Silverton Places Second In District Meet

Prominent Briscoe County Farmer Buried Thursday

Funeral services were held on Thursday April 8, 1954, at 4 P. M. at the First Baptist Church of W. Grady Wimberly, a life time resident of Briscoe County, who died in Mineral Wells, Texas, on April 6.

Rev. G. A. Elrod, pastor of the church, officiated and he was assisted by Rev. Joe Wilson of Floydada, Rev. C. R. Hankins of the local Methodist church and Rev. N. D. Nettleton pastor of the Presbyterian church.

A quartet composed of Joe Foster, Charles Record, Raymond Tucker, and Clark Harris of McKinney, sang "My Faith Looks Up to Thee" and "Crossing the Bar", accompanied by Mrs. Charles Record on the piano. Organ selections were played by Mrs. B. Garvin. Graveside rites were conducted by the Masonic Order and Honor Guard from Silverton, Texas, on October 8, 1893 on the Wimberly meadow south of town.

He was married to Winnie Edges on December 25, 1922. This union two children were born.

He became a Christian at an early age and united with the Baptist church. He took an active part in his church and was a deacon for 20 years. He served as School Trustee of the Lakeview school district for a number of years and was County Commissioner from 1939 to 1942, and a former member of the Elms Club.

He was always interested in the civic affairs of his community.

He was a charter member of Silverton Eastern Star and second degree Mason, a member of El Paso Consistory Number 3. He leaves to cherish his memory his wife, a daughter and Mrs. Freda Seefeldt of Silverton and John Curtis Wimberly of Abilene. Three sisters, Mrs. L. Kellum of Silverton, Mrs. Gunther of Denver, Colorado and Mrs. Orren Burnside of San Diego, California, and five grandchildren.

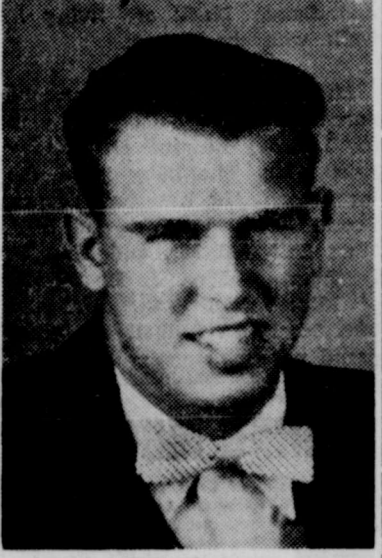
