M. J. O'Neal Invited to Address Institute in London, England

M. J. O'Neal, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. J. O'Neal, Sr., of Silvertown, who is employed by Shell Oil Company, of Houston, as research chemist, has risen to a position of international recognition according to a magazine story, which has the following to say:

"With M. J. O'Neal's invitation to address the Institute of Petroleum symposium in London in October comes recognition that he is one of the world's outstanding authorities in his field high mass spectrometry. In June the research group leader addressed by invitation the Gordon Research Conference in New Hampshire, to which only experts from companies over the world were invited.

"He will deliver a paper on high molecular weight mass spectrometry at the London meeting; 'Application of Mass Spectrometry to Oil Constitution.'

"Beginning his career with Shell in 1944 as a Junior Research Chemist, he has been in the field of spectrometry since 1945. Within these eight years, he has risen to a position of international recognition."

Mr. O'Neal is a graduate of Silvertown High School, and is also a graduate of the University of Texas.

Official Auto Inspection Stations Open September 15

Austin, Texas—Texas motorists found the doors of 3,120 official auto inspection stations open Tuesday morning ready to check their vehicles under the provisions of the modified Motor Vehicle Law which was enacted by the last Texas Legislature.

George Busby, Chief of the Texas Department of Public Safety's Motor Vehicle Inspection Division, announced that that number of stations have already been licensed to operate and that another two hundred applications are now on file from operators, desiring to conduct inspections. Busby estimated that the total number of inspection stations will reach 3,500 within the next few months.

The new period during which motorists must have their cars inspected, opened Tuesday and will run through next April 15. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the State Safety Department, has issued an appeal to car owners to take their vehicles to one of the convenient stations early and avoid a last-minute rush similar to that which resulted under the old law that expired August 25th.

Garrison pointed out that all of the station operators have been fully versed in the provisions of the new act which calls for inspection only of brakes, lighting equipment, horns, rear-view mirrors and windshield wipers.
