## Newcastle Disease Among Chickens In This County

Newcastle Disease has been reported in this County the past week. This is a highly contagious disease of Poultry that causes tremendous losses to all birds becoming infected. It is caused by a highly virulent virus that is likely to infect any age poultry. Baby chicks on up to laying hens are susceptible.

The symptoms of this disease are much like the common cold and respiratory disease that are common to poultry, but later stages of the disease will affect the nervous system and cause the bird to lose control of the legs and wings. Laying hens will often walk backward, have muscular spasms, and finally be unable to rise. There is no known treatment for the chickens after they get the disease but chicks can be vaccinated to prevent the disease very successfully. Newcastle disease will run its course in about 14 days but by that time most poultry raisers will be out of the poultry business. One flock of 400 hens that I know of in the County dropped from a daily egg production of 260 eggs to 30 in a short period of about 3 days" said County Agent Robert Ledbetter.

The County Agent further states that with the disease among our chickens, all should be vaccinated against Newcastle. There are a lot more baby chickens coming in to the county this year than years past. These baby chicks should be vaccinated with live virus. Three to four week old chicks may be vaccinated with the dead virus vaccine.

There will be a vaccination demonstration at Quitaque Thursday on one of the 4-H Club boys chickens, anyone interested in learning to perform this vaccination may contact County Agent Ledbetter at his office or at the Quitaque City Hall Thursday.

## When Their World Crashed... RED CROSS HEARD THEIR CALLS



Above: This photo, an AP prize-winner, taken one hour after tornado winds struck Port Huron, Mich., last May, shows a 13-year-old boy and his dog beside their demolished home. The Red Cross, immediately on the disaster scene, came to the aid of the family with clothing, household furniture, and medical care.

Upper Right: After the devastating Greek earthquakes last August, 3-year-old Stamatia Frangou sat on a hospital bed with her name pinned to her dress, as doctors dressed her fractured leg and injured head. Greek Red Cross workers finally located her mother alive, after a month's search, and re-united the pair. The American Red Cross conducted a nation-wide appeal for funds to aid victims.

Lower Right: Fire, which completely ravaged a Chicago, Ill., apartment building, killed seven, injured six, and affected 100 persons, left Michael Cruz, 2 1/2, bewildered and frightened. Here the terrified youngster is being comforted by Mrs. Rodna Nye, Red Cross disaster representative, who established disaster headquarters at the scene of the fire.

Last year the Red Cross aided an average of one person every five minutes among those suffering disaster injury or loss, as sudden death and destruction struck communities across the United States on an average of six times every week. The 1954 Red Cross Campaign for \$85,000,000 and 30,000,000 members, now underway, enables everyone to serve his neighbors in distress or need.

### Veteran's Questions And Answers

Q—I have a \$10,000 National Service Life Insurance term policy, and I'm thinking of converting to a permanent plan. Do I have to convert all of it, or could I convert part and keep part at term insurance?

A—You may convert part of your insurance to one or more permanent plans, and keep the rest as term. You may convert in multiples of \$500, starting with a minimum of \$1,000.

Q—I'm planning to take a correspondence course under the Korean GI Bill. How large a GI allowance can I count on getting from the VA?

A—Your GI education and training allowance will be equal to the amount that the school requires non-veterans to pay for the same course.

Q—When I was in service, I was told that the only persons I could name as beneficiaries for my GI insurance indemnity were wife, children, parents, brothers or sisters. If I apply for the GI term insurance available to Korean veterans, will the same restrictions on beneficiaries apply?

A—No. For the GI term insurance, you may name any person or persons, firm, corporation or other legal entity, including your estate. The restrictions on beneficiaries apply only to the free in service indemnity.

Q—I am a disabled World War Two veteran taking Public Law 16 training. After I finish my course, will VA find me a job?

A—No. Under the law, VA's responsibility has to end after it has trained you to the point of employability. However, your VA training officer will refer you to an appropriate State or Federal employment agency for assistance in finding a job.

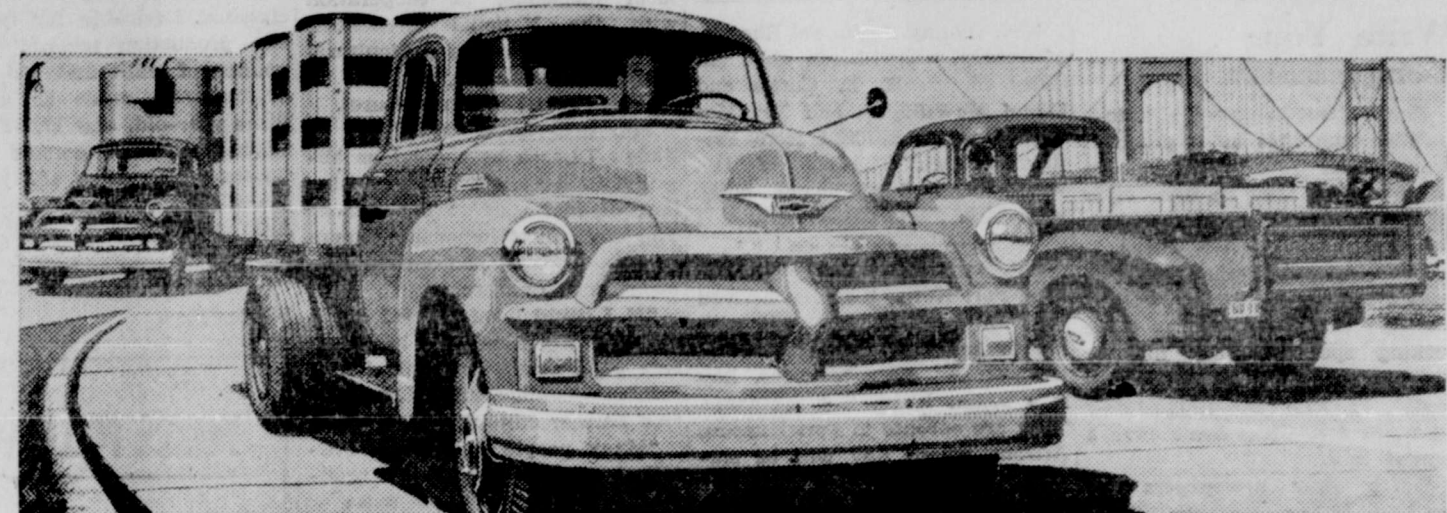

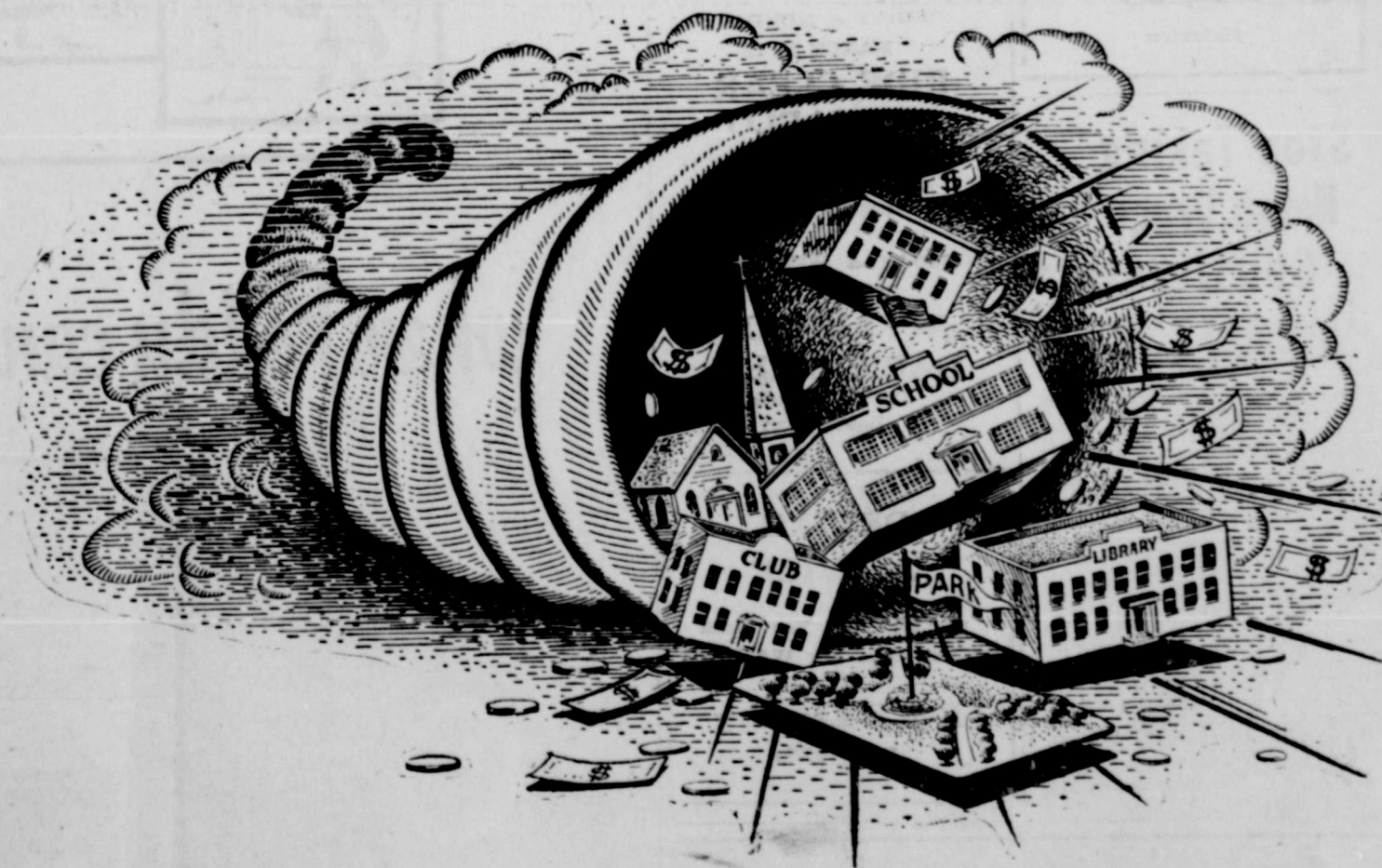

## Program Set To Eliminate Brucellosis

Birmingham, Ala.—Farm leaders are aiming what they hope will be a knock-out blow at one of the worst livestock diseases in this country—brucellosis.

A program was set up to wipe out brucellosis at a recent Southern Brucellosis Conference. This Conference was sponsored by The Progressive Farmer, a Southern farm magazine, in cooperation with the National Brucellosis Committee, Southern Agricultural Workers Association, and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

You may know brucellosis as Bang's Disease or contagious abortion in livestock, and as undulant of Malta fever in humans. The ninth most important human disease, it can mean untold suffering and expense.

"If I could have figured out a way for my family to be taken care of, I would have killed myself," one victim told a Progressive Farmer editor.

"Many people argue that brucellosis presents no health problem because cooking of meat or pasteurization of milk kills the brucella germs," an article in this farm magazine states.

"However," it continues, "they forget that a large number of people, including almost every housewife, handle meat before it is cooked. And far too many people still drink unpasteurized milk."
