He announced his sermon topic for Sunday morning, 11:00 o'clock would be "Announcement of Intention." There will be Sunday School at 10:00 A. M., and for the present there will be no evening services. Rev. Nettleton holds a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Vanderbilt University of Nashville, Tennessee and a B. A. and M. A. degree from the University of Tulsa.

Pioneers Play Howard Payne Tonight At Plainview

Wayland College of Plainview defeated Midwestern University, 91 to 88, in a thrilling overtime battle, Monday night, at Coyote Field House Monday night, and the Pioneers will meet Howard Payne College Thursday for the right to represent District 3 in the NAAIA tournament at Kansas City. Coach Harley J. Redin of the Wayland College Pioneers, is in his eighth and most successful season in basketball.

The Pioneers enter the playoff with a 19-3 record, including 1665 points against their opponents' 1385 points. Their average per game is 75.7 as against their opponents' 63.4 points a game.

Harley Redin came to Wayland College in 1946 direct from graduate work in physical education at North Texas State College. The first year was rugged but his group won 9 games to 13 lost in the Texas Junior College Conference. Next year was a different story because his team won 26 games and lost only seven and annexed the Texas Junior College Conference crown. Only two of the seven losses were to junior colleges.

Other problems developed in 1948-49 when Wayland became a senior college and Coach Redin played a schedule that included both junior and senior colleges and came out with a record of 23 wins to 9 losses.

Because Wayland is a small liberal arts college which does not field an intercollegiate football team, the Pioneers are not in a senior college conference for basketball competition. Despite this, Redin's team for the past four years has won 64 games and lost 56 in the toughest schedules he could arrange.

Coach Redin, who is a product of Silvertown, is chairman of the division of health and physical education at Wayland. At John Tarleton College, Redin played Varsity basketball and then entered North Texas State College from which he received the M. S. degree. Redin did a stint in the Marine Air Corps after college and came out of service with a captaincy but his mild manner with his team belies any tough training and competition in which he himself has been engaged.

Immediate survivors include three daughters and one son, Mrs. Susie Wallace, Tucumcari, New Mexico, Mrs. Grace Alexander, Strathmore, California, Mrs. Inza Turner, Turkey, Texas, and C. T. Wallace, Silvertown, Texas, 24 grand-children and 43 great grand-children.

His wife preceded him in death in 1926, two sons, the eldest, Hut, passing away in 1937, the youngest son, Glen, passing away in 1938, and a grand-daughter, Mrs. Mascal Turner Kelley in 1953.

Interment was made in the Silvertown Cemetery under the direction of Douglas Funeral Home.

NEWSPAPER AD MEN HEAR ARTHUR PORTER SPEAK

Porter suggested these selling points for newspaper advertising "I can prove 95 per cent of the families in my community pay \$15 to \$30 a year, year after year, for the product that my firm distributes. This proves the respect and authority that advertising commands."

"I can prove that news about any product is a vital ingredient in the success of any product—new or old."

"I can prove that no better place exists for combining the basic message of the national advertiser and the specific "Buy It Here Today" appeal of the local dealer."

Porter said the newspaper offers a specific local market, gives the national advertiser a "higher percentage of exposure than any other medium," and provides the local advertiser with "deliberate, coluntary readership."

"The newspaper and the Sears Roebuck catalog have much in common," he said. "They are both sought out and deliberately consulted, particularly by women, for items to buy."

Porter raised a rhetorical question about the possibility of relating news or staff writers to advertising—something like the link between performer and advertiser on radio or TV.

"Maybe a food ad would run once a week and the food editor's picture could be worked into the ad with a personal recommendation to the reader," he said.

"If the advertisers sponsor fights and football games or television, why doesn't it make sense for them to sponsor the baseball or football result in the newspaper?"

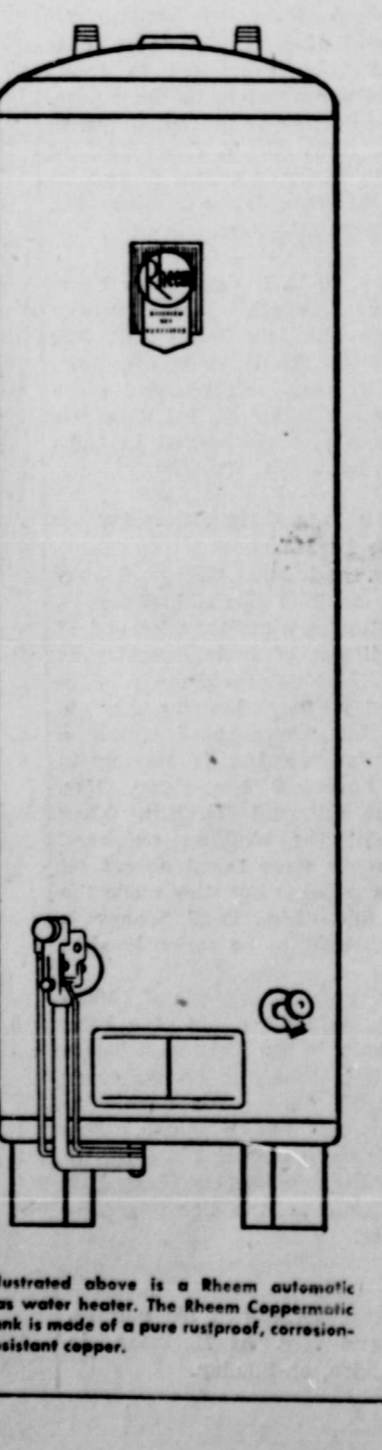

IT'S THE LAW INSURANCE QUESTIONS ANSWERED

One of the most familiar types of contracts is the insurance policy, as nearly everyone carries some sort of insurance protection. Yet, few people take the trouble to read their policies and lawyers have to answer many questions regarding insurance generally.

Here is a problem frequently presented: "I have a hospitalization insurance policy. Will the company pay all my hospital bills if I become ill?"

It may or may not. Insurance is a contract between the insurance company and the policy holder. In the usual contract the policy holder agrees to pay a certain sum of money for the policy of insurance, and the insurance company agrees that should the policy holder incur hospital expenses that the insurance company will make payment to the policy holder of stated sums, as set out in the policy of insurance.

The insurance policy itself must state the complete contract between the parties. The oral statements of agents not in harmony with the policy are not binding on the company. The company is bound to pay only such sums as are specifically set forth in the policy of insurance.

Practically all policies have a section called exceptions and exclusions. The policy holder should

particularly read this section before purchasing a policy of any kind of insurance. It would be possible for a policy of insurance to have so many exceptions and exclusions as to practically nullify any benefits under the policy.

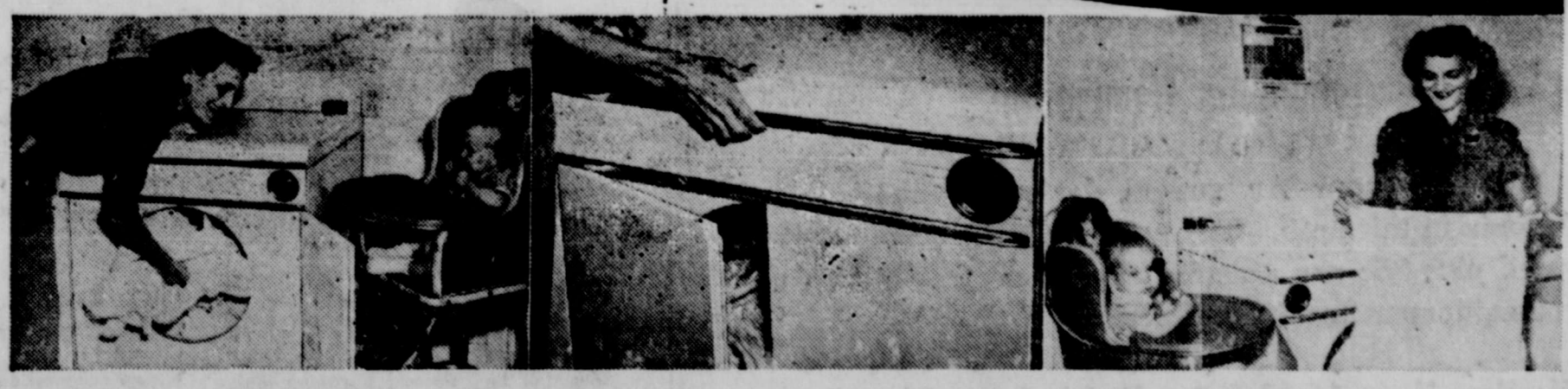

The Constitution of the Republic of Texas, adopted March 2, 1845, declared, "It shall be the duty of Congress, as soon as circumstances will permit, to provide by law, a general system of education."

In 1854 the School Law provided for the first State Public School System of Texas. The State Constitution declares, "A general diffusion of knowledge being essential to the preservation of the liberties and rights of the people, it shall be the duty of the Legislature of the State to establish and make suitable provision for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of public free schools."

From this grew the public school system of Texas. Historians say:

"Education of the masses through these schools which are public schools has been the backbone of the liberties of the people and the national freedom of the country."

We must protect and nurture the public school system, without which Democracy will wither and die, for it cannot live without learning the knowledge by its means.

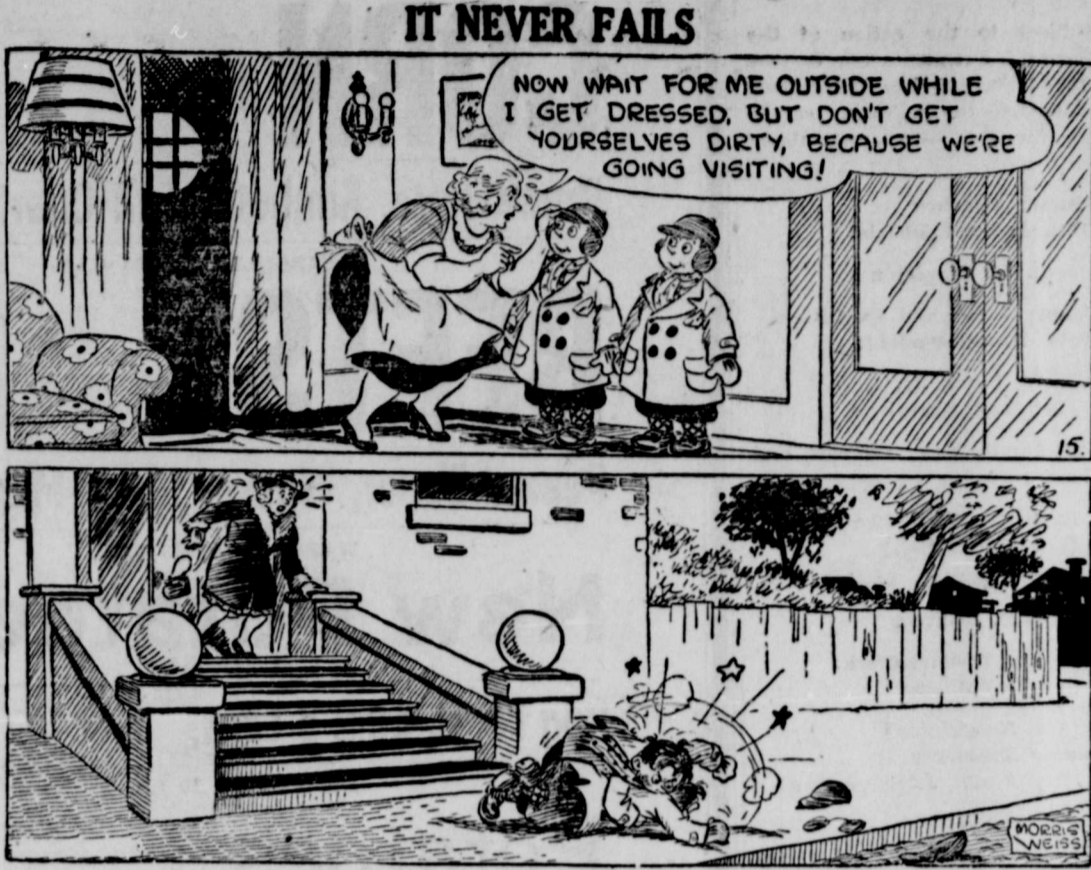

SCIENCE and your Health

PROBLEMS OF OLD AGE By Science Features

The song which laments that "the old rockin' chair's got me" expresses a feeling all too often characteristic of elderly people. In many cases these people suffer from no organic disturbance. They simply feel "old."

But the proverb that you are only as old as you feel has received considerable scientific support in recent years. Advances in medical science, which have added years to our life expectancy, have made old age healthier than ever before.

As a matter of fact, the complex problems involved in helping the ever-increasing elderly population lead healthy and useful lives has given rise to a whole new branch of medical science. This is called gerontology, the study of old age.

Many cases of elderly people who lack a sense of general well-being—who feel "old" and spiritless—can be traced to a deficiency in certain hormones, the life-regulating chemicals produced by the body's glands.

To help people suffering from this deficiency, a hormone drug, called Combandrin, has been developed. This drug, containing two important hormones, acts to help rebuild tissue and promote a sense of fitness. It can be given by injection or by tablet.

But this is only one aspect of gerontology. Others include psychiatry and preventive medicine—in fact, all scientific knowledge that can help old people live happier, healthier lives.

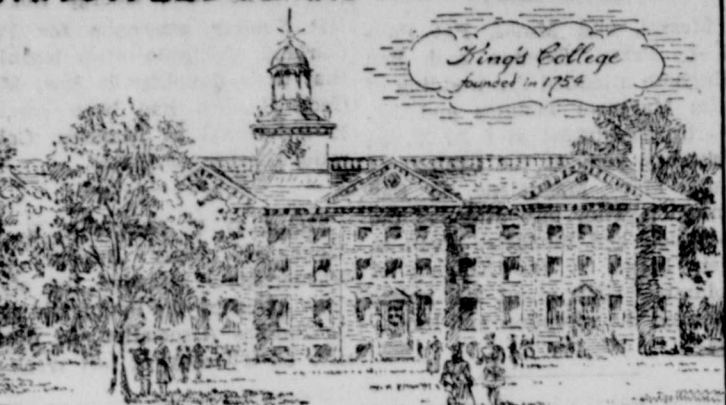

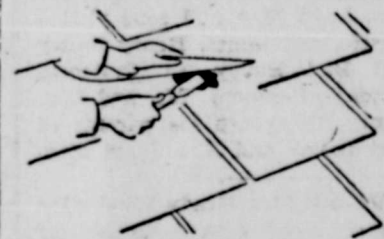

HOME OWNERS QUESTION BOX

Q—I recently bought, and am remodeling, an old house in the country, where there is little natural protection from the wind. The house needs to be reroofed, and what can I do to make the roofing material more wind-resistant?

A—Proper application is the only way to protect roofing against high winds. For farm homes and



other buildings in high wind areas, cementing down of asphalt shingle tabs with quick-setting asphalt cement is recommended. Also suggested are interlocking asphalt shingles, which are made to lock together tightly. Every shingle is held down by the shingles on both sides of it as well as by nails.

Q—How can I repair a crack in a garden pool made of concrete?

A—The crack can be filled with a mixture of one part of portland cement and three parts of sand with enough water to make a stiff paste. Clean out the crack and undercut the sides so that they slope in toward the top.

Q—Is there a way to keep nailheads from showing through a thin coat of plaster?

A—Yes. Nailheads show because rust forms on them, and the trick is to prevent the rusting. To do this, coat the nailheads with shellac and let it dry before plastering the wall.

Q—How can grass be kept from growing between stones in a flagstone terrace?

A—Make a strong solution of rock salt in water and wet the earth between stones. The liquid can be poured from a can or a pitcher or sprinkled from a watering can.
