Bridgeton. Largest combined truck farm and frozen food factory in the nation, Seabrook Farms cover about 20,000 acres of rich flatlands in Cumberland and Salem Counties west of Atlantic City.

Its cannery and freezing plant use 12,000,000 gallons of water a day at the peak of the packing season. Disposing of so much water was a serious problem.

After trying various methods of purifying the outflow, the company had almost decided to invest a million dollars in a biofilter installation—gravel beds in which vegetable scraps and other wastes in the water would be consumed by bacteria.

John Hopkins University, however, has a laboratory for the study of climate at Seabrook Farms.

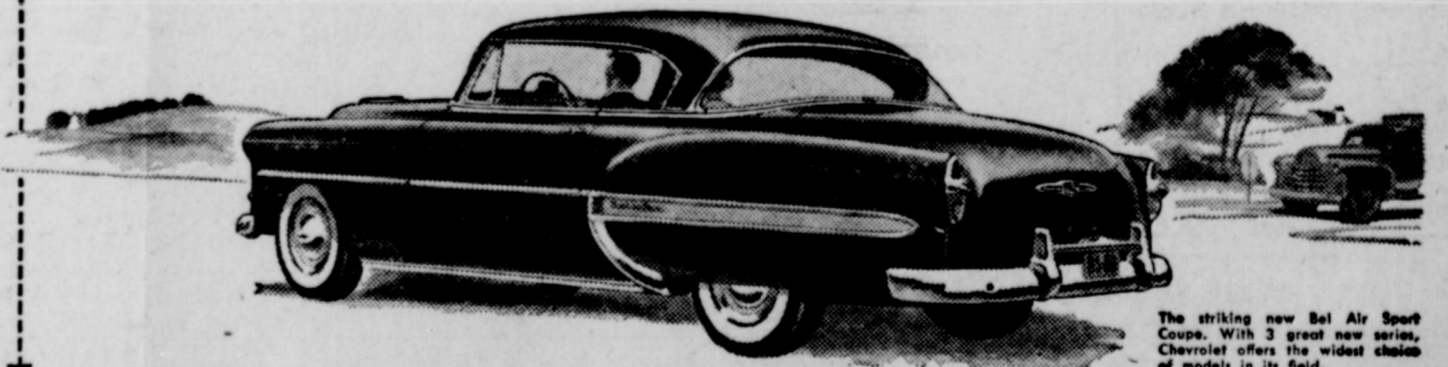
