Future Is Here, Supersonic Gear **Already Perfected**

SANTA MONICA, Calif.-The Army Air Force reports that supersonic gear for pilots has already been created.

The latest is a new helmet for pilots who some day may have to bail out of supersonic planes. The helmet, custom built to fit brother in law, Joe Fowler, at each wearer, was designed by Douglas Aircraft engineers to stay on the pilot's head during bail-Present helmets tend to blow off, tests revealed. This strips the pilot of head protection and snatches away his oxygen

By cutting slots into the new helmet behind the forehead portion, the designers were able to make the helmet stick to its job. The slots create a small vacuum that holds the helmet firmly in

They also permit air to escape from inside the helmet. This prevents the building up of air pressure inside the helmet that eventually becomes so great that it blows the helmet off the pilot's head.

Navy Says Waves Will Go to Sea

WASHINGTON-The Navy Department has announced that Waves will be assigned to sea duty-in the future.

The announcement breaks a long standing rule that enlisted women could not be assigned to military billets on board ship.

The Waves, to be drawn from volunteers in the Hospital Corps, will fill sixty-three billets on ships of the Military Sea Transportation Mrs. Mary Bragg returned home Service. To be eligible for sea duty, a Wave must be 21 years old or more and have served at least twentyfour months in the Navy. Of the sixty-three available billets, twenty-eight are in the Atlantic and thirty-five in the Pacific.

WASHINGTON-The Navy has announced the construction plan of a second atomic submarine. The

first atomic sub has been under construction for some time and is expected to be completed soon. The power plant for the second nuclear sub, named the Sea Wolf,

is being built by the General Electric Company. A land-based prototype of this machinery has been under construction at West Milton, N. Y., for nearly a year.

The Navy has estimated the first atomic submarine, named the Natulius, will cost \$29,000,000 exclusive of the power plant. The secsubmarine may run to \$32,700,000, also without power ma-

Both submarines were contracted by the Electric Boat Division of the General Dynamics Corporation at Groton, Connecticut.

Connecticut Woman Governor For A Day

HARTFORD-For the first time in its history Connecticut had a woman for governor—for a day.

Mrs. Alice K. Leopold of Weston, Secretary of State, took over the governor's chair in the absence of Governor John Lodge. who was out of the state also with

two other top officials. Mrs. Leopold was elected Secre tary of State for a four-year term in 1950 after serving as a state legislator for several years.

Ahead of her in the gubernato-rial ranking are the lieutenant governor and president of the state senate.

New High Speed Camera

LOS ALAMOS - University of California scientists have developed a new camera, believed to be the fastest of its kind ever constructed. It is capable of photographing explosive phenomena at speeds up to 3,500,000 frames per second, about 150,000 times as fast as the usual picture one sees at the theater. Its primary usefulness is for photography of highspeed events that are self-luminous or that are illuminated by very intense explosive light sources using an argon atmosphere.



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

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

The department estimates that household purchases alone are currently running at a rate of about 55,000,000 gallons a year, in addition to the large amount used by hotels and restaurants.

The department estimates the total output of frozen orange juice concentrate this year at about 50,500,000 gallons.

The official said there was no immediate danger of an orange juice shortage because producers could draw on their cold storage stocks built up in past years when the demand was not so great. These stocks totaled about 23,242,-000 gallons at the end of June.

Frozen orange juice was introduced to the American market in Department figures show that it has increased steadily in popularity and now is used more or less regularly by 30 per cent of the nation's families.

The average retail price in June was 16.1 cents per can, compared with 15.3 cents a year earlier. Experts predict the price will continue inching up until supply catches up with demand.

'Water Bombs' Used To Curb Bush Fire

TORONTO-The Ontario Department of Lands and Forests has found, after having tried scores of chemicals, that they can slow the progress of fires in tinder-dry areas quickest with water.

They do not do it by cloud-seeding-shooting dry ice on silver iodide crystals into moisture-laden atmosphere to induce rain in the manner widely tested during recent years. This method, they assert, is expensive and too un-

Instead, they send into the bush planes loaded with specially made paper containers. The planes land on lakes or rivers near the blaze. After having unloaded fire fighters, who will head across country to the fire with extinguishers, the aircraft's crew fills the paper containers with water and flies over

The containers, each holding 31/2 gallons, are dumped in the path of the flames. The paper breaks

Highspeed Toll Roads Are Planned In East

WASHINGTON - Virginia and Massachusetts are planning new high speed toll roads that will cost approximately \$400,000,000. They will be built, it is reported, entirely with local funds, without federal grants-in-aid.

Virginia's new superhighway will cross the state on a north-south line roughly parallel to U.S. Route 1. It will connect on the north with the proposed Maryland toll road, which is a continuation of the New Jersey Turnpike, and on the south with a proposed North Carolina Turnpike. The Massachusetts road will run from a point near Boston to a point near the New York state

U. S. Population Hits 160,000,000 Mark in August

WASHINGTON-In August the population of the United States passed the 160,000,000 mark. The figure was registered on an automatic census calculator in the

Commerce Department with a

clang of bells and flash of lights. The calculator is a map of the nation standing 10 feet high, topped by an over-sized gadget that registers population the way an automobile speedometer registers mi-

leage.

It records a new resident every twelve seconds as the net result of a series of complicated calculations: a birth every eight seconds, a death every 21 seconds, an immigrant every two minutes and an exit by someone leaving the country every 17 minutes.

The machine's speed is changed frequently. Two months ago the department stepped up the birth calculation from one every nine seconds to one every eight.

The nation's population has been growing at a rate of more than 2,500,000 a year since 1927.

Between the April, 1950, census, when the official count was 151,-000,000 and July 1, 1952, there was an increase of population in 38 states and the nation's capital. Nine states, mostly southern, showed decreases and Montana registered virtually no change.

Denver Grows Wheat On 1,100-Acre Airport

DENVER-As its share of a wheat crop, Denver recently received \$5,600. The 285-acre crop was harvested from the municipal airport.

The unlikely merger of commercial aviation and wheat farming in Denver dates back to six years ago when the city leased 1,100 acres between runways of Stapleton Airfield to a grain company. This season 815 of the acres lay fallow.

In August the lessor planted about 550 acres in winter wheat and the rest of the land in winter barley. The city gets 40 per cent of the cast yield. Meanwhile, grain farming tends to hold down dust, to cut the danger of weed fires and to serve as a weed control measure in itself.

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
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
