Rains characterized as "drought breakers" in many places has fallen over much of the Central and Southeastern Panhandle and South Plains. 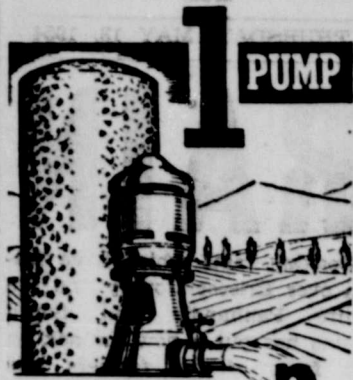

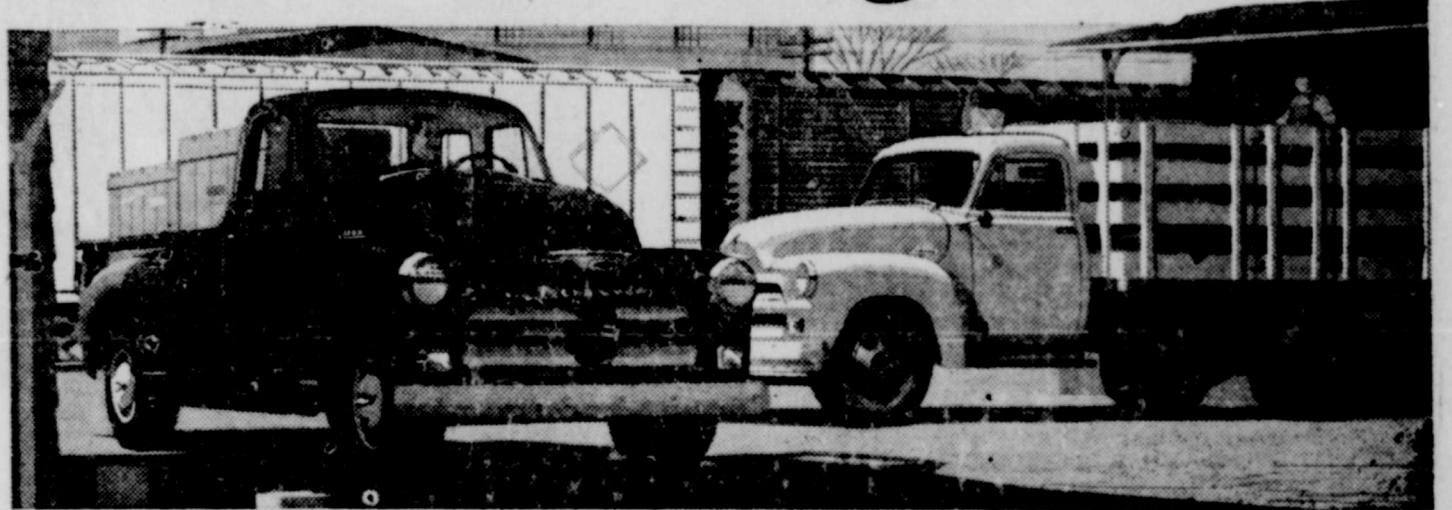
