





#### **Briscoe County**

From "The Stayer" August 2, 1896 No. 21 Vol 2, furnished by Mrs. Lee D. Bomar.

Briscoe county lies between the 34th and 35th degrees of latitude and is about 3400 feet above see level. Lines drawn, at right angles east and west, north and south show Briscoe to be almost exactly in the center of the Panhandle. It is watered by a number of small creeks running in the canyons and emptying into Red River. The general topography of the county is a broken plateau, beautiful level plains alternating with canyons or brakes as they are called. Some of the most subline and magnificient scenery anywhere on earth is to be found in these canyons; deep gorges where the sun never penetrates; magnificient peaks that catch the earlies and latest beams of the light: clear limpid pools of pure sweet water; the deep and ever lasting green of the cedars; the varied and beautiful colors of the rocks; the many clambering vines covering bare spots with color and beauty all combined create a picture that cannot fail to please even the most careless beholder.

On the plains proper, the undilating praries are dotted over with herds of white face cattle and scrub ponies that are the basis of the prosperity of the people. Any direction the eye may take you will see the waving gress, the fields of forage, all arrayed in living green; the tall windmill towers and the comfortable homes of the stockmen. A clear inspection of almost any of these homes will show them to be surrounded by shade and ornmanental trees, an orchard, a garden; poultrym pigs, calves and all the adjun is of the happy rural life. During the summer cattle are grazed on the praries, but when winter comes with itss icy breath, all but a few milk cows and work horses are driven into the canyons which shelter them from the cold and furnish an abundance of grass all winter.






