

Crop Gathering On Last Half

In conversation with a lew of the elevator and gin men of this area we found that the crop gathering was on the last lap for this year.

Farris Martin of Harvest Queen Grain said that this week would finish the maize harvest. He reported that the Irrigated feed produced a good yield in most all cases, and that the dry land feed did not produce but very little grain in most cases. This also was the agreement that I have found in talking with the farmers.

The grain market has recently been steady on about \$2.10 per hundred. It seems that most farmers have placed their grain

Mr. Shelley Tomlin of the Tomlin & Fleming Gin Co. gave his estimate for the county cotton crop to be around 9 to thousand bales.

It is almost an impossible task to get the exact numberr of bales grown in any one county. The farmer must find a gin that he can get a return of his trailor as soon as possible. Many bales from Swisher County are being ginned here, while bales raised in Briscoe County go to towns

Both gins in Silverton have been runing around the clock. that they caught up over the week end and had a short breather Monday morning. Quaint Rehearsal Of Christ's Birth Found in Old Carol

'Auld Lang Syne' has become such an integral part of our modern New Year's eve that no celebration, however gay, would be complete without it.

The music sheets for those nostalgic strains simply say "Robert Burns generally is supposed to have written it after he had settled down on a farm and taken himself a wife, following the sweeping success in 1778 of the second edition of his "Poems." Well and good, but Auld Lang Syne was not exclusively a Burns' product, nor did he claim it to be.

In a letter to George Thomson, a publisher, Burns explained: "It is an old song of olden times, which has never been in print. I took it down from an old man's singing."

Modern scholarship has discovered that Burns was wrong when he told Thomson "Auld Lang Syne" never had been in print. Its refrain, at least, was printed obscurely long before Burns heard his "old man singing."

Further, the original song often has been credited to Sir Robert Aytoun (1570-1638). Aytoun was one of the earliest Scots to use the lowland dialect as a literary medium. Multitudes of Americans decended from non-British stock are perpetually mystified by this dialect, nor does it seem to make much sense in the standard English

Regardless of its original author and origin, it was Burns who gave 'Auld Lang Syne' its immortality And though the bells now welcome the New Year with joyous peals, symbolizing mankind's hope for a bright future, the nostalgiast of "Auld Lang Syne" summarizes an

adherent reluctance to leave the security and friendship of the past and embark upon a future which, however promising, may not be more pleasant. Thus, it remains a part of the English speaking herit-

First Christmas Card Was Created in 1842

Over 1,500 People **Are Killed Annually** In Car-Train Wrecks

MINNEAPOLIS-Over 1.500 people are killed and more than 4,000 are injured each year in approximately 4,000 collisions of automobiles with railroad trains. Of these accidents, 40 per cent occur in spite of closed gates, watchmen, or special signals warning of the train's approach.

Three times as many such accidents occur per hundred specially protected crossings as occur per hundred crossings marked only with traditional "cross-buck" emblem.

The specially protected crossings, of course, average much heavier in volume of traffic, but their high accident ratio reveals the amazing capacity for heedless driving which makes the American motorist the despair of safety engineers.

The four chief causes of such accidents, according to highway authorities, are:

- 1. Simply taking it for granted that there is no train coming.
- 2. Paying no attention to "Stop" and warning signs.
- 3. Trying to beat the train to the crossing when a train is in sight or signals are flashing.
- 4. Starting across after a train has gone by, without looking for cult as the Straits. She said the a second train on another track.

Migratory Birds Hit Empire State

NEW YORK-The Empire State building in New York is a traffic hazard for migratory birds going south along the Atlantic Flyway from Canada and New England.

On numerous occasions hundreds have crashed into the building as they passed over New York in the night.

The exact cause of the mass destruction remains obscure. On two occasions the birds were going south on a cold air mass that gave them a tailwind.

Exactly why many of the birds are killed against the building were flying so low is also obscure. Most of those that have flown into the structure usually travel at about 2,000 feet in the air. The building

is 1,250 feet. Ornithologists report that the building is a hazard at night when darkened after 12 o'clock. Many migratory birds take off at sundown and fly all night in their southern journey.

Navy's Skyray Sets New Speed Record

THERMAL, Calif.-The Navy's new Skyray interceptor has won back the world's measured course record with an average of 753.4 miles an hour.

The plane was flown by Lt. Com. James B. Verdin, 35, combat hero of World War II and Korea. The plane is a flying-wing jet

The Skyray is designed for use off carriers to protect the fleet from attack and is now scheduled for tests aboard a flattop.

During the 20 minutes between take-off and landing, the nine-ton plane, powered by a Westinghouse J-40 turbojet engine, used approximately 3,500 pounds of jet fuel, a gasoline-kerosene combination.

Stenographer Swims Gibraltar Straits; Holds Two Records

SAN DIEGO - Florence Chadwick, a San Diego stenographer who recently swam the shark-infested Straits of Gibraltar, will go down in sport history as one of the great endurance swimmers of all times

She swam the Straits in 5 hours and 6 minutes, beating the previous record held by a man by an hour and 53 minutes.

Experts had expressed doubt that Miss Chadwick could make the difficult 8-mile crossing. The first woman conqueror of Gibraltar's tough currents was Mercedes Gleitz of Britain, who made it in 1928 in 13 hours and 42 minutes.

Miss Chadwick is the first woman to swim the English Channel both ways. She holds the Englandto-France record with 14 hours and 52 minutes.

In crossing the Straits she swam same breast stroke at 30 strokes a minute all the way across. A doctor who examined her immediately after the swim, exclaimed: "This is not a woman, this is a Titan. Her pulse, respiration, and blood pressure are com-

Glacier Preserves Insects 600 Years

WASHINGTON - Grasshoppers, some of them almost 600 years old, have been preserved in glaciers in the high mountains of the Northwestern states.

The most notable of the "grasshopper glaciers" is in the Beartooth Mountains of Montana, near the northeastern corner of Yellowstone National Park. It is hard to get to this glacier, the institution said, but a few scientists have

been able to study it.

The insects identified have been of the same type that spread devastation during migratory flights in the Seventies and Eighties, the institution said. Great hordes of the insects either flew over the glacier or were carried there by winds. Sudden snowstorms or cold air from the ice fields probably caused them to drop.

WASHINGTON-A recent check up in the Defense Department revealed that as this is written there are (living and dead) 45 generals in the United States who outrank

George Washington.
General of the Armies John J.
Pershing heads the list. General Pershing received this special rank after World War I and is the only American ever to hold it. General of the Armies and General of the Army, both five-star ranks, did not

exist in Washington's day.

In many instances the Army acted years after an officer's departure from active duty or after his death to give him promotion. Ulysses S. Grant, William T. Sher-man and Philip Sheridan achieved four-star rank long after the Civil

But the Army promotion boards never have done anything about stepping up the rank of the first commander.

Army historians say a Congressional Act of 1799, while General Washington was holding the office of commander with the rank of lieutenant general, undoubtedly was intended to provide the rank of full general for him. But, the historians' report, no record can be found to show the appointment was made then or since, for the man who became first President of the United States.

As the list stands now, the officer who immediately out-ranks General Washington in the official list of high officers is Gen. Charles L. Bolte, promoted last July and slated to become the new Army Vice Chief of Staff.

Water and Milk **Most Popular**

NEW YORK-On the basis of an analysis of government and industry figures, the average American takes his drinks straight-and

Milk, coffee, beer, soft drink, and canned fruit and vegetable juices are the nation's most popular beverages, according to the figures.

Milk is the most popular single beverage in the United states with the exception of water. The average American citizen consumed 185 quarts of it in 1952.

Coffee is next in popular favor, with consumption totaling 105 quarts. The study also showed that per capita consumption of beer was 67 quarts, soft drinks 45 quarts, and canned fruit and vegetable juices 15 quarts.

The biggest increase in the past decade was in the use of canned fruit and vegetable juices which has risen 170 per cent since 1940. New methods and processes for canning fresh-flavored orange, tomato, grapefruit, and other juices are credited with a major role in the increase.

As these processing methods improve the popularity of fresh canned fruit juices is expected to continue to increase.

Of all the juices, Orange juice is now the most popular among Americans.

Pupils' Best Subject Is Personality Clue

CLEVELAND - University of Chicago psychologists report the kind of subject a child excels in at school seems to give some tip-off about his personality and home

They report good spellers tend to be passive, conforming and lacking in spontaneity. Youngsters good in arithmetic tend to be aggressive, spontaneous, pretty confident in getting along with other

Good in reading, they tend to be restricted and compulsive in the way they behave, but free and expansive in imagination or fantasy. Good in all subjects, youngsters often seem to be reflecting their parents' greatest desire for them to be good or best in school. These children prefer academic-type subjects offered by the school, learn efficient work habits, tend to obey the teachers' wishes.

Home Freezers Keep Milk for Six Weeks

EAST LANSING - Researchers at Michigan State College report that whole milk can be kept in the average home freezer for as long as six weeks.

Two M.S.C. scientists, G. M. Trout and J. C. Boyd stored milk in paper containers in deep freezers for extended periods, varying the temperatures, times, and types

of milk. They found that homogenized and pasteurized milk stored at 20 degrees below zero kept its flavor for six weeks. They also found out that milk stored at under 33 degrees above zero in an ordinary refrigerator from two to six weeks keeps well.

Boy Shows Them How SHARON SPRINGS, Kan.-Donald Sivey, 12, broke his arm last April when he tried to leap to the branch of a tree from a truck. Recently Don gave a demonstration, upon request, of how he snapped the bone. He leaped from the same truck to the same tree and broke the same arm. His only comment: 'Next time I'll make it."

Car Death Rate Highest in 15

To 29 Age Group NEW YORK-Nearly all of the ncrease in automobile deaths in the United States since 1949 is due to accidents involving drivers and

passengers, insurance statisticians. The death rate from accidents in which motor vehicles overhighway, or hit a curb, pole, or day and on through Sunday. other fixed object increased by more than 40 per cent from 1949 to 1952. Similarly, the death rate from accidents involving a collision of two or more vehicles was

up 26 per cent. By contrast, the loss of life among pedestrians injured in automobile accidents was only slightly higher in 1952 than in 1940.

Although every age group under 65 years contributed to the overall rise in the motor vehicle death rate, the largest increases occurred in the age rank from 15 to 29 years, where more than 90 per cent of the deaths occur among drivers and passengers.

In this age range, the rise in the death rate between 1949 and 1952 average about 40 per cent.

In all, deaths from motor vehi accidents in the United States have mounted from 32,000 in 1949 approximately 38,000 in 1952. The all-time high of 40,000 fatalities was recorded in 1941

Sprays used on apples to reduce

insect blemishes and low incidence of disease are being studied to find those which achieve their purpose without destroying the natural

shine of the apple peel.

Dr. Henry W. Thurston, Jr.,
and Prof. W. A. Chandler, professors of plant pathology, say their research to maintain the polish on an apple is no simple task. In their system they use a galvanometer which contains a photo-electric cell, an incandescent lamp, and a system of mirrors.

Doctors Outline New T. B. Treatment **Using Wonder Drug**

DENVER-Dr. Sidney H. Dressler and Dr. Gardner Middle-brook of the National Jewish Hospital in Denver, which gives free medical care to T. B. patients of all faiths, reported recently on a new treatment of the disease.

The new treatment is designed to send the patient safely back to full-time work. "a whole man instead of only half a man." It would call for fewer months of lying in bed. But it would double the average time spent in a hospital.

Patients would get out of bed sooner, and get steady treatment with new "wonder drugs" while they slowly increased their activities and strength.

"The time has come to alter our concept of tuberculosis treatment materially, to stop merely helping people to live with the disease, and to center an all-out attack on the germ causing the malady, they said.

One drug to be used in the new treatment is izoniazid. The good effects of it aren't increased by prolonged bed rest. Patients with no fever or other symptoms can get out of bed after eight to 10

The doctors reported that two women who were up and active while taking izoniazid had gained strength and learned shorthand and typing so "they are now out of the hospital, their disease inactivated, and are earning their own livelihoods as stenographers.

Monument Placed Where Rogers Died

FAIRBANKS, Alaska-A boyhood friend of the late Will Rogers, after hiking 300 miles, has erected a monument at the spot where the humorist died in a plane crash beside the Arctic Ocean in

The sentimental and sturdy oldtime is Jesse Stubbs, 72, who set out from Anchorage on his mission last winter. He hiked with his dog along the long highway to Fairbanks, vowing he would make the trek all the way to Point Barrow. Friends talked him out of it. They provided an airplane ride to

An airline crew was amazed to find this week that Stubbs had completed a spired concrete memorial at the spot where Rogers and Wiley Post, his famed pilot, crashed to their deaths.

Stubbs hauled his construction materials over the mushy snow and tundra to the site 12 miles from Point Barrow, northernmost tip of North America.

Time Gets the Best Of Small Ohio Town

BARNESVILLE, O .- The residents of Barnesville, a small East Ohio community, was the scene of a summer-long "confusion" caused by four different time schedules.

Early in the spring, town officials adopted Eastern Standard Time for the community. However, the schools and most residents stayed on Daylight-Saving-Time.



Reporter Who Buried (Buffalo Bill) Cody Dies in Denver, Colo.

DENVER-An era in Americana came to a close recently with the death of Edgar C. McMechen in Denver recently.

McMechen, relatively unknown at the time of his death at the age of 69, was the man responsible for the burial of William F. (Buffalo Bill) Cody on Colorado's Lookout Mountain.

McMechen is still cursed in Wyoming and Nebraska for his action at the time of Buffalo Bill's death.

When the great long - haired sharpshooter died in Denver in 1917. McMechen, who was secretary to Denver Mayor Robert W. Speer, quietly got permission from Cody's wife for the burial on Lookout Mountain near Golden. When residents of Cody. Wyoming, and North Platte, Nebraska, got word of what had happened, Buffalo Bill was in his final resting place in Colorado.

Now, more than 2,000,000 persons visit the grave each year, much to the consternation of Wyoming and Nebraska residents. Cody had a ranch near North Platte, and the Wyoming town he founded was named in his honor.

In fact, recently Wyoming residents sought to remove the Western hero's bones to Wyoming. Colorado Gov. Dan Thornton retorted that someone in Wyoming must have been "drinking too much sage-brush juice."

Man Could Reach Mars, Expert Says

URBANA, Ill. - Wernher von Braun, German rocket developer now with the U. S. Army, has startled the country with a report that men could reach and explore Mars and then return.

In a book titled "The Mars Project" he says an expedition of 50 earthmen could spend 400 days exploring the planet and return.
